Toivo in Concert

Catch a little Hope and drive the winter away with a Concert by *Toivo*, 3–5pm on Sunday, March 15 in the Danby Town Hall. The concert is free, but donations are welcome.

Toivo means "hope" in Finnish. This six piece band from the Trumansburg vicinity plays what they call "Finger Lakes Traditional Music"—a unique blend of Finnish, Tex-Mex, and original music suited to such old-time dances as waltzes, schottisches, two-steps, hambos, and reels. When the cool North of Finland meets the heat from South of the Border, the result goes beyond hope to pure joy.

Toivo is a musical blend that could only happen in our little corner of the Finger Lakes. The band includes of Richard Koski on button accordion, his son Jason Koski on mandolin, both well known in both Finnish and Finnish-American musical circles. They are joined by two former *Chicken Chokers*: Stefan Senders on banjo and Jim Reidy on guitar, and their Trumansburg neighbors Harley Campbell on upright bass and Annie Campbell on snare drum.

In 2008, Toivo stepped out with a CD of this multicultural blend of Old-Time music. *Laughing Shoes* features several of Rich Koski's original dance tunes and light-hearted artwork by Annie Campbell. You'll find the same mix of Finnish, Tejano, Cajun, and Old-Time music spilling out of the Danby Town Hall in March. Come out for a foot-tapping time. The concert is open to everyone and family friendly.

The Danby Community Council has been awarded a \$1200 grant to support its 2009 concert series, by the New York State Council on the Arts Decentralization Program, administered by the Community Arts Partnership of Tompkins County. The grant helps support music at Fun Day and the West Danby Picnic, as well as free concerts at the Danby Town Hall. Watch future issues of DAN for announcements of other concerts.

Danby Town History

Danby Church History

In 1860 there were eight churches in Danby, "one unheated church for every 300 people". Below are the churches in the order that they were established, their locations and a brief history.

1807: The Presbyterian Church of Danby proper was founded; it and later became known as the Congregational Church. This stately, graceful structure, at 1859 Danby Road, in the middle of town, is the oldest original church building in the county.

1810: The West Danby Baptist Church was established by Moses Barker. The church was built across from his farm on Valley View Road. It later became the First Baptist Church of West Danby. After the church burned down, it was replaced by a new building, two-tenths of a mile north of Valley View Road on the east side of NYS Rt.34/96.

1811: The first Methodist Church was established. Its building was erected on the south east corner of East Miller Road and Rt. 96B. In 1954 the First Methodist and Congregational Churches merged to become the Danby Federated Church. The two churches alternated service sites until 1974, when the members decided to preserve and refurbish the then 161-year old Congregational building and use it exclusively. The First Methodist Church no longer stands but a monument dedicated to it sits on the former site.

1816: The Swedenborgian Church (Church of the New Jerusalem) was organized at the Beers Settlement on the corner of Curtis Road and NYS Rt.96B. Dr. Lewis Beers preached at the church. The building no longer stands. A state marker denotes the site.

1826: The Christ Protestant Episcopal Church was established in South Danby near the Peter Road (also known as Episcopal Hill). The church, noted for its hexagonal windows, burned down; the exact date is uncertain.

1826: The Baptist Church of Danby was organized. Its building was used as a church until 1866 but, by 1896, the building had become the Town Hall and is still used as such today.

1830: The South Danby Methodist Episcopal Church was established. The congregation disbanded in the early 1940s and its building was briefly used as a community center before George Peter converted it to a private home. It is currently owned by Doug and Kathy Reasor.

1869: The West Danby United Methodist Church was organized. The congregation remained active until 1998. Its building was sold to Jim and Toni Iocavelli in 2002 and he, along with a team of dedicated workers, has restored its state of grandeur.

Many service organizations centered around church life then as they do now. At the turn of the 20th century in Danby, these organizations included the *Danby Young Peoples Society of Christian Endeavor* and the *King's Daughters* (which still meet).

