WATER AND FIRES

Water is the key to fighting fires, be they house fires, chimney fires, brush fires, or vehicle fires. Water cuts off oxygen, which is necessary for almost all but some chemical fires, cools the burning material below its ignition temperature, and cools the hot gases that arise from the fire. Water helps defend nearby vehicles and structures from igniting. And water sprayed ahead of and along side of firefighters, allows the firefighters to advance to the site of the fire and put it out.

Good, aggressive firefighting comes down to putting enough water on a fire to quickly knock it out or control it. It's that simple.

How much water does it take to control a fire? There are several metrics but one the State of Iowa has suggested is to divide the volume of the structure (home, garage,

etc.), measured in cubic feet, by 100 to get the gallons of water per minute needed. As an example, if we look at a typical double wide, we calculate that it requires 170 gallons of water per minute to aggressively fight; any less would mean the fire would be fought defensively. The numbers for other types are:

- A large pole barn: over 1500 GPM
- A mid sized barn: 1000 GPM
- A McMansion: 800 to 1000 GPM
- An older farm house: 400 to 600 GPM
- A modest one story home: 100 to 300 GPM

Requirements will, of course vary by floor plans, closed doors, ceiling materials, contents and their flammability, and building materials. We need these gallons per minute for as long as it takes to control and subdue the fire and that, in turn, depends upon many things but chiefly how much of a head start the fire has had before we arrive.

How much water can the Danby Apparatus carry to a fire scene? Because a pumper often needs over 1000 gallons per minute, we bring backup water in



TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

"... Gonna Get Married..."

As I write this in mid-July, we have not yet issued any marriage licenses during 2015. Could it be that all who wish to be married here in Danby have already done so? For couples who want to have their marriage "on file" in the Town of Danby this year, it's not too late. No pressure intended. One of the most joyful aspects of my job is the issuance of marriage licenses.



Historically, the Danby's Town Clerk's office has issued more marriage licenses in the late summer and fall than we have in spring or early summer. August, September, and October seem to be popular months for getting married. Early Autumn weddings, featuring a brilliant display of seasonal color in the trees, seem more popular here in Central New York than the iconic June wedding.

This summer, four years after New York made marriage valid regardless of whether the persons are of the same or of a different sex, the inclusiveness of all people

who can be married was guaranteed as a legal right by the United States Supreme Court. We expect that there will be marriage licenses to come.

We are happy to issue marriage licenses to all couples ready to, "take the plunge," whatever the time of year. A couple who intends to be married in New York State may apply for a marriage license with any Town Clerk in the state. Both potential spouses must sign the license application form in person. At least two required forms of identification must be presented—a photo ID and a birth certificate. If you were previously mar-

ried you are required to show proof of how previous marriage(s) ended. Although the marriage license is issued immediately, there is a waiting period of 24 hours before the ceremony may take place. A marriage license is valid for 60 days, beginning the day after the license was issued.

There is a \$40 filing fee that covers both the preliminary license and eventual Certificate of Marriage. The Certificate is issued on receipt of the license paperwork, formalized by the marriage officiant and witnesses. The filing fee is shared by the Town Clerk's office and the NYS Department of Health in Albany.

Information related to marriage licenses are filed, as part of the permanent record, in the archives of the Town where the license was issued. This is true no matter where the actual marriage ceremony takes place. If you need a transcript of your marriage certificate, contact the Town which issued the license. These are our most secure records. Information filed with a marriage license is sealed for a long time, generally the lifetime of the couple. Access to current marriage records is only available to the persons recorded on the license, their children, or a person who has power of attorney for them.

During August, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Fridays. We are closed on Sundays, Thursdays, and Saturdays through Labor Day. Special hours may be arranged by appointment. You can always reach us by phone, 607.277.4788 or [townclerk@townofdanbyny.org].

one or both of our two tankers to the fire scene. Practically speaking, when considering vehicle placement, we can deploy 3000 gallons in Danby and 2000 in West Danby from tankers. This means we can supply our pumper for about three minutes if a large structure is involved. After that we have to travel back to the water source to refill the tanker. Tankers carry a portable pond and dump water into it so the tanker can shuttle back to the water source to refill.

Rural residents for such places as Danby are at risk because we have very limited hydrant capacity, we principally get our water shuttled from Jennings Pond, and we rely on volunteers to arrive and man our 40-year-old underpowered tanker to shuttle water to the fire scene. So depending upon how far from the Pond or the station you dwell, the risk will vary. In general, you need to un-

derstand that it takes five to fifteen minutes after we leave the station to arrive with backup water. We can not be at most scenes in less than five minutes. This means



we often have to fight defensively trying to contain the fire and protect nearby structures and vehicles.

What is our recent experience? During a structure fire in January 2014, both the Danby pumper and tanker were simultaneously summoned. The structure, a farm house, was located about six miles from the station, up a hilly unpaved snow-packed road. The engine arrived in about ten minutes from the time it left the station; the slower, underpowered tanker about six minutes later. Mutual aid arrived as well, but the structure was lost, partially due to the lack of water early in the fight. We do not want to be in that situation again.

Within the last two years, a nearby department (Owego, NY) lost an officer in a structure fire, partially because of water availability issues. We do not want to be in that situation ever.

Mutual aid, while usually available, is problematic at the start of a call. The four closest mutual aid departments (Brooktondale, Ithaca, Newfield, and Candor) are either twenty minutes travel time away from Danby's town center, or not equipped with tankers. Only

Two of these volunteer companies (Brooktondale and Newfield) face steep hill climbs to reach a Danby fire. Further, one of these has a shortage of volunteer tanker drivers.

This would be a good time to check if you have a smoke alarm and to review fire prevention and safety tips. For some tips, visit [ready.gov/home-fires].

It is easier to prevent a fire than to fight one that has started.
