## TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

### Legal Matters

This Fall has brought a full harvest of legal matters: public hearings, conservation easements, and a local law. In fact, it's been a busy year for all of Danby's municipal boards. The Planning Board has held nine public hearings on various matters and the Board of Zoning Appeals has heard six variance requests. While this level of activity is notable, it is not extraordinary. It is the business of any Town to hear requests for special permits, appeals of various kinds, and (from time to time) to enact or amend local laws.

The Town Board has held four public hearings so far; two more are scheduled for November. In October, the Town Board accepted Danby's second and third Conservation Easements and passed a Local Law *Discontinuing the Designation of a Portion of Marsh Road as Minimum Maintenance, and Amending Local Law No. 3 of 2002 by Changing the Length of the Minimum Maintenance Portion of Marsh Road.*

The annual budget hearing (required by NYS law) for Danby's 2015 Budget will be held at 6:30pm on November 10, just prior to the regularly scheduled Town Board meeting. This budget hearing follows a series of budget planning meetings during October, the last of which will be at 7:30pm on Monday, November 3. The Board will vote on adopting the 2015 budget during the November 10 meeting.

A final public hearing for the West Danby Water District Improvement Grant—for the purpose of reporting on how grant money has been spent and to solicit comments on the effectiveness of the program's administration—will be held at 7pm on November, just prior to the opening of the Town Board meeting.

Each Board has its role in setting public hearings, hearing the cases, and making decisions. The Town Clerk's role is to provide legal public notice, keep accurate and complete records, and do all of the required filing. Prior to any public hearing, notices must be published in the legal notice ("Legals") section of the Town's official newspaper of record. In the case of Danby—and most Towns and Villages in Tompkins County—this is the *Ithaca Journal*.

The format and often the wording of such notices is outlined in NY State's Town law. Notices must be published between five and fourteen days prior to the hearing or event, depending on the type of action being considered. In some cases—particularly hearings before the Planning Board and Zoning Appeals—neighbor letters are mailed. Posting is also provided on the "official bulletin board" in Town Hall and on the Town's web site.

After the hearing has taken place and the decisions of the Board are final, the Town Clerk's work really begins. Accurate minutes must be made, with the full text of the legal wording adopting the decision and/or action. In some cases, certified copies or a "Notice of Decision" of the enacting resolution must be prepared for legal offices, other Town departments, and the petitioner.

In the case of adopted Conservation Easements and Local Laws, there are a range of filing forms that must be completed and forwarded to the correct agencies. Conservation Easements are filed with the Tompkins County Clerk and with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. Local Laws are filed with the New York's Secretary of State. In general, these filings must be done no later than twenty days after the documents have been adopted.

In November, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. As always, the Clerk's is closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And yes, there's plenty of chocolate in the bowl at the Clerk's office window.

## COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

I have written previously about the situation concerning the loss of bus service in West Danby. When I wrote last time, the loss was just a possibility. Now it is a done deal. Due to a change in the way New York State is funding the medical transportation needs of Medicaid patients, Tioga County's entire public transportation system will be out of business as of December 1. Tioga Transit was the only public transportation available in West Danby.

The cost for TCAT, our local public bus system, to duplicate this service would run in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. TCAT has budget troubles of its own, and is not in a position to reinstate this service. Instead, I am proposing a vanpool for West Danby. The cost of this service would be approximately \$16,000, and the proposal is that this cost will be spread out between Tompkins County, the Town of Danby, passenger fares, other transportation entities in the area, and possibly some small grants. The County's and Town's portion of this funding has been included in their tentative budgets, which will not be finalized until mid-November.

The \$16,000 covers the van lease, maintenance, insurance, and fuel. There is a significant cost savings because there is no professional driver—the van would be driven by approved members of the vanpool itself.

There are still a lot of details to work out, but the basic concept is this: One van will go from West Danby to Cornell in the morning and then come back in the afternoon. The exact route and schedule would be decided by the participants, and would certainly include drop-offs at some locations in Ithaca besides Cornell. The exact fare is yet to be determined, but will be comparable to what the bus fare was.

People will sign up in advance to reserve spots on the van. Preference will probably be given to commuters who use the service at least four days per week, on average, but open seats will always be available to purchase.

This is meant to be a pilot program, funded for one year, to see how well it meets the needs of West Danby residents. If you think this is something you might want to participate in, or if you have any questions, please get in touch with me at [danbydan@hotmail.com] or 607.272.7582. ❁

## WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE


The new water tank is in full operation and the old one has been removed.

Now that we have 2" flushing hydrants at the ends of our water distribution lines, we are better able to flush sediment and buildup. Our flushing schedule is normally twice a year, once in April and again in August.

We did an extra flush during the week of October 13-17 in order to test the new hydrants. This flushing caused some brown water in some households, as the new hydrants move a lot more water than the old ones and there is now a hydrant where there never was one before. There are still three new hydrants to test; once that is done, we will return to our April and August flushing schedule.