In West Danby, young people's social activities centered around the Danby Pioneer Grange #230, at the corner of Valley View Road and Maple Avenue. The grange was organized in 1874 and was in use until it burned to the ground in the 1980s.

By 2000, religious influence had waned in Danby; only two active churches remain: the First Baptist Church in West Danby and the Federated Church in Danby.

FIRE STATION BIDDING

The Danby Fire District will be soliciting bids for additions and renovations to its fire station, located at 1780 Danby Road. Formal notice to bidders will be published in the *Ithaca Journal* and building trade publications on approximately March 9, 2009.

Bids on the original design, in October, 2008, were well in excess of the amount approved by voters at our February 2008 referendum. The building committee has been working with the architect since October to develop a design that will suit our requirements and still meet our approved cost objective. The current plan is for a bid opening in early April and a start of construction in Spring 2009.

Supervisor's Update

As I write, some of us are in New York City at the annual meeting of the Association of Towns. We're trying to get a heads up on our direction for this coming year. If any of you are wondering where your money might be going, here is an overview of how Danby hopes to spend some of it.

- Construction/rehabilitation of low/moderate income housing. A high priority for Central and West Danby Hamlets, and throughout the Town. This needs interagency, municipal, and county coordination and will be submitted as part of a combined County package.
- Energy efficiency. Public buildings need window upgrades, insulation, and lighting. Town Hall: \$35,000; Town Highway Facility: \$56,000.
- Renewable Energy. Supplementary solar heating system for Town Hall and Town Highway Facility: \$72,000.
- Transportation Infrastructure. Repairs to Bald Hill Road (to Station Road) and the whole of Yaple Road. Combined total \$1,065,000.
- Broadband (high speed) Internet. Deploy a rural broadband system for the Town of Danby. \$620,000.
- Green-Fleet. We're working with the County on a proposal promoting alternative fuels and transportation.
- Public Water/Sewer infrastructure. A staged project to replace water lines, hydrants, and meters, refurbish the existing tank, and install a new well and tank. \$1,355,000.
- Fire Station. Enlarge facility to add two new truck bays and replace the existing generator. General upgrades to allow the existing facility to function as an emergency facility for the Town. \$600,000.
- Town Highway Dep't Salt Shed. A covered shed for the storage and mixing of deicing materials. \$450,000.

Some of these projects could be phased in over several years. Public hearings will be held in the near future.

Broadband Internet is an important item. We've been working on this project for a couple of years; last year,

the State funded a similar proposal from the Town of Dryden. Given the foundation that has already been laid for this project, and seeing that there is support at the County, State, and Federal levels, it could come back to us soon.

Many of you have asked me to pursue a high speed Internet infrastructure, and I know that there many residents are concerned about the impact this might have on the Town; it is possible that the equipment could be "colocated" on existing towers.

As reported in the *Ithaca Journal*, Danby is cooperating with other municipalities to form the Greater Tompkins County Municipal Health Insurance Consortium. Representatives of an independent consulting firm will be at the March agenda meeting to answer questions from the Town.

The Town Board has been given information on exemptions for veterans; after review, this item will be placed on the Board agenda.

The Hamlet Revitalization documents will be returning to the Town, and will be available for your review.

Watch the Town sign board, web site, and area news for information on upcoming meetings.

February Town Board Meetings

The Federal economic stimulus bill was the subject of a lengthy discussion during the Town Board's Agenda meeting on February 2. At the time, there was a nationwide scramble to submit items for possible funding from the US Congress.

Supervisor Ric Dietrich reported on a briefing in Ithaca—attended by government officials from most municipalities in Tompkins County—by Congressman Maurice Hinchey. He described considerable uncertainty and confusion as to what kind of projects might be eligible for funding, while at the same time indicating urgency about submitting proposed projects. There was some emphasis on "shovel-ready" items.

The Board considered items including reconstruction and paving of the Bald Hill/Station Road connector between Danby and West Danby, a salt barn for the Highway Department, a housing rehabilitation proposal, broadband Internet expansion, water tank replacement in the West Danby Water District, shared fuel distribution station for Highway and Fire Departments, and energy upgrades at the Town Hall.

