The next event in the Danby Community Council's Concert Series will be a recital of 19th and 20th century piano music by Blaise Bryski, in the Danby Town Hall, 3pm on Sunday, May 3. The program will include works by Liszt, Chopin, Opel, and Monk.

Bryski is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and holds a Master of Fine Arts degree from the California Institute of the Arts and a PhD in 18th century performance practice from Cornell, where he studied with Malcom Bilson. He has performed locally with Ensemble X, and has been a member of Mother Mallard (the world's oldest synthesizer band) for

the past eight years. He recently was featured in the 250th birthday Clementi Keyboard Extravaganza in New York.

Admission is free. The concert series receives grant support from the Community Arts Partnership of Tompkins County.

A coalition of local groups is sponsoring a public meeting, 7-9pm on Wednesday, May 6, in the Women's Community Building, 100 West Seneca Street, Ithaca. Dr. William Pammer, the Sullivan County Commissioner of Planning and Environmental Management, will describe the work of the Sullivan County Task Force.

In addition, Dr. Stephen Penningroth, the Director of Ithaca's Community Science Institute, will talk about why and how private water wells should be tested so that, should contamination occur, land owners can discover problems and have solid scientific evidence of pre-drilling, baseline water data. Dr. Penningroth believes that between 1 and 5 percent of drinking water can reasonably be expected to become contaminated near drilling sites.

GAS DRILLING MEETING Submitted by Ric Dietrich

Over two thousand Tompkins County land owners, and thousands more in the surrounding Southern Tier, have signed leases to permit Marcellus Shale gas drilling on their property. Many expect to see drilling begin later this year, perhaps as early as summer.

While some welcome the drilling and others dread it, a common concern for all is the protection of our clean water and air, our land, and our quality of life.

NY State Environmental Conservation Law Article 23 eliminated the ability of towns and counties to regulate most aspects of gas drilling activity within their borders. This leaves many local legislators and community members wondering what they can do to protect their natural resources and infrastructure.

Sullivan County (NY) formed a Drilling Task Force to answer this question. A group of officials spent months researching the possible impacts and the authority of local municipal governments.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

The Town has looked to residents to help advise and help on a variety of projects and committees. The list seems endless: Senior Citizens, DEMPC, Beautification Committee, the Food Bank, Recreation Partnership, the Danby Area News, our web site, Hamlet Revitalization, Task Force on land use regulation, Trails, Danby Land Bank Cooperative, Danby Pond, and more. All of these are in addition to the Planning Board, BZA, Community Council, and our Volunteer Fire Department. Thank you all, your dedication to service to the Town is invaluable.

So where am I going with this? The Town would like additional help in some needed areas. An annual townwide clean up. This is a big project and needs our neighborhoods to organize and map out a strategy. A second project is an inventory of all the gas leases on Danby properties.

The first project has already been taken up by some local groups. The Danby Pirates Club picks up regularly along South Danby Road, and some of the Colleges have taken sections of our State highways. This is a town-wide concern and any input you can give to help us organize this project will be welcome.

The second area of concern, gas leases, will need attention from individual residents. Recent conferences on gas exploration and drilling have raised concerns about the protection of our aquifer, our roads, viewscapes, historical sites, and cemeteries. The Town has been informed that it needs to take steps to protect these valuable resources within the town. It can pass local laws to require major users to post a bond against possible damages to the roads.

For instance, if we knew that there were fifteen leases on South Danby Road, we could enter into one type of agreement with Tompkins County and Tioga County, since this road is a County responsibility. In order to bond the road we need to work with these entities to have an upto-date assessment of the present road condition. These agreements take time and money to implement.

For roads that are the Town's responsibility, it means asking our highway department to conduct an inventory and assessment so we can bond for potential damages. Each road is assessed differently and bonded accordingly. It is cost-prohibitive to do this throughout the Town; we need a better idea of where the present leases are to take measures to protect these sensitive areas. It would be a tremendous help to our Highway Department to know which roads will receive the most traffic, so they can limit their assessment to those roads.

I have seen Town roads in Tioga and Broome Counties that were destroyed by trucking related to gas drilling. Our most expensive and valuable Town resource is our roads, and we have to safeguard these assets. Please understand this request in the context of protecting not only your own, but your neighbor's investments. Our roads take the largest portion of your tax dollars. Thank you for participating in this vital request.

West Danby Water Study

During its April meeting, the Town Board agreed to contract with T.G.Miller, an Ithaca-based engineering firm, for services, to evaluate the condition of the West Danby Water District's 40 year-old components. Councilperson Gene Beavers, one of the water district's residents, has led the effort to take stock of the system's condition, so future investments can reasonably be anticipated and prioritized.

An engineering report will enable the Town to take advantage of future funding opportunities. If inadequacies are found, the firm will recommend changes, complete with estimated costs. The report will also include cost estimates for the additional water tank and well that the County Health Department has requested. The T.G.Miller contract cost will not to exceed \$11,800.

Appointments and Upcoming Meetings

Alan Wagner, a real estate appraiser and large landowner in the town of Danby, was appointed to the Board of Zoning Appeals, but there is still one vacancy on the BZA. Ted Melchen, a Planning Board member whose term expired in December, was reappointed unanimously to the Planning Board.

Town residents are invited to serve on the Board of Assessment Review. This Board consists of two residents, a representative of the County Assessment Department, and the local member of the County Legislature. Local residents who believe their real estate assessments are unfair may make their case to an audience of peers. A new fee schedule for zoning and building permit applications will be the subject of a Public Hearing at 6:30pm on Monday, May 4.

