You'll want to keep Danby's farm-centic 19th-century economy in mind. Hops and tobacco were grown. Flax, too (according to the 1865 NYS Census, 164 baskets of flax in 1864). Back then, Danby has 150 milk cows and 632 horses aged two years or older!

Farms, back then, included what the census called, "domestic manufactures." Credit Danby women for having created 336 yards of linen in 1864. Perhaps some relevant tools will appear.



2016 DANBY BUDGET HEARING

November 9 is the big day, when the public has the opportunity to provide its input regarding Danby's Budget for 2016.

There's a public hearing in Town Hall at 7pm. Everyone is welcome to attend, either to listen or to speak. Written comments will also be accepted.

Most of Danby's budget is proposed by the Supervisor and adjusted by the Town Board, but a substantial portion is prepared by the Fire District and—by law—is included without modification into the Town budget. Preliminary information indicates that your Townbased taxes will not change much, relative to 2015, but there may be a noticable increase in the Fire District portion of the levy.

Copies of the budget are available via the Clerk's office but, as of this writing, are not online.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

There is usually a lot going on at the County Legislature level, and that is one of the reasons I enjoy my job. It seems that in the past month there is even more going on than normal. In addition to the ten extra budget meetings we had in September and October, here are quick snapshots of some issues that have come before us recently that we will need to make a decision on one way or another.

There is a large pile of ash left over as a result of decades of burning coal to generate electricity at the Cayuga Power Plant in Lansing (for those of you who have been around awhile, it was known as Miliken Station). A private individual hired an outside specialist to evaluate the coal ash pile. The Environmental Management Council is asking the County Legislature to fund more studies of the site to determine risks of groundwater and Cayuga Lake contamination.

We have been asked to weigh in on whether we think NY State should institute a policy called, *Carbon Fee and Dividend*. In a nutshell, this policy would put a tax on carbon emissions, that would then be returned

to every taxpayer in the state. It has some similarities to what the State of Alaska does with its oil revenues. It would theoretically encourage industry to become more energy efficient without costing consumers.

We are taking the first step of considering a law that would ban the sale of products containing microbeads in Tompkins County. Microbeads are tiny plastic balls that are put in some health and beauty products to create a mild abrasive. The plastic microbeads are too small to be filtered out in our water treatment process, so they end up in Cayuga Lake and other water bodies.

The County Legislature is being asked to consider various possible laws to regulate drones in Tompkins County. Drones are rapidly increasing in popularity. They are largely unregulated by the federal government at this time. There are issues with drones concerning privacy, safety, terrorism, and interference with airplanes that are not easy to solve.

These are all big issues with layers of complexity, details, and nuance. I cannot do justice to each issue in such a short article. As always, if you want more information, or have questions or comments, feel free to contact me at 607.272.7582 or [danbydan@hotmail.com].

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

The first snow was on the ground this morning. There's a hard freeze coming tonight. The seasons are changing. Some change is welcome: todays colors are at the seasonal peak, the clouds are spectacular, and the air is so clear. It's truly a wonderful time to live in upstate New York.

Some changes, though, can also be challenging. Changes in land use, for instance, over this past year or so and also as a result of zoning changes currently being considered by the Town.

Here is my list of the top concerns about change in Danby. No list is complete without a caveat: this list is not all encompassing, and I am sure most everyone could add a subject or two.

- Conflicts between uses allowed under present zoning, uses that place competing interests in neighborhoods at odds
- Traffic, as the County grows, jobs attract traffic, as the Town grows with new residents, it creates traffic. We have been reducing speed limits all over Town, and will be reducing more in the future, but there is little we can do to stop increased road use
- Open space, one of the primary goals of the Town's comprehensive plan, is being threatened as we struggle to find effective ways to enforce that goal
- Light pollution and noise, including discharge of firearms, is becoming problematic as more houses move in and our open spaces shrink
- Access to a viable water source is a concern for many residents. Water is going to be a big deal on the Town's agenda.


As we map Danby's water and understand our aquifers and recharge areas, it is becoming clear that water quality and well recharge rates were not created equal in Danby.

The Gunderman Road Planned Development Zone (PDZ #10) that is presently before the Planning and Town Boards is a good example of changes that the

Town is experiencing. It is also an example of potential collateral damage felt by a neighborhood: the proposed changes are a threat to its quality of life.

Some kinds of change are inevi-

table and some are not. As the Town grows, conflicts will arise about how the Town wants to change and for what reasons.

The almost-completed aquifer study was entered into as a way for the Town's water resources to be better understood, so we can make wise decisions about this invaluable resource. These studies will lead to Danby adopting new laws to protect its resources.

Change and conflict go hand-in-hand. Our Boards try to manage change but...eventually...your elected boards will be making decisions and passing new laws. They are not easy decisions, and can only be resolved through and with our residents help: by becoming involved in the process.

These issues are not just Gunderman Road concerns, they are Town-wide. Gunderman residents just happen to be the ones most involved right now in the process of change in Danby; we all need to pay close attention, change could be coming to your neighborhood.