Also at the Agenda meeting, a resolution was passed which designated "West Jersey Hill Road" as the official name of the road that has been known by several names including "Dug Road." Further, Ted Crane was approved to be the Town's new webmaster, subject to successful negotiation of an agreement.

At the Regular Town Board meeting, it was announced that the Town has successfully petitioned the NYS DOT to reduce the speed limit on NYS Rt.96B through Danby, and to extend the zone of reduction. The new speed will be 40mph and will begin north of Miller Road.

The Board passed a resolution, proposed by Gene Beavers, directing the Water District to collaborate with the Fire District on the use of fire hydrants. There will be at least two hydrant training sessions a year, preferably in conjunction with the biennial system flushing, and the water district will provide training on the proper use and limitations of the water system. Beavers will also meet with engineers from TG Miller to evaluate hydrants which were recently found to be frozen and unusable.

Frank Proto, the Danby-Caroline representative to the Country Legislature reported that the deadline for applications for land to be considered for agricultural assessment is upcoming. He and urged those eligible to beat the April 1 deadline.

The Board approved a \$2000 request to the County for Danby Fun Day funding. The money would come from a fund, derived from room tax revenue, to promote and support tourism.

The Board also approved the agreement to spend highway funds. This agreement, between the Town Board and the Highway Superintendent, spells out how capital expenditures will be allocated in the coming year. Since the amount of State funding is uncertain this year, the agreement lists only one project: applying oil and stone to 2600 feet of Brown Road, north of the bridge. If more funding becomes available later in the year, the agreement can be modified by mutual consent.

Danby Community Council

At its meeting on February 9, the DCC recommended to the Town Board that Asher Hockett, the DCC treasurer, should be nominated by the Town for an open position on the Tompkins County Youth Services Board.

There was discussion of possible concert dates, places, and times. There was support for booking the Sim Redmond Band, perhaps for Danby Fun Day.

June Pollack, who handles the DCC scholarship program, reported little interest in scholarships this year. This program assists young people to participate in programs and training that they otherwise might not be able to afford. Since it adds to, rather than replaces, private funding, it is possible that parents are cutting out such optional but life-enriching activities altogether.

Scholarship funds have been used for camp attendance, dance lessons, voice training, and trip subsidies. The DCC will check with the programs that have included Danby youth on scholarship in the past, and with Laura Smith, the DCC youth program coordinator, for additional insight on the small number of scholarship requests. Be Fire Safe

My Dad used to say, "Some risks are unavoidable. Some risks are acceptable. Some risks are just plain stupid. The trick is to know which is which."

There are some things you just can't do much about. But the fact is, most fires are the result of human error. Here are nine good ways to avoid becoming a fire statistic:

1. Don't put something flammable near something hot unless you want it to burn.

Heat + Fuel + Oxygen = Fire

It's that simple.

Some dangerous examples include lamp shades that rest too close to the bulb, clothes or curtains too close to a radiator, or any flammable material close to a space heater. Store gasoline well away from your house.

- 2. Stay in the kitchen when you're cooking. More fires start in the kitchen than anyplace else, and they result in more injuries (though fewer fatalities). Never leave cooking unattended, including toasters and hotplates. Be sure to use microwave-proof dishes in the microwave. Keep towels, curtains and cookbooks away from open flames and never, *never* reach over an open flame to get to a back burner.
- 3. Never leave a candle unattended, not even, "Just for a minute." Candles cause hundreds of fires every year. Even with a safe holder, it doesn't take much for a pet or child to knock a candle over, or just nudge it too close to flammable materials. Use flashlights in emergencies, not candles.
- 4. Cigarettes are hazardous to your health in more ways than one. Cigarettes are another huge fire hazard. Smoking in bed is asking for trouble. Do your smoking sitting up. Leaving a pipe or cigarette unattended, or emptying ashtray contents before they are cold also causes hundreds of fires each year.
- 5. Use your fireplace or wood stove correctly: Fireplaces and wood stoves can be fire hazards when improperly installed or improperly used. Make sure your chimney is clear and clean before burning anything. Have it inspected regularly by a qualified professional. Never throw away ashes that aren't totally cool—even the tiniest smoldering coal could easily ignite flammable materials.
- 6. Don't use worn-out electric cords. Frayed or chewed cords start many house fires. Exposed electric wires can spark and ignite rugs or other flammable materials.

