Installing new water meters in the District's households is now underway. As of January 14, 34 of the total of 112 meters have been installed.

Please respond, as scheduling a time to replace meters is the most difficult part of the job. The bid proposal for our new water tank will be going out during the week of January 19, with groundbreaking scheduled to begin sometime in late February or early March. There are two types of tanks included in the proposal, one a glass-fused-to-steel and the other



Changes in Dog License Fees

May I suggest a late New Year Resolution for all Danby Dog owners? Make sure that your animal is licensed, that their vaccines are up to date, and that you pay your dog license renewal on time. If you do, there is no change in license fee for a spay/neutered animal. But, starting this year, if you are more than two months late...you will pay more.



According to NYS Law, all dogs must be licensed. This is considered a health issue, for the benefit of both man and beast. Licensing dogs helps assure that all canine residents of the town are up to date on their vaccines, particularly rabies. License information also assists residents in dealing with problem or dangerous animals.

Dog licensing is also an attempt to monitor and maintain animal population control. Dog owners have an incentive to spay or neuter their animals, through a decreased cost in dog license fees.

During the past year, Danby and other municipalities in Tompkins County have reviewed their dog license fees with an eye toward consistency and "making ends meet." Dog license fees have not been raised in over five years, and do not come close to covering costs for license processing and animal control. After this review, during its Organizational Meeting on January 13, the Town Board voted to make changes to the dog license fee structure. Licenses had been \$20 per dog, with a discount to \$12 for spay/neutered pup. In 2014 that fee will increase to \$24 per unaltered dog but, as way to encourage animal population control, the fee for a spay/neutered animal remains at \$12.

Dog license renewal letters are sent to owners on the anniversary of the month in which the original dog license was issued. In previous years, the fee was the same whether you renewed the license on time...or six months later. We want to provide a firm economic incentive for dog owners to renew licenses on time. Starting this year, when a license is not renewed within two months of its expiration date, there will be a late fee of \$3 per month added to the license fee. This additional fee will help cover the extra mailing and processing costs of late renewals, and will not penalize responsible dog owners. According to our computer data base, at least 650 dogs are currently living in Danby. The Annual Town Clerk's Report for 2013 showed that 595 dog licenses were processed last year. We did better in 2012, with 636 renewals or new licenses. The good news: 90 percent of dog owners are responsible and (generally) timely in taking care of renewals. The bad news is that 8-9% of dog owners seem to ignore the annual renewal notice. This becomes a burden to the Town. Our hope is that this new policy will bring a better result for 2014.

In order to be as accessible as possible, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays in February and March. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. We will continue to collect taxes (in addition to processing dog license renewals, issuing handicap parking permits, and managing other town business) through March 31. January 31 was the last day to opt to pay taxes via the installment option. Taxes must now be paid in full, and a 1 percent penalty fee, per month, is added to the base amount.

Remember, Town Clerks only collect taxes, we don't decide what they are. I know that there's little I can do to make Winter better than it is, but I can promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses including plenty of dark chocolate. I look forward to seeing many of you during the cold days of February and March.

BROADBAND IN DANBY UPDATE Submitted by Ted Crane

The light at the end of the tunnel is getting a little bit brighter! Perhaps the tunnel is ending.

Since last month's update, the New York State grant awarded to Clarity Connect has taken two steps forward. Both the regional Economic Development Council and the Governor's office signed off (let's call that "approved") on the award.



More good news is that, still, Clarity is in the first batch of grants to be processed. But wait...Clarity still doesn't have a signed contract with the State, so no money is flowing into the installation pipeline.

Mid-February is as good a guess as any, for when things will begin to happen. It's taking longer than expected, but the light is getting brighter.

If you haven't yet, you can contact Clarity Connect via its web site to indicate interest in the future fixed wireless Broadband network. Clarity will use that information to prioritize the infrastructure installation (the more Danby-ites, the sooner we all get connected), and

to contact potential customers when signups are available. Now, if you have no Internet at all...you can't use the web site, so contact Clarity at 607.257.8268. \$

stainless steel. If all goes as scheduled, one or the other type will be up and operational by the end of June.

As this project gets closer to completion, the Commissioners are now going to take on the project of creating a document that will be our West Danby Water District By-Laws. This is now still in planning and we'll keep you posted as it progresses.

Please take care to ensure your pipes aren't exposed to severe cold; there'll probably be more before spring.

I mentioned last month that the new Town Board needs to fill a vacancy on the Town Board. This is a temporary seating, and there will be an election next November to choose a Councilperson for the remaining year of the open seat's term. This position has several candidates who will be interviewed and the seat will be filled by one of them. Because it's an urgent need, the choice will have been made before you even read this article.

Work on updating the Town's Comprehensive Plan has been ongoing. A public information session is planned, to review any and all changes being made, and then a formal public hearing. Please stay tuned for dates and times of these meetings.

Broadband, sounding like a broken record, is coming but just not yet. Like our Highway Barn Boiler project, there are lots of good, yet frustrating reasons why the inaugural party/celebration is delayed. It's just not there yet.

