Next year, maybe there'll be two dueling trebuchets in Danby's Punkin' Chunkin' Brigade? Contact [trebuchet@danbycc.org].


DCC CONCERT: VIOLIN RECITAL


Town Clerk's Desktop

Providing Information

In many small Towns across New York, the role of a Town Clerk includes responsibilities as the Public Information Officer. PIOs are messengers for government agencies, delivering information to elected officials, residents and citizens, and the media. The news we share can be anything from emergency information to fun facts about recreational opportunities. My monthly

column in the Danby Area News is just one facet of my work providing public information.



of public hearings, and preliminary and final information about the Town Budget.

Some of this information is becoming even more accessible through an inter-municipal electronic records storage project. Older Town minutes, from 1967 through 2009, have been scanned and are now stored electronically (minutes from 2010 through the present are already stored both in digital and archival paper form.) The original copies of the older minutes have been kept, stored (for the most part) on archival paper.

While the electronic copies provide additional access, the primary reason for the scanning project is to create a backup to protect against accidental destruction of records, perhaps by an unpredictable natural disaster. This same process will soon be accomplished with other documents, such as building permits, which need to be kept forever.

Town Clerks provide a variety of information needed to maintain our quality of life. People come to us with all sorts of questions. Individuals and property lawyers ask for property tax information throughout the year. Every week, we do our best to answer a range of questions about property records, dates for hunting seasons, what to do when a dog is running loose, what documenta-

tion is required to get a marriage license, and even how to get a handicap parking permit!

But there is other, fun information about our town. We have information about the Danby Community Park and the Danby Community Council's upcoming concerts and events. You can pick up general information about programs such as Solarize Tompkins, Tompkins 211, waste management/recycling, and youth programming. Conservation easement information—both from the Finger Lakes Land Trust and from Danby's own Conservation Advisory Council—is available. And even general historical information.

Bike Maps

The newest pamphlet to go into our information rack, located right next to the Clerk's window, is a full color bike map of Tompkins County. The map, created by the Ithaca-Tompkins Transportation Council and the Convention and Visitors Bureau, is color coded for onroad bicycle suitability. Many of the roads in Danby are rated good to very good, and a few are rated excellent! The ratings were created for the average cyclist. This is a great way to plan your ride and really see Danby.

Hours and (sigh) Taxes

In December, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. When tax collection begins in January, Saturday hours will increase by one hour to 10am-1pm. As always, the Clerk's is closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And yes, there's plenty of chocolate in the bowl by the Clerk's office window.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

As you read this final report for 2013, please bear in mind that the County budget is on top of our agenda and hopefully will be finalized very quickly.

The final numbers that will come out indicate that the approximate County tax levy increase will be 2.95% with a County-wide average tax rate increase of approximately 1.34% and an increase of 1.31% in local spending. That translates to an approximate increase on a median priced home assessed at \$163,000 of \$14.81.

Please remember this is a maintenance-of-services budget. There still can be tweaks, but I suspect our numbers will stay pretty much in this range. Thanks to all of you who spoke at the recent public hearings to encourage us to include particular items on the Advocacy Center, and the Big Brothers/Big Sisters programs.

The decision on retaining the psychiatric centers in Elmira and Binghamton is still pending! However, pressure from client's families and our legislature has resulted in some movement on those psychiatric centers being retained. A big thank you to those of you who contacted our State legislators, but I would suggest keeping the pressure on.

The effort we have been making on the youth jobs issue is still ongoing between TST-BOCES and our own Youth Services Department. I am hoping that we will be able to

work with the TST-BOCES Advisory Board to continue to work towards a successful end.

Although there have been some issues regarding the Affordable Healthcare Act, and signing up for insurance, it was recently reported that many of those issues are not affecting New York State. Folks who have enlisted the aid of navigators have had a reasonably successful time in determining their healthcare needs, and applying for insurance. I would urge you to continue in this vein.

As a reminder, please make sure you complete your initial enrollment or renewal enrollment in the Basic STAR program. If you fail to renew you may lose this exemption. Also, as a reminder, anyone receiving Enhanced STAR benefits is not affected by this change. Should you have a question please call the County Assessment Department at 607.274.5517.

At the Health and Human Services Committee meeting earlier this month, Frank Kruppa, the Health Department Director, reported that the new Community Health Improvement Plan is moving through the Department well. The priorities that have been selected will affect all of us and, once finalized, please review it and contact the County Health Department with your comments and concerns.

The Danby Town Board will seek applications for several Boards, including a seven year term on the Planning Board, five year terms on the Board of Zoning Appeals and the West Danby Board of Water Commissioners, two year terms on the Conservation Advisory Council and a two year term representing Danby on the Environmental Management Council and Youth Services Board. Two seats open for one year terms on a Board of Assessment Review. The Town Board will also review applications for persons interested in serving as Town Webmaster and Town Historian (one year term).

Persons interested in serving in these capacities should fill out an application (available at the Town Clerk's office) or write a letter of intent listing professional, educational, or other experience that would assist the applicant in serving and answering the following questions: Why you are interested in this position and what you hope to accomplish in this position. SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

I think it's OK—it's surely polite—to say, "Thank You," to the impressive numbers of Danby residents who came out to vote last month. That's the true democratic process at work. Thank you one and all for caring so much about the town that you live in.

In other news, our annual Town budget is approved and done with. It's always a challenge to meet expenses and even to reduce costs. I do think we have one of the best budgets around. Thanks to the cooperative team spirit from all involved.

Our boiler project at the Town Highway Barns is up and moving again. Last winter did not allow enough time to get the system we put in place to become fully operational. It is unusual to get it just right the first time when you are making reality with something fresh off the drawing board.