- 7. Don't overload your power strips. Overloaded power strips can also cause fire. When overloaded, they can spark. If they're anywhere near anything flammable... and in most homes they are....
- 8. Don't use a malfunctioning electrical appliance: Most of us own more than a few electrical gadgets, all of which can malfunction at any time. Sparks from faulty toasters, coffee makers, televisions, computer monitors, or any electrical appliance you could name can cause serious fires. Be sure to keep your appliance in good repair and if you're in doubt, don't use it.
- 9. Install smoke alarms on every floor and in every sleeping area. You've heard me say that before. You're going to hear it again. Smoke detectors won't prevent a fire, but they're life-savers if one gets started. Test them once a month. Change the batteries twice a year.

Help make Danby a fire-safe community by keeping yourself and your family fire-safe.

Kingsbury Preserve Opens in 2009

Sheela Kingsbury may be a new resident in Danby, but she's already given back to her neighbors in a big way. In January, 50 acres of woodland, including 6,000 feet of frontage along Lick Brook, were added to the Finger Lakes Land Trust's *Emerald Necklace*. The *Kingsbury Preserve* will open to the public in 2009 for hiking,

snowshoeing, and wildlife watching.



"I'm so excited about this, and grateful to the Land Trust for making it possible for us to protect the land for generations to come," Kingsbury says. "We look on this opportunity to give back to nature and our community with great appreciation and respect, and also with a sense of awe."

The Kingsbury tract is located on both sides of Jersey Hill Road in the Town of Danby; almost 12 acres on the

North side of the road and about 38 acres on the South side. Lick Brook runs through the middle of the property, which is characterized by forests of oak, maple, and beech, and some scattered white pines. The Southern portion of the Preserve also contains and protects the headwaters and feeder streams of Lick Brook. The Kingsbury gift represents the Land Trust's fifth project in the vicinity of Lick Brook. To date, the organization has permanently protected more than 300 acres in the area with 15,000 feet of frontage on the brook.

Work to develop a parking area and information kiosk at the Preserve entrance will begin this spring. The Land Trust will be looking for work volunteers. In particular, steps up a steep incline need to be built to access trails on the South side of Jersey Hill Road. Work days and field trips on the Kingsbury Preserve will be announced on the FLLT web site [www.fllt.org].

The speakers will be Ken Lynch of Summerhill Biomass Systems, an engineering company experimenting with powdered biomass for internal combustion machines, Matt McArdley and Tom Lindberg of Mesa Reduction, a company that uses biomass to co-fire with coal for electricity generation, and Ken White, a Danby entrepreneur involved with the development of Summerhill Biomass.

Biofuels are a local product that is locally produced and need a local market. Mesa Reduction is interested in possibly contracting for hay from the cooperative.

Ingredients

2 Tbsp corn oil

1 Tbsp cayenne pepper flakes

2 onions, chopped coarsely

1 Tbsp sesame oil

3 garlic cloves, minced

1 cup beer

2 cups bell peppers, chopped

1 Tbsp oregano

3 lbs beef, coarsely ground

4 Tbsp chili powder

2 lbs lamb, coarsely ground

34 cup tomato paste

1½ Tbsp salt

jalapeño peppers, cored, seeded and diced

Method

Heat oil in large heavy pot. Put in onions, garlic, and bell peppers. Cook until onions are translucent. Add meat. Add the beer, tomatoes, tomato sauce, spices, peppers, and sesame oil. Bring to a boil, then lower heat immediately and simmer for two hours, stirring frequently. Add tomato paste and simmer for another 30 minutes. Serves 8-10.