Your most recent water bill was sent via the old billing system. Hopefully, the next one will be sent using

the new billing software. We did collect data using the new remote reader but we have yet to sync the billing software and meter reading software.



The Water District Celebration was a success and thank you to all those who attended. There are several people that put a lot of time and effort into making it a success that I'd like to recognize and thank them here. They are: Skip Fairchild for coming in early and staying late to make coffee, organize and cleanup; Monica Burke, Karen Kudej, Mary Grace O'Connor, Peter Fraissinet, Polley McClure and Sarah McNaull for making a menu, purchasing and picking up supplies, setting up, greeting and cleaning up; and John Smith for spending many hours making the slide show and interpretive sign that really helped to give people an idea of the scope of the project. ❁

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

October has been "Budget Month", with the Town Board focusing on the 2015 Budget for Danby. These meetings will stretch into November, at which time I will be giving you more details.

I would also like to reintroduce you to another Board the Town participates in: the Tompkins County Council of Governments. This group, a partnership with our sister Towns and Villages, takes on topics of mutual interest. Many of them are vital to the Town of Danby.

Minutes of TCCOG meetings can be found on the County web site [[tompkinscountyny.gov/tccog/](http://tompkinscountyny.gov/tccog/)]. The minutes are worth reading, as the collective efforts affect us all.

Here's a smorgasbord of recent TCCOG discussions:

- Herb Engman, Town of Ithaca, reported on the committee that is negotiating a new County-wide (rather than Town-by-Town) agreement with Time-Warner Cable. T-W has responded to the committee's initial proposal; the next step will be for the committee to respond a counter-offer.
- J.R. Claiborne, a member of the City of Ithaca's Common Council, addressed a resolution objecting to Time-Warner's merger with Comcast, prior to the settlement of all contracts with all Municipalities.
- Don Barber, Town of Caroline, asked if there was any interest in reconvening TCCOG's Gas Drilling Task

Force to discuss waste disposal, compressor stations, processing facilities, and storage. He also introduced Ellen Harrison, who has been working with a group that is addressing the issue of collateral damage from gas drilling. Whether or not a community has a ban, there will still be impacts that are felt across borders and into neighboring communities.

- Shared services is another area of interest to TC-COG's members. Among the possibilities for shared services are Highway, Fire, and Courts. Joe Mareane, Tompkins County's Administrator, said that the information he has compiled on the cost of running the court system in the County comes in around a million dollars collectively. He is preparing a white paper to send on to the group.
- Steven Winkley, a Water Resources Specialist from the New York Rural Water Association reported on progress toward a proposed groundwater protection law. Three Towns--Dryden, Caroline, and Danby--are collectively working on this and hope to soon hold public meetings to share findings.
- Irene Weiser, Town of Caroline, gave an update on a grant she received. The grant funds the study of the possibility of Municipalities requiring an energy rating when selling a house. She also reported on the Sustainability Committee's request to attend the next TCCOG meeting to discuss the development of a Food Management Council.

ward into the deep brush at about 200 feet (not bad for a machine this size), and backward about 40 feet. In addition to several high-arc-ing and line-drive long shots, attendees oohed and ahed over a straight up and down toss of a giant pumpkin, a pumpkin that burst open in mid-flight to reveal a second-stage squash, and some incredible cabbages that auto-shredded to slaw in mid-flight. It doesn't get any better than this.

Or, does it? We're looking forward to next year! ❁

## SOLAR PV PANEL REPORT

In July of 2013, the photovoltaic (PV) solar array outside Danby Town Hall went live. Having now measured the output for a full year, we can say that we've not only reduced our reliance on non-renewable energy but also saved money.

Last winter was an exceptionally cold one (maybe you noticed?) and so our consumption of electricity was about 25 percent more than a normal year, about 28,600kWh. By comparison, the average American residence—smaller than Town Hall and with average weather—uses about 10,800kWh. Even with the increase due to cold weather, the PV array generated about 75 percent of our usage, almost 21,400kWh.

As for cost savings, it can be estimated by comparing the value of the generated electricity (21,400kWh times 9.77¢/kWh, or about \$2090) to the annual lease cost for the PV array (\$1320).

By this measure, the Town saved about \$771 on its electric bill during the year. This savings would apply, even if the winter had been warmer. If the price of electricity rises over the coming years, we can expect even greater savings. Even if it drops, our agreement with the lessor of the system ensures that we'll never lose money.

Our system is one of the largest in the town and certainly the most visible. You've probably seen PV panels showing up at your neighbors' homes...and more so all the time. Last year's *Solarize Tompkins SE* program and the *Solar Tompkins* program this year have both been instrumental in this increase, accounting for almost half of the 70 systems to date now either installed or contracted in Danby.

Even if you've missed out on these programs, it can still make good sense to put panels up, certainly for environmental reasons but very often for economic reasons as well. Any one of the many local installers can guide you through the basics of the rebates and incentives. ❁
