

NOTES ON THE NUMBERS Submitted by Ted Jones, Danby Town Bookkeeper

It's budget time again. Town departments are busy preparing their fiscal-year-2007 budget requests which must be submitted to the town clerk by September 20th. These requests will be compiled into a preliminary budget by the bookkeeper and submitted to the town board for review, revision, and approval.

The town board has scheduled workshops where it will meet with department heads and discuss budget requests. The heads will explain their budgets and justify any increases. Danby residents are invited to listen to the discussions. Before the budget is voted on, the public may attend a final meeting and voice their concerns.

Throughout the years, the town board has consistently worked to keep tax increases to a minimum. One of the biggest challenges is to find ways to replace aging highway equipment. A new truck can cost more than \$170,000, and several trucks are past replacement age. Also this year, we have been required by the EPA to conduct environmental remediation work at the highway barns. This may require nearly \$400,000 to complete and the board has approved a bond for \$385,000 to cover the costs—and we can pay for most of this bond without raising taxes because other bonds (including the town barn and a dump truck) have been paid off recently.

The 2006 Town budget—including the Fire Dep't was \$1,885,149. Of this, 44% covered oper-

ating expenses and debt, 26% paid salaries, 16% went to the fire department, 6% to health insurance, 6% to employee benefits, and 2% was used to purchase equipment. The NYS Thruway Authority provided \$95,857 to help pay for highway improvements, and there was about \$76,000 of other income (clerks fees, zoning fees, court fees, etc.). The balance was raised by taxes.

VIOLIN RECITAL: SUSAN WATERBURY

The next concert in the Danby Concert Series is a recital by violinist Susan Waterbury and pianist Charis Dimaras on Sunday Oct 8, at 3pm in the Danby Town Hall. Admission is free. Both Waterbury and Dimaras are on the faculty of Ithaca College's School of Music. Waterbury has a Master's degree from the Eastman School of Music. She is first violinist with the Ariadne String Quartet that performed last year in Danby and performs regularly with many chamber music groups in the Ithaca area, including Ensemble X. She has appeared in New York City's Carnegie Recital Hall, Alice Tully Hall, and Lincoln Center, and has released recordings on several labels. She was a member of the award-winning Cavani String Quartet.

Dimaras holds a Master's Degree from the Julliard School of Music and performs locally both as a soloist and an accompianist.

The Danby Concert series, sponsored by the Danby Community Council, is made possible in part by public funds from the NY State Council on the Arts/Tompkins County Community Arts Partnership Decentralization Program.

DANBY TOWN HISTORY


This is the first part of the second of two 19th century Danby letters that Peter Fraissinet of West Danby wanted to share. The misspelled words and grammatical errors are as written. The last portion of this letter will appear in the November issue of the *Danby News*.

Addressed to: Mr. Levi Curtis, Stratford, Fairfield County, Conn., dated Danby, April 11th 1824

After waiting with patience four weeks I received Sally's letter which was the 9th day of April it gave me much pleasure to hear from all Stratford friends. I had begun to think that you had forgotten me. Never had I been separated from by dear Father and Mother, brothers and sisters so long before, often have I thought I should like to see them by not so as t make me feel homesick. I never felt so content any where from home in my life. I have found acquaintances in Danby so that I think I shall not get homesick. I went a visiting to Mr. Nathan Beers last week a Thursday and he wished me to write to Willis and tell him that he and Mr. Ufford promised to buy his farm if he would sell it. He says he thinks some of going

to Mishigan and they may have it [?] Willis I think it probable I shall stay and keep house for him if he buys it.

The week after Phebe's death there was a piece written by an unknown friend in the Ithica paper which I think you will be pleased to hear. It is the following...



Danby Jan. 9th 1824

Died on Wednesday the 7th, Mrs. Phebe I. Curtis the wife of Elbert Curtis, daughter of Dr. Lewis Beers, aged 20 years... Seldom if ever has the hand of friendship been called to mention the death of a private individual, whose premature and, has so universally called forth the tears and grief of relations, and the simpathy of all those who knew her, as that of Mrs. Curtis. Born in affluence yet she was meek; surrounded by a wicked and flattering world yet she kept herself free from its follies -- with a heart replete with goodness and virtue , her hand was ever open to relieve the poor and distressed of whom she was an idol -- to her, death had no terror. She could triumphantly exclaim... "O , death, where is thy sting! O grave, where is thy victory!" Such was Mrs. Phebe Isabella Curtis. Almost idolized by her parents, for whom she had the purest affection; beloved by a husband, who knew and appreciated her worth: long will her memory be cherished.