I guess you all have noticed the spurt in new home construction around the Town of Danby. There's more activity than there has been in the last three to four years...combined.

Everyone wants to move to Danby, or so it would appear, and perhaps the economy has improved to the point where moving and building has become possible. This is good for our tax base (it spreads the same load across more taxpayers) but problematic when we consider the Open Space goals in our Comprehensive Plan. All these issues are coming before our Boards during the coming month!

Fight the Frigid Weather Get a Free Audit

The winter months are here and the weather grows colder. Many homeowners, especially those living in drafty houses, begin feeling the pinch of high home heating prices. Fortunately, a new program from the New York State Energy Research Development Authority (NY-SERDA) can help people increase the energy efficiency of their houses and save money on utility bills.

The Home Performance Energy Efficiency Program offers free energy assessments of homes by accredited contractors. After the assessment, the program helps homeowners through the process of financing their home improvements with grants (up to \$5,000 for single-family dwelling that eligible homeowners do not have to pay back, \$10,000 for multiple family homes) or low-interest loans.

"We can help people make their homes warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer, while saving money on their utility bills," said Euphemia Martin, the program's Regional Outreach Director for the Southern Tier. "And people often find that their health improves after an energy retrofit, because ventilation problems, gas leaks, mold, and mildew are also taken care of in the process."



Ask the Digital Doctor

Question: What's this I read in the news, about refrigerators being used to send spam Email?

Answer: Remember last month, when the Doctor was talking about how your name and Email address magically appeared on junk mail that ended up in 700 zillion mailboxes around the world? It can happen, and the lesson to be learned is: never assume that Email is really who it claims to be from.

It's just like your telephone: when you get a call telling you that you just won a big prize, but you have to send a money order for \$50 to claim it...you don't really believe the voice who claims to be Walter Cronkite, do you? Nope, you only trust someone whose voice you know, and even then only when they're talking like your friend should!

But, back to those refrigerators. Iceboxes are only one of a growing list of household appliances on the market, that call themselves, "Internet Ready." There's thermostats, smoke alarms, door locks, light switches, and more. Truly, if you want to spend the money, you can pretty much control your home from anywhere on the globe.

And so can a lot of other people. Control *your* home, not their own, that is.

At the risk of irreverence, the Doctor asks you, "Military Intelligence?" A lot of the basic research that laid the foundation for the Internet was funded by, and intended for use by, the US Defense Department. Yup. Is true. Back then, though, nobody even considered the idea that this network would have civilian uses. Since it was intended for military use only, the researchers *assumed* that all of its users would be trustworthy, would act in a cooperative manner, and would never, never break the rules. So there's not a lot of security built into the design.

Now, fast forward to today. Oddly enough, the civilians got their hands on the Internet, and not all civilians are completely trustworthy. Some of them are downright uncooperative. And a few actually take delight in breaking the rules.

At the same time, some products are developed by companies for whom profit is an important consideration. It's less expensive to buy a "toolkit" for connecting to the Internet, than it is to hire conscientious programmers with the detailed knowledge to do the job. Would you believe that some of those toolkits are insecure? After all, the company who is selling the toolkits needs to make a profit. too.

So, this refrigerator is connected to the Internet (the Doctor asks, "Why?" and doesn't even want to answer) using a flawed toolkit. Out there, maybe in Brazil, or Russia, or even in Washington, DC, a dedicated programmer has found the toolkit's flaws. This uncooperative genius is willing to break the rules. He's scanning all the addresses on the Internet, looking for one that answers, "Hiya, boss, I'm a refrigerator!"

"Okay," says the hacker to the 'fridge, "Let me make a few small changes to your code, so I can come back later and ask you to do me a few favors." Now, a good toolkit would demand passwords and do all sorts of checking that it's talking to the right guy. But the flawed toolkit isn't so picky. It replies, "Sure, boss, but make sure the ice cream stays cold, or my owner will know something's up."

The 'fridge has gone over to the dark side or, to put it another way, the 'fridge has now become a moneymaking tool for the hacker. You see, the 'fridge already knows how to send Email (otherwise, how could it tell your local grocery to deliver that cold ice cream, or milk, or pickles, or whatever its owner is fond of!).

Now, P.T. Barnum said something about how there's a sucker born every minute. Like P.T., the hacker knows that if you send a million Emails offering a big prize, there's one sucker out there who will actually send the \$50 money order to claim the reward. So the hacker finds a few hundred 'fridges, and sets them to churning out Emails. Thousands of them. Millions. Billions and billions. It doesn't matter that the icebox is slower than molasses. It's not costing the hacker anything.

So, is there a take-home lesson here? Not really, unless you're willing to figure out how to make the Internet secure, or how to convince manufacturers to create better software and to test it carefully. You might consider, though, whether there's any real benefit to your Internet-connected appliance, and whether that benefit outweighs the risks it might create. Do you really need to text-message your coffeemaker on the way home? Would a simple timer do the job?