FIRE DISTRICT PROVIDES EMS

Have you ever had a medical emergency or accident? Did you receive help from an Emergency Medical Service (EMS)? If so, then you have some idea of what is involved.

What happens when you call 911, the Tompkins County Department of Emergency Response Center?

First, the 911 Center questions you as to the nature of emergency, the location, and other details. The Center next determines which emergency responders are geographically closest and available and it calls them out. If you use a land line, this all takes about 5 to 20 seconds; from a cell phone, about 10 seconds longer. The Center also notifies Bangs ambulance, other first responders, such as the Sherriff or other Fire Departments, if other units are needed.

For Danby locations, the 911 center determines wheth-

er they are in West Danby or the central part of the Town. The unpaved road and hill between NYS Rt.96B and NYS Rt.34/96 is often a limiting factor in a fast response.

We have two first response vehicles, one in part of town. We also dispatch heavy rescue equipment contained on our two engines if it is a Motor Vehicle (MV) accident or if a fire may be involved.

In both West Danby and Danby, Emergency Medical trained responders (EM) also carry medical gear in their private vehicles and quickly decide between going directly to the scene or taking the EM vehicles first; all to meet the goal of a quick response.

In 2014, the Danby Fire District's two stations responded to 133 EMS calls; the bulk of these were for bodily injuries, heart or breathing problems, and motor vehicle accidents. This is more than half of all Fire District calls in 2014 and we are on track to exceed this in 2015.

What exactly is EMS and how do Danby and West Danby perform this vital job?

EMS follows the basic principles of first aid: preserve

life, prevent further injury, and promote recovery. EMS, when alerted, needs to get to the scene fast, provides initial care in an emergency, and transfers patients to an ambulance or helicopter for transport to a hospital.

Danby and West Danby are certified

by the NYS Department of Health to provide emergency medical care at the level of Emergency Medical Technician-Basic (EMT-B): Basic life support provid-

ers are trained to assess and manage immediate life threats.

Modern EMS vehicles are rather specialized. Some are what we call "Fly Cars", which are light SUVs and bring basic medical supplies and trained EM technicians to the scene; Danby has one of these SUVs and an older medical vehicle. West Danby has a Heavy Rescue Vehicle. Vehicles that bring the patient to the hospital are ambulances; this task requires specialized training. Bangs has the training and is usually just a few minutes behind us at a scene. Bangs has Advanced Life Support capabilities and is under the medical direction of Central New York EMS.

Vehicles that bring specialized tools and equipment are /Heavy Rescue/ and in this age, often are Fire Engine Pumpers. Both West Danby and Danby have major equipment carried on our two 2013 model Engine Pumpers. These can stabilize damaged vehicles and use tools such as the Jaws of Life to extract victims.

A Bit of History

The first ambulance as a specialized vehicle was designed during the Napoleonic wars. Civilian ambulance advances were made with the introduction of a transport carriage for cholera patients in London during 1832. It was found that the patient may be driven to the hospital so speedily that the hospitals may be less numerous and located at greater distances from each other. The earliest emergency medical service was reportedly the rescue society founded in Vienna after a disastrous fire.

The first motorized ambulance was brought into service in 1899, with the Michael Reese Hospital, Chicago, taking delivery of the first automobile ambulance, donated by 500 prominent local businessmen. Interestingly, your author worked part time at Michel Reese while working his way through college.

During World War One, further advances were made in providing care before and during transport. Two-way radios became available after World War I, enabling for more efficient radio dispatch of ambulances in some areas. Shortly before World War II, then, a modern ambulance carried advanced medical equipment, was staffed by a physician, and was dispatched by radio.

What should I do when I call 911?

Provide the dispatcher with as much information as possible, including your exact location, the nature of the incident or accident, how many patients there are, the approximate age and sex of the patient(s), whether they patient is conscious, breathing, speaking coherently, and describe any hazards (e.g. downed power lines) that might be present at the scene. Frequently, the dispatcher will ask you to remain on the line; do so. Help is on the way.

GET PAID TO LEARN ABOUT YOUR HOUSE

Researchers at Cornell are studying the use of dataloggers to measure heat loss in homes as a way to identify how leaky individual homes are. They are looking for people to put these small dataloggers in their homes for about 15 days, for which you will be paid \$5.

This is a fantastic opportunity for staff to learn how well your house holds its heat (or cold in the summer). You may have even had an energy audit done recently-and possibly made upgrades. But this is a new way to measure just how well your house actually holds its temperature, rather than what the models show for how your house should perform.

And, it's not only free, they will pay you \$5!

The research project, led by Cornell Professor Howard Chong, is in the process of gathering 200-500 participants for energy-efficiency research.

Each participant will be asked to:

- fill out a one-page survey about characteristics of the person's home
- use a credit-card sized Data-Logger to record temperatures in the home for two weeks. Participants should live in a one-family residential house within 60 miles of Ithaca.

With the data, the researchers

hope to identify and analyze which homes are the leakiest—that is, which homes are the least energy efficient. These homes are those that would benefit most from a retrofit. An online-accessible progress bar will anonymously compare your home's energy-efficiency to other homes' in the Ithaca/Tompkins area.