We have found several different areas of concern and at present we are working with our contractors to address these issues. Something to talk about this winter.

I have been asked the question, "How complicated can it be?"

When you think about your average wood stove, wood or pellets go in, produce the desired heat, and smoke goes up the chimney. Ours is a bit more complicated for a number of reasons. The biggest reason is the sheer volume of space to be heated, and then there's the recovery time when doors are opened to move trucks in and out of facility. We're also concerned about the burn efficiency, to create very low emissions into the community.

I am still committed to Danby being a leader in alternatives to fossil fuels and a center for dispersing information gained from our efforts. It is a work in progress right now.

The Town Board will meet three times during December: two regular meetings and one more to deal with year-end budget adjustments.

Some interesting stuff for us this year, as we will be seating three new Board members, not the usual two. The new Board will appoint one of the three to fill a vacant seat. Changes in the structure of our Boards, including new chairs, will set the stage for a discussion of our goals for 2014.

Meanwhile, there is still much to do in the garden. I've really fallen behind in my duties there; the compost

piles need turning, the deer are having a great time with my apples, and can someone tell me how they can eat Chestnuts? Have you ever even tried to pick one up?

As I write, the big Turkey day is still on the horizon. I am definitely looking forward to it. When you read this, it will already be in the past; I hope it was everything you wanted it to be!

CAC UPDATE

With the development of a template for negotiating conservation easements in the Town, the Conservation Advisory Council has reached a milestone in its evolution. While that might not sound very exciting, it was a long and careful process to reach this point, and it positions the CAC to actively seek conservation easements on Danby properties. The easement template can be found on the CAC page of the Town of Danby's web site [town.danby.ny.us/CAC].

The CAC's objective is to protect as much open space in Danby from development as possible while, at the same time, minimally restraining the use of the protected land. The restrictions included in the template agreement are there to prevent degradation of the land resource. They mostly address the main threat to the land, erosion.

Most Danby residents share the desire to keep Danby rural, and if we work together, we can make it happen. For landowners who share this goal, protecting their land by restricting future development is a commitment to generations to come.

The CAC is striving to minimize the cost of ceding development rights, limiting them to the actual transaction costs. If you have an up-to-date survey the costs

can be minimal, indeed. If necessary, we will fundraise to help anyone needing assistance with these costs. We are not just out to get easements on large properties, either (although we certainly hope to get owners of large parcels to participate). If you own a property in Danby's low density zone that can be further subdivided, we're interested.

But wait, won't giving up your development rights reduce the equity in your land? In most of the rest of the world it might but, here in Tompkins County, properties protected by conservation easements have a history of selling for as much as comparable unprotected properties. That means you probably won't get any property tax break, but you will probably be eligible for a NY State tax credit against the property taxes (including Town, County, and School taxes!) you pay on easement-protected land: 25 percent of the amount paid, up to a total of \$5000, or your tax liability, whichever is lower. The Town loses no revenue, since the credit is against the taxes you paid, not a reduction in what you owe in local taxes.

The tax incentive will almost certainly cover the cost of donating the easement, but it isn't the main reason for making the gift. Your gift is a gift to future generations of Danby residents and to the rural landscape we all love.

RE-REGISTER FOR NYS STAR PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

The state of NY is making all 2.7 million Basic STAR recipients re-register by the end of this year. In Tompkins County, about 19,500 recipients will need to re-register.

Letters were mailed to all "Basic STAR" recipients last summer. The letter provided a unique code that could be used to file an online application or, for those without Internet access, to identify the applicant to one the telephone operators.

Seniors receiving the "Enhanced STAR" exemption are not affected by this change, but they must continue to apply annually.

The Tompkins County Assessment office will have very limited ability to answer questions or register people outside of the online application. The phone number at the State to call is 518.457.2036.

The application deadline is December 31, 2013.

Master Gardener Training

The Master Gardener Program of Tompkins County Cornell Cooperative Extension is offering training, starting in January 2014. I was extremely honored to have read the Veterans Day Proclamation from Governor Andrew Cuomo on November 11—Veterans Day—in Ithaca's Dewitt Park.

I was approached by Ronda Catlin, a Veterans Day Committee member, who offered me this opportunity. Needless to say, I happily accepted. Ronda told me she felt I have been supportive of the committee's efforts and encouraged the community to show its respect and appreciation for our troops.

My Dad, Robert Gombash, is a proud World War II veteran who served in the Philippines. He lives in Texas and, at age 90, is still a funny man with a great sense of humor and a tremendously strong sense of patriotism. During the reading I thought of him and of my father-in-law, Harry Huddle, who was also a World War II veteran who passed many years ago. I also thought of all the families through the years who have waited at home, anxiously looking forward to the day that their deployed loved ones were safely back. I thought of families such as the Bordoni family of Ithaca, who

lost their beloved son, Christopher Bordoni, when he passed away from injures he suffered while serving in Afghanistan. Chris was 21 years old.

There were all ages of military personnel in the crowd on November 11, from young recruits to those aged 90 and beyond. There were military men and women. The Salvation Army band was there, as was the Patriot Guard riders. There was a young soldier sitting on the bench in tears, and some of us hovered around him trying to soothe him. He told us he had just spent four years as a soldier and the ceremony was just overwhelmingly meaningful to him. I told him he looked about 12, because he did. That got a little smile out of him!

I didn't write the words in the Proclamation, but it was very important to me to deliver them clearly and with feeling, and I believe I did that. Nervous as I was as I walked to the microphone, once the words started and I looked out into the crowd it all became amazingly easy.

This was an extraordinary experience.
