## DCC CONCERT: STEVE GILLETE & CINDY MANGSEN

On Sunday, May 18, at 3pm in the Danby Town Hall, the Danby Community Council welcomes back to its stage old friends Steve Gillette and Cindy Mangsen. Steve and Cindy performed during the Council's first concert season. They are funny, charming, and have a special talent for warming the hearts of their audience.

Steve is a masterful artisan of the guitar and has a clear mellow baritone, but it is his songwriting that has brought him the most attention. His career was launched spectacularly when *Darcy Farrow* was recorded by Ian and Silvia in 1965. That song has hit the Billboard charts six times, reaching as high as Number 4 when John Denver recorded it in 1973, and it isn't Steve's only song that hit the charts. His compositions have also been popularized by Nanci Griffith, Garth Brooks, Linda Ronstadt, Way-

lon Jennings, and Kenny Rogers, as well as Winnie the Pooh.

Cindy was raised in a musical family. Early in her professional singing career, she sang harmony on several of Tom Paxton's recordings. In addition to her hauntingly beautiful voice, Cindy is adept with the concertina, the banjo, and other instruments. When not performing with Steve, she sings solo and with the Herdman, Hills, and Mangsen trio. Cindy's repertoire ranges from traditional ballads to contemporary songs, including a few of her own.

The concert is free and open to all. The Danby Community Council's Concert Series receives grant support from the Community Arts Partnership of Tompkins County and the Town of Danby.

## Town Clerk's Desktop

Did you know that, per New York Town Law 20, every Town is required to have a Town Clerk? According to the *Town Clerk's Manual*, the role of a Town Clerk has evolved as Town governments grew and changed. "In the 1800s the Town Clerk was a member of the Town Board. In the 1900s the Town Clerk left the Town Board to focus on administrative duties. Today, the Town Clerk still performs many important admin-

istrative duties on behalf of the State and Town government."



In fact, the Town Clerk is the administrative branch of Town government. Clerks are far more than clerical staff. As elected officials, we serve and answer to the residents and taxpayers of our municipality. Ideally, while we do not set legislative policy, we should be on an equal footing with Town Board members (Councilpersons and the Town Supervisor—neither above nor below other elected officials.

One way to think about the role of Town Clerks is that this office is responsible for the creation, collection, dissemination, protection, and preservation of information. Town Clerks often have the additional title and designation of Public Information Officer. I am proud to serve in these roles. Below is a short list of the primary duties of a Town Clerk. In my *Town Clerk's Desk* articles, I try to provide more detail about these responsibilities.

The major role of a Town Clerk is to be the Custodian of Town Records and Records Management Officer. While each office and officer rightly has "custody" of Town records that relate to current activities in the Town, it is the Town Clerk's responsibility to assure that all Town records are protected and preserved for future reference. Clerks manage these records according to a very detailed retention and disposition schedule prepared by the New York State Archives and known as the "MU1." As such, Clerks are also the Keeper of Town Ordinances and Local Laws.

Town Clerks have a legal responsibility to be the Recorder of Town Board Meeting Minutes. We literally write the history of Town government. Clerks have a duty to accurately record the activities of the Town Board and to make these meeting minutes available to the public within two weeks. Once those minutes are created, they are available to anyone through the Clerk's office and on the Town web site.

Clerks have various duties regarding Vacancies, Resignations, and Appointments in Town Offices, whether elected or appointed. We take the oaths of office from all those who have official roles in Town government, including members of boards including Planning, Zoning Appeals, Water Commissioners, and Fire Police. Clerks work with the Board of Elections regarding positions which are up for election, and inform other agencies about changes to elected and appointed positions.

Clerks have several **Fiscal and Tax Collection Duties**. For many residents, the only time you deal directly with the Clerk's office is when you pay your property tax between January and March. In the background, all year it is the duty of the Town Clerk's office to keep track of money coming in (generally, license and permit fees) and money going out (to pay for the work of running the town and improving the roads).

Another public aspect of a Town Clerk's role is Licensing and Permitting Duties. We help with everything from permits for "games of chance," local notification of liquor licenses, hunting and fishing licenses, marriage licenses, and monthly dog license renewals. Clerks report license and permit activities to the proper state agencies.

There are many other duties, varying from preparing the agenda for Town Board meetings to collecting and distributing mail. Clerks are responsible for compliance with State and Local Ethics Requirements. But primarily we are responsible for keeping residents and taxpayers informed about the progress and process of local government. My main responsibility is to you.

During May, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. Summer hours, which drop the Saturday morning hours, will commence at the end of May, on Memorial Day weekend.

