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Town Clerk's Desktop

Ah June—the skies are blue, roses are in bloom, tomato and green pepper plants are in the ground, the strawberries have been picked and the raspberries are beginning to ripen. This can only mean one thing in a Town Clerk's office. It's marriage season.

We issued more than half of this year's marriage licenses during the month of June—two of them on one day! If prior experience is any sign, Sue McLellan and I will issue several more before the summer is over.



One year has passed since New York passed a domestic relations law that extended the legal right to marry to include, without exception, persons of the same or different gender. We have seen an increase in the number of marriage licenses issued in the Danby Town Clerk's office since that time. Fourteen marriage licenses were issued to couples during 2011, nine of which were issued after July 25

(the first date that a same sex couple could apply). Eight marriage licenses have been issued so far in 2012. This is up from just five in the same time period of 2011.

In fact, we've seen a gradual increase in the number of marriage licenses issued in our town over the past several years. Between 2007 and 2009 only six or seven marriage licenses were issued per year. During 2010, that number jumped to eleven, with couples wanting to take advantage of the opportunity to get married in October (10/10) and especially on or near October 10 (10/10/10). Since the change in the domestic relations law we have issued 17 marriage licenses, four of which (or roughly 25%) were to same gender couples. That ratio is in keeping with other parts of Tompkins County, according to a recent article in the Ithaca Journal.

By way of reminder, a couple who intend to be married in New York State must apply in person for a marriage license, to any Town Clerk in the state. At least two forms of ID are required—a photo ID and a birth certificate—for all potential spouses. If either person has previously been married, we need documentation of how that marriage ended. Although the marriage license is issued immediately, there is a waiting period of 24 hours before the ceremony may take place. A marriage license is valid for 60 days, beginning the day after the license was issued.

Once the ceremony has been completed, the license is returned to the Town Clerk's office and a legal Certificate of Marriage is issued. Keep this document safe. It can be important later in life, particularly when applying for retirement benefits. Additional Transcripts of Marriage may be issued to the wedded couple, if proof of marriage is needed for other legal purposes.

-Whether it's Summer, Fall, Winter, or Spring, any couple intending to wed in the State of New York can get their marriage license at the Danby Town Hall during our regular hours. From now through Labor Day, those hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, 10am-5pm. If it is impossible to visit the office during those hours, I will issue a marriage license by appointment; call 607.277.4788.

I look forward to doing my small part in helping couples become formally and legally wedded to each other. Indeed, it is one of my biggest joys.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

The Town of Danby is definitely busy with paperwork, and preparing grant applications isn't the least of it. Given our lean resources, our staff has been further stretched by the recent changeover—theirs, not ours from HSBC Bank to First Niagara.

The West Danby Water Commission and the Town are working diligently on a project seeking multiple grants to update the aging West Danby water system.

Even after delivery of several major components for the Highway Barn's new wood boiler, the project has had to have some installation details redesigned, leading to change orders and an update to the paperwork for the grant that is funding the project. We've heard the grant will cover virtually all of the cost of the changes.

There's also a lot of desk work related to our plan, approved by the Town Board, to install solar electric panels at Town Hall. These panels won't cost the Town anything, and will allow us to maintain a level and predicatable electric cost for many years. The preliminary tasks leading up to union negotiations are taking our time, too.

The County's Broadband effort has finished its telephone survey of county residents. It is moving to hire a consultant, who will hopefully take the project to the point where bids for implementation can be requested.

I have not had a new meeting on the proposed trail to Banks Road, but have had several meetings with seven of our fellow municipalities to gain bargaining power by negotiating a joint cable-TV agreement with Time-Warner. The Town Board has already authorized me to proceed with an audit (at no cost to the Town!) of Time-Warner's fee collection as a first step in this process.

All of these projects have a great deal going on, and I am just skimming over the tops of the waves in this description.

The broadband proposal is a good example, as there are several different paths I am tracking here. Working with the County, we brought together local volunteers —the best in the field, both public and private sectors. We are focusing on the *last mile*, where topography, distance, and population density makes any hard-wired solution untenable (or, in the case of large utilities like as Time-Warner or Verizon, unprofitable). The group's goal is a system based largely on fixed wireless communication, similar to what Dryden is building. We met and discussed—for a year—a definition of the problem and then a path to to follow into the future. We presented our findings to the County Legislature, who proceeded to legitimize the committee and reinforce its position. Our next goal is to compile this data and put the project out to bid.

At the same time, though, we are looking how a broadband implementation might play out as standalone item in Danby. What would happen if we ask residents to work together with the Town and a local provider to directly create a build-out? Perhaps we could increase our Time-Warner franchise fee to 5% and use the income to create a model that includes fewer-than-usual houses per mile. Or we could ask residents if they would like to contribute toward this build-out, outside their tax dollars. Or some combination.

The problems so far have been cost. The County's already-built communication towers that could greatly reduce the cost of the infrastructure needed to implement a fixed wireless system, if they could be used as its central communication backbone...but the likelihood of getting permission to use these towers is greater if the County "owns" the project. A public/private partnership could be the cheapest way, either as a County or Town project.

Please share your thoughts, all potentialities being considered.

TRANSPORTATION OPTIONS SURVEY

Tompkins County, Way2Go (a program at Tompkins County Cornell Cooperative Extension), and other local transportation partners are collaborating with national transportation innovator ITNAmerica to research the potential of implementing ITNEverywhere in this area. The goal is to build upon existing services to provide new ways for people to get rides, share rides, help each other, save money, and use less energy.

