Supervisor's Update

Dwight Mengel, transportation planner for Tompkins County, has asked the Town of Danby to participate in the County's new Ride Share program. The program will support Danby's efforts to provide alternative transportation for its residents. The program is still in its test stages; we hope to have a ride board, perhaps using a web page, that will permit riders and drivers to "meet up" online to coordinate transportation. Stay tuned for updates, either in the Ithaca Journal or the Danby Area News.

On the home front, the north side of the Town Hall was painted, new heat and smoke detectors have been installed and connected to fire central. The Town Justices have received a computer upgrade thanks to a grant.

We had a successful meeting with County Highway Department. Hornbook, Nelson, and South Danby roads came under review, with continued talks on upgrades and snow plowing. At an additional meeting, in the Fall, we hope to talk about "trade-off" of some roads. We received the final report on the \$300,000 upgrade to Station Road; it will require road closings. Please note the dates on closing signs and explore alternative routes in advance!

Dog License Fee Increase

The Town of Danby has adopted a local law increasing the fees for licensing. Beginning on September 1, 2008 the fees for new dog license and dog license renewals will be charged at increased fee (not spayed or neutered: \$20; spayed or neutered: \$12).

Dog licenses due for renewal before September 1, 2008 will be at the fee listed on the renewal notice sent to owners by the NYS Division of Agriculture and Markets.

Sporting Licenses

Sporting Licenses for the 2008-2009 season are on sale. DMP (Deer Management Permits) will be available from August 18 thru September 31. Sportsmen should remember to bring identification, proof of residency, hunting elegibility and land owner information if applicable.

Town Observer

Planning Board

The focus of the July meeting was on organizing the hamlet planning project. All who had applied to be on the steering committee were appointed, creating a 15-member committee: Bob Roe is the chairperson and is joined by Planning Board members are Ted Melchnen, Ray Van de Bogart, Olivia Vent, Naomi Strichartz, David Mastroberti, and Anne Klingensmith, along with alternates George Blanchard and Joel Gagnon. Added to that core were Liz Roe, Eric Miller, Magic Barrett, Bruce Richards, Rick Dobson, and Gladys Varona-Lacey.

All-day planning workshops (mini-charrettes) for Danby and West Danby are planned for Friday and Saturday, October 24 and 25, respectively. The hope is to involve as many residents as possible in what will in effect be a joint brainstorming session.

Town Board

The board approved a resolution requesting that the state DEC make the town an *involved agency* in SEQRA (State Environmental Quality Review Act) actions related to gas drilling applications within the town. Currently the town is regarded as an *interested agency* which means that it would be notified—after the fact—about any permits issued. Involved agencies get to comment during the permitting process and potentially have some say in the approval. The resolution originated with State Senator Jim Seward, who proposed it in response to concerns about the potential impacts of gas development in Danby and other towns.

The board opted to paint only the north side of the Town Hall this year. The board's acceptance of Tony Catlin's offer to do the work (for \$400, paint supplied by the Town) is contingent upon proper removal of paint loosened by the preliminary scraping.

The Water Resources Council, a county-level group, has stressed the importance of a Danby representative and requested the Town to appoint one. The board has not been able to find one. The WRC is intermunicipal and focuses on what can be done to preserve and enhance the quality of the water resources in the county. It might well play a role in the gas drilling issue, for example, given the potential impact on drinking water from injection of chemicals in hydrofracturing, not to mention the disposal issue when 60–80 percent of the chemically-laden water is retrieved. Interested? Contact the Town Clerk.

The Board moved its September agenda meeting to Wednesday, September 3 to avoid the Labor Day Holiday, and authorized use of the Town Hall for a biofuel meeting.

Hamlet Planning Steering Committee

The group (and a couple of additional residents besides) were present for a meeting with representatives of Bergman Associates. Bergman's Andy Raus led the group through a SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats) analysis for both Danby and West Danby hamlets. Also discussed was how to involve outside experts (from the DOT, for example) in the planning process. The consultants opined that having them present during the hamlet design workshops (mini-charrettes) would be best but, since that might not be possible, a Friday morning session covering issues for both hamlets will be explored.

Steering Committee meetings are scheduled for September 4, October 2, and December 4, all at 7pm in the Town Hall.

Comprehensive Plan Implementation Task Force

The August meeting of the Task Force briefly revisited the proposed Agricultural Activity Law and reaffirmed that the draft needs feedback from the Town Board.

The Task Force opted not to play a leadership role in sponsoring the September biofuel meeting, but Task Force members interested in the topic will attend the meeting.

The Task Force felt that gas drilling, despite its potentially large environmental impact, is outside the scope of comprehensive plan implementation and should be addressed by the Planning and Town Boards.

A graphical representation of Joel Gagnon's original proposal for restructuring the requirements for lots by permit generated a lot of interest and discussion. At the next meeting, we hope to have an extended graph that includes acreage and/or frontage "credits" for setbacks and separation distances.

The question of whether the Task Force should propose this new set of regulations (or some variation) for lots by permit or instead request that the Town Board make a simple revisions to the existing regulations, perhaps on an interim basis, has not been resolved. That question will likely be addressed at the next meeting, scheduled for Thursday, September 11 at 7pm in the Town Hall.

- And especially creating a product and market for burning biofuels: wood chips, grass pellets.

Eight Danby youth worked on a summer project at Jennings Pond, clearing and improving a hiking trail. Over a period of four weeks, they created a wide trail from the swimming area to the point on the far side of the pond.