Aquifer Study Progress Report

Todd Miller, project chief of the Upper Buttermilk Creek/Danby Creek Valley Aquifer Study, recently submitted a progress report. The three-year study is now in its final year. So far, data from 118 wells, including 4 test wells, has have been compiled. The well data, mostly derived from drilling logs, is supplemented by seismic refraction surveys. These surveys use explosives to generate signals and geophones to record echoes. Water quality is also being assessed with a sampling and analysis regime.

The emerging picture shows a fairly extensive, but thin and confined, aquifer. An aquifer is confined when overlying layers of poor permeability limit its ability to recharge from surface water. Test well yields ranged from virtually zero to 30 gallons per minute, but the 30gpm flow (at the Highway Department work area) was not sustained over time; it dropped to 5-10gpm after an hour.

One more test well may be drilled this year, and the "potentiometric surface" of the groundwater aquifer will be measured. Because the aquifer is confined, the potentiometric surface is sometimes above ground level (wells that tap the aquifer at these locations are artesian or flowing wells). Measuring the surface will also allow mapping the direction of water flow.

A completed report will be written in 2010 and will describe the general characteristics of the aquifer, how it interacts with overlying groundwater and streams, and information on its quality.

Other Board Activity

Carl Seamon, Town Highway Superintendent, was given permission to address a major engine problem (possibly a blown head gasket) with the Town's grader. Repairs are estimated to cost around \$6000.

Ric Dietrich, Town Supervisor, reported that the TC Council of Governments is arranging a collaboration between the SPCA and the Cornell's Vet School that would reduce the cost of services for dog management.

Frank Proto, the Danby-Caroline representative to the County Legislature, reported that he is proposing an exemption for cord wood and pellet fuel from the County's portion of sales tax, and he hopes the State will do likewise. At \$200 a cord, tax savings would be \$8 for each portion of the sales tax. Proto also indicated that new radios, promised by the County to the Highway Department so it can get on the new 800MHz emergency communication network, will soon be delivered.

A BEACON IN THE NIGHT Submitted by Linda Wyatt

Imagine this. It's 3:30am and the loud beeping from your pager is a voice in the night, waking you because there is an emergency. You throw your clothes on in a hurry, hope you get your shoes on the right feet, and rush out your door.

You drive to the fire station, get in the rescue truck, and head out into the night with lights and siren. It's raining. Maybe it's foggy. Or maybe there's snow.

At the address you're heading to, someone is having trouble breathing. Maybe they also have chest pain. It might be a heart attack. You feel the urgency.

You make the last turn, onto the correct road, and quickly look at the first mailbox to see its the number. *You can't see it.*

You slow down, hoping to see the next one, and it's not readable either. There's not another house in sight, so you drive on through the night. With houses that are way off the road or hidden by trees, and no reflective sign, you can't always see where the houses *are*, let alone their number.

The next house might have a number you can see, but it's not the one you're looking for. You keep going, and have to slow down at every house, until finally, you get close, and you creep along, because you can't miss even one of the numbers, since it might be The One. If you miss it and drive past, there may not be anywhere the rescue truck can turn around for a long way.

It feels like it takes forever to drive a distance that should take only a couple of minutes. By the time you reach the house, the patient has stopped breathing.

Please. Don't let this happen to any of us—or to you.

Make sure that your house number is readable from the road; not just from right in front of your house, but for at least 100 feet in either direction along the road. We need to be able to see it before we get to you. Make sure that your neighbors—three houses on either side of you—have readable numbers, too. Best of all, of course, would be for every house to have a number sign. If we know the numbers are there to see, we don't have to slow down at all—until we get to you.

A reflective sign can be a beacon guiding us to you. The Danby Volunteer Fire Company can provide you with a large, reflective sign with your street number on it. We'll even install it for you. The cost is a measly \$12 (\$5 more buys a post, too).

Please get one of these signs. Don't stop there: get everyone in your neighborhood to get one, too. If you have a neighbor with a limited income, consider getting one for them. Your sign also helps us find your neighbor; your neighbor's sign helps us find you. To order a sign, contact Neal Franklin at 607.273.3831 or [ifv@lightlink.com]. Do it today. SPECIAL NEEDS WORKSHOP Submitted by Bev Fitzpatrick

On March 30, Danby Volunteer Fire Company hosted a talk on autism spectrum disorders, given by Dr. Karen Fried from the Franziska Racker Centers. The Centers provides intensive services to pre-schoolers with autism and to their families. Dr. Fried is a local psychologist and Centers' Director of Autism Services and head of its Partnership Program.

Dr. Fried geared her presentation to include strategies and advice for first responders who may be faced with an emergency situation involving an individual with autism. There were many questions, leading to a lively discussion by the community members and Fire and Rescue workers in attendance.

Dr. Fried's advice included tips on developing a rapport and seeking cooperation in a rescue setting. She shared thoughts for both the Fire and Rescue volunteers and families about how to be prepared in an emergency situation. In addition, Dr. Fried spoke about the importance of finding out what motivates people on the autism spectrum, in order to gain their trust and cooperation quickly in an emergency and how to best communicate with them. Dr. Fried also suggested that emergency vehicles should contain a book of pictures to assist communication with individuals who have difficulty with spoken language.

Dr. Fried commended the Danby Fire and Rescue for being among the first of its kind to request this type of information and for fostering a partnership with the Centers that promises to have great future potential.