To measure local interest, Danby residents, 18 years of age or older, are invited to complete an online survey that asks about their transportation habits, preferences, and interests concerning potential services. Individuals who complete the survey are entered into a drawing to win \$50 or one of six \$20 Wegmans gift cards.

Kelly leaned back in her chair at the zoning office, put her feet up on the desk and wondered if she might like to try something new and different; something a bit outrageous on her own account. She considered the prospect that perhaps she had underestimated this little community and that maybe it was more ready for selfexpression and risk taking than she would have ever imagined, even in her wildest dreams.

Some days later, Pierce opened Kelly's Email with some trepidation. He was pleasantly surprised that she lauded his creativity and courage. At one point he had thought that, at his age, that there was nothing further he could accomplish. Now, Pierce realized that he would want to keep learning for as long as he lived. He had revealed himself and nothing else would be quite so important again. There were no barriers preventing him from being himself and that, he reasoned, was a good thing.

Kelly wanted to agree, but she wasn't so sure. On some level she knew that people like Pierce made others feel less safe and secure. Kelly wondered if she dared make her own fantasy a reality on the very next Danby Fun Day. If Pierce could do it, why couldn't she? Amelia Earhart had always been an inspiration to her. Why not? What did she have to lose?

Pierce enjoyed great popularity following his exhibition at The Danby Fun Day, receiving several pats on the back, Emails, and an invitation to speak at Ms. Dayton's global class during its study of the French Revolution. Dressed as the magnificent monarch and speaking impeccable French—a skill few in town knew that he possessed—Pierce captivated his adolescent audience.

Some wondered if fun had something to do with truth or if truth could be fun. It was too difficult to think about. Pierce was already contemplating his next Fun Day as Lucille Ball, the queen of comedy.

It was a lesson for everybody who had ever had a dream, and Pierce had accomplished something singlehandedly that most only think about and never dare to do. No one threw garbage on his lawn again or screamed unpleasantness while whizzing by at 60mph. One does not do such things to a local treasure, to an unusual and unique 'character'.

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GAS DRILLING UPDATE: GETTING THE WORD OUT Submitted by Jennifer Tiffany and Kelly Morris

Visit the GDTF booth at Danby Fun Day to learn more about shale gas extraction and getting the word out!

Danby stands in a good position to share its views and its model laws with other towns looking to forestall harmful impacts from shale gas development. Many feel that the best option is a statewide ban or moratorium, which would provide equal protection to all municipalities. However, if NY State adopts a policy allowing drilling but respecting local laws and comprehensive plans, Danby can serve as a resource by getting the word out about what we have put into place and why it is a priority to adopt well-developed local laws protecting public health, safety, infrastructure, environmental quality, and economic vitality.

Members of the GDTF joined a phone bank calling elected officials all over New York State, encouraging them to sign a letter to Governor Cuomo, composed by Dominic Frongillo (Town of Caroline) and other local elected officials. The letter endorses a continued moratorium on hydraulic fracturing in New York State until three studies have been conducted: a comprehensive health impact assessment of the entire shale gas extraction process; a revised and properly thorough analysis that considers all potentially negative socioeconomic impacts; and a revised and properly thorough study of cumulative impacts.

The letter was presented to Governor Cuomo at a press conference in Albany on June 4. To date, over 300 elected officials across New York State have signed the letter. We can reach out to many of those officials to encourage them to develop a safety net of ordinances and comprehensive plans in their localities at the same time as supporting the statewide moratorium. SAFE POOLS MAKE SUMMER COOL Submitted by Matt Cooper, Danby Code Office

It's getting mighty hot out there, so most of us are thinking about all the ways we can cool off. To that end, you might be considering installing a swimming pool.

Pools that are more than 24" deep require a building permit. The NYS Building Code tries to anticipate and prevent problems by establishing safety standards for construction. Knowing that pools are a leading cause of drowning and electrical accidents, the Building Code includes the following safety measures to guide you to a safe installation:

- You'll need a 48" high barrier or fence with a selfclosing and self-latching gate
- The gate must be lockable or at least equipped with a child-proof latch
- Suction outlets need to be designed to prevent user entrapment
- Virtually all pools are required to have a pool alarm that sounds both at the pool and inside the residence.

In the case of aboveground pools that are greater than 48" in depth, the pool itself can serve as the barrier so long as the ladder or other access to the pool is removable, lockable, or otherwise capable of being secured to prevent access.

Pools that have any electrical device (lights, pump, heater, etc.) attached to them are required to be certified by a thirdparty electrical



inspector. If you're having the pool installed by professionals, they'll almost certainly know about the requirements for GFCIs, equipotential bonding, and the like.

While this isn't a complete list, it should give you an idea of what's required to have a safe and legal pool installation. The 32-acre pond, located off Bald Hill Road, is the headwaters of Buttermilk Falls. It is also part of the "Continental Divide of the Eastern US", with waters draining both north (to the St.Lawrence Seaway) and south (to Chesapeake Bay). Although operated by the Town of Danby, it's a part of NY State Park system.

The pond is surrounded by picturesque woods and is habitat for Canada Geese and Great Blue Heron. It offers fishing, picnicking with grills, boating (bring your own), and free swimming with lifeguards.

A hiking trail from the parking lot leads around the pond, through large, old trees and native wildflowers. From the back of the pond, you get to see even more birds and aquatic creatures.

The swimming area is open seven days a week, from June 23 until Labor Day. Its hours are 1-7pm on weekdays and Sunday, and until 8pm on Saturday. It's great for the whole family! Come and enjoy a swim! Ś