Spring is still taking a long time to arrive. Perhaps the promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses, including plenty of dark chocolate, will help tide us over. Flowers should be blooming soon!

### COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

Last month I wrote about the situation with Tioga County possibly losing its bus service, which would affect two bus routes in Danby. The cause of the bus system collapse is a complicated story involving a change in how NY State pays for transportation for medical appointments for Medicaid patients.

In the budget that NY State passed in April, there was an allocation of \$2 million to help upstate rural bus systems. Sixteen counties are affected by this change in bus transportation funding, so \$2 million is not going to solve every county's problems. As of press time, it was not yet determined how this money is to be allocated. I will let you know when I find out if Tioga County's bus system is going to survive.

I also wanted to mention that Danby Fun Day, scheduled for July 12, has received \$1,375 from Tompkins County. This money comes from the County Hotel Room Occupancy Tax. This five percent tax is added to the bill of most hotel room stays in Tompkins County. The money is used for tourism purposes. It pays for the Community Beautification Program, which landscapes the public spaces in Ithaca, and for the Towns to do their own beautification programs. It pays for signage and public art. And it also pays for a wide variety of tourism events and festivals, including Danby Fun Day. Danby Fun Day received the full amount requested.

### WEST DANBY WATER UPDATE

The bids for construction of the new water tank and general contracting of the rest of our infrastructure project came in on March 26.

Statewide Aquastore's bid was well within budget and well below that of the other bidder. The Town Board, on the recommendation of the Water Commissioners, approved Statewide's proposal. Statewide Aquastore has a long history of providing high-quality, glass-fused to steel potable water tanks and we are happy to have them provide ours.

In other project related news, we've completed our first meter read using the new Badger Water Meters and remote read computer. It was a success but we still have ten meters to replace. Our plan is to implement our new billing software for the next read in July. In the next few weeks, I will be contacting in person those who have yet to have their meter replaced.

Carl Seamon has long been the Superintendent of Operations of the Water District and has done a great job of it. As of April 1, he turned that position over to me. He will remain an operator and help me transition into my new role. Thanks Carl; since Roy left you are the person who has the most experience and most knowledge of our water district. I'll do my best to do as well as you have.

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

This has been a trying month, with the Town Board grappling with road and land use issues that have been before the Board since mid-Fall.

It is challenging to present information to you: too much and I tend to confuse the issue with facts, but too little does not sufficiently do justice to the subject. It is often challenging to bridge the gap between the view of a subject from "inside side" of the table and the view from the public's "outside side".

The Town Board's recent closed session—a two and a half hour marathon—is a real example of this gap. The session was held outside public view in order to receive legal advice from our Town Attorney. The session showed me the dedication of our Town Board members, as they tried to represent Danby residents' interest in how our laws play out in real time.

Land use issues are before the Planning Board as well, with proposed revisions to the the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The Comp Plan paints the vision the Town wants to pursue; it defines what the Town might like to be, and the goals the Town need to bear in mind as it creates or revises policy, regulations, and laws.

I believe the 600-foot extension to Marsh Road—the subject of much discussion and the closed session—challenged the Town to realize the gaps between our zoning and our vision of land use. We struggled to understand how we define the "greater good", how we reconcile it with public opinion and with our existing laws...and still reach a decision. We voted to more forward. Next up: a law must be passed to allow the extension, and that action requires a public hearing. Moving forward means that we'll be listening to another round of public input.

Real land use issues and zoning are topics that will be with us for a while, and I urge all of you who are interested to be well informed on what's going on. We are best served by the participation of residents who have first-hand knowledge of the facts. Public opinion has been a major factor in the Marsh road affair, and it is most powerful when everyone is well-informed in advance about land use issues.

In other news, the Board is working towards presenting the Town with information related to the expanding the also-confusing world of Internet technology.

We have, historically and by State Law, several branches of Town services: Fire District, Highway Department, Town Hall, Town Board, the Court, and the West Danby Water District. Over the years, each entity has moved in its own circles. Getting connected is now as much a legal thing as it is a convenience thing for the town as a whole.

What we will be trying to understand is this mesh of boards and departments, record keeping, Emails, and even the new broadband buildout, and how we can be best positioned to deal with new realities and new threats...like security breaches of our computers. Email, when used for public business (as opposed to private communications), is public information. The public can request, via FOIL, records from all of the branches of government listed above, so we realize we need to separate the job from the personal.

Much like the work on the Comprehensive Plan, we are trying to understand where we all are now, to see if there is common agreement about where we think we need to be, and decide how we are going to get there.

The goal is to be able to communicate more directly, more efficiently, and remain within legal and historical requirements. These conversations are just starting and I will be able to report in future articles what, if anything, we have accomplished.