Thus has she been cut off, in the morning of her days. We feel the solemn lesson sink deep into our hearts, when minds so largely endowed and adorned, evince, it their fate, the truths utter by the sublime poet Dr. Young, who made the threats and the promises of the Gospel, the theme of his midnight stains; and then they admonish:

"By nature's law, what must be must be now There's no prerogative in human hours In human hearts, what bolder thoughts can rise Than man's presumption on to morrow's dawn? Where is to morrow? In another world!"

Uncle Dr. has took me a riding he was sent for to marry a couple. Tell Sally I think they marry very young here. The girl that was married was about 17 years. I went

> with Uncle, there was three weddings that day, the one that I went to was Dutch. It was between five and six miles on the road to Ithica. I was much pleased. The bride was dressed in a plain cambric frock and figured lace Vandike and ruffles after they were married they sat a table they had [F?s] and all kinds of sweetmeats and to finish they had sourcraut that I did not like. They had

ginger and pound cake and two sorts of pies, apple and pumpkin; the old man of the house eat with his hat on, and the old woman went around the house a smoking. I have been a visiting a number of places time passes away swiftly. I expect by Sally's visiting you had not received Uncle's letter. Tell Sally I will write and tell all about the visits I have made and all particulars. I must [?] by my pen and leave room for E. to. My love to you all. From your affectionate daughter Betsy. Give my love to all cousins and the girls Susan and Charity & c.

RESOLUTION NO. 70 OF 2006 UPDATE

Resolution No. 70 of 2006 entitled *Urging the Withdrawal of U.S. Military Personnel and Bases from Iraq* has been sent to the President of the United States and to each member of the New York State Congressional delegation.

Notice Of Bond Resolution Subject To Permissive Referendum

This is a brief summary of a resolution adopted on September 11, 2006. The resolution is subject to permissive referendum in accordance with section 90 of the Town Law. The complete, unedited text is available at the Town Clerk's office.

A Resolution adopted by the Town Board...authorizes the issuance of bonds and other obligations to finance the construction, alteration, and remodeling of the Town's Highway Garage...in accordance with a Notice of Violation promulgated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency dated February 28, 2006, at a maximum estimated cost of \$385,000. This estimate includes all costs. The project will be paid by the levy of a tax, not to exceed \$385,000, which shall be collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Town Board. Under the Local Finance Law, the Project has a period of probable usefulness of ten (10) years.

House Numbering

The State Fire Code requires that all properties have address numbers, minimum 4 inches in size, and clearly visible from the street.

Right To Farm Law

The Town Board is moving forward on a proposed *Right to Farm Law* which would notify incoming residents that the Town supports farming, and that typical farm practices should be expected.

Hamlet Planning

A grant application has been resubmitted to the State, requesting \$25,000 to help the Town develop strategic Plans for the Central and West Danby Hamlets. Strategic Plans are required in order to apply for major funding for such items as community facilities, infrastructure, and housing improvements. The County will provide detailed maps of the Hamlets to the Town.

Receive a discount coupon for having your septic system pumped and learn how conventional and alternative systems work. Understand the preventive maintenance and routine care that can save costly repairs while protecting water quality.

A free program open to everyone, sponsored by the Cayuga Lake Watershed Network and the Town of Danby is being offered from 7–9pm on Wednesday, October 18 at the Danby Town Hall.

When a septic system is suitably located, properly designed and installed, and adequately maintained, it provides economical, safe wastewater disposal. Wastewater from the kitchen, bathrooms, and laundry carries chemicals, solids, grease, and wastes that contain nutrients and bacteria that can cause disease. Failing septic systems allow inadequately treated water to enter the groundwater, where it can reach streams and lakes, and even nearby wells.

Taking care of your septic system, including regular pumping is an important way to guard against water pollution. The October 18th program will explain how a typical septic system works, introduce alternative systems, explain signs of system failure and give tips for preventive maintenance and routine care.

Thanks to funding from the Tompkins County Department of Health, Thomas Septic Service, and Gaggle Company, Tompkins County residents who attend the program will receive a \$20 discount coupon towards septic system pumping.
