# BIRD COUNT WARMUP

The 115<sup>th</sup> annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC) takes place at more than 2100 locations across the continent between December 14 and January 5. The Ithaca CBC, which has been running for more than 50 years, involves

for more than 50 years, involves counting birds in a 15-mile diameter circle on January 1 each year.

nates section VI of this count circle, a large portion of which is in Danby.

The count is one of the ways we get to see beyond our backyards and tune into the ebbs and flows of population for many species in the broader region and the continent as a whole. For example, did you know that the Ithaca count often has had the highest Black-capped Chickadee tally of any count in North America? Or, that

our colorful Cardinal was not likely a resident of Danby until the 1940s?

Every year has a unique species composition due to available food resources and weather dynamics. This year the forecast is that we may have an invasion of Common Redpolls from the north!

The more folks reporting data, the more interesting and complete the picture becomes. All Danby residents are encouraged to participate, even if it is just by birdwatching in your neighborhood or taking 5 minutes to count birds at your bird feeder. Areas in Danby outside of the Ithaca CBC circle or section VI will still be included in the historic record for Danby, which we plan show in an online map.

In preparation for this year's count, the Danby Community Council is


## Long John and the Tights A Leg Up on Old Time Music



There have been major challenges touching every aspect of local government and community relations. I can testify that lessons have been learned from what we have experienced. Improvements have been made to as-

pects of local government and community relations. Progressive change can be a very good thing.



public access to documents through online archiving and databases available through the Town web site. We are acutely aware of how important organization and public access to information is for residents with real and pressing concerns.

Looking forward, I have hope for the potential of 2016. During the first half of 2016 there will be Public Hearings for the draft Aquifer Protection Ordinance and related zoning amendments. I will be working with the boards and planning office to make sure that all of the procedures are followed as need be. Decisions will be made on other planning and zoning issues, some of which will also involve public hearings and communication to the community. I will do my best to facilitate these processes.

Are we "Looking forward" to tax collection? Well, maybe not exactly. While this is an engrossing and time consuming task for all involved (I "look forward" to being quite worn out by the end of January), tax dollars are what keep our local services going: fire protection, road maintenance, careful planning, and all of the small yet valued services you've come to expect from local government. We've learned that we can't count on state and federal help in the case of some emergencies... so, our local support is essential.

The "Town and County" property tax bills will be sent out at the end of December. The first day of tax collection will be Saturday, January 2. Payments (without additional fees), and the option for installment payments, will be received through Saturday, January 30. For many of you, this may be the one time in the year when you visit Town Hall. We'll look forward to saying, "Hello," and to sharing some chocolate.

Once again, I am deeply thankful for the efforts of so many people who work for the benefit of our Town, and the ways we have supported each other through a difficult year. You have proven that it really does make a difference to get involved.

#### Holiday Calendar

The Town Hall will be closed for holidays:December 23-26 for Christmas and December 31/January 1 for New Year. For the rest of the month, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and Saturday mornings 10am-Noon. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays.

#### FIRE DISTRICT ELECTION

Tuesday, December 8 brings to us the last in the annual cycle of elections, primaries, and other referenda. The Fire District Commissioners, Danby's "other" elected officials, are chosen by balloting every year on the second Tuesday in December.

This year's voting, on Tuesday the 8th, will take place in both Fire Halls, 5-9pm. The West Danby Hall is at 47 Sylvan Lane, just off NYS Rt.34/89, and the Danby Station is at 1780 Danby Road, on NYS Rt.96B.

Most years, only one Commissioner is elected. This year, after former Commissioner Tom Halton moved away from Danby, a second seat is open for the remaining part of his term.

The District received letters of interest from two candidates prior to its November 17 deadline. Kevin Faehndrich is running for a 2-year term, and Katherine "Kat" Anderson is running for a 5-year term.

## COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

Community Choice Aggregation is a program that I am excited about, currently under development by NY State. Tompkins County has just signed a non-binding letter of interest. If the program comes to pass, it will not take effect for more than a year, so you will be hearing about it again.

The basic idea is that a municipality--such as the Town of Danby or Tompkins County--will enter into a contract with an electricity provider for all the residents of the municipality. This will include all residential accounts and all "non-demand" business (e.g., small business) accounts. The residents of the municipality will then get electricity at a contracted price that will be lower than their current price, because of the bulk buying power of hundreds or thousands of other participating consumers.

It is impossible to say exactly how much money you would save. Other states have initiated this type of bulk buying. Their results indicate that you might save 5-10 percent off the best electric rates currently available. Since many people are not getting the best rates currently available, savings could be even greater.

Individuals will have several opportunities to influence whether or not they will be participating. The first opportunity comes in the form of a referendum. Let's say the Danby Town Board decides they want to pursue this. They would pass a resolution, then the decision

would go to a townwide referendum. All registered voters would get to say whether they want the Town to proceed or not with this plan.

Assuming the referendum passes and the plan goes into effect, each electricity customer will then have the ability to opt out. In other words, even if the plan goes into effect, you will have the option to continue to get your electricity from your current provider.

It may be possible to offer residents of the municipality more than one choice. For example, you may be able to choose between the cheapest rate possible and a plan where half your electricity comes from green sources but costs slightly more.

Another potential benefit of this program is that the municipality has the option of adding in a small surcharge. The surcharge would be invisible to you, and you would still be saving a lot of money. The surcharge could be used in various ways such as providing funds for energy efficiency for low-income homes, or for building community solar projects.

NY State has not finalized the rules for this program... that should be coming in another month or two. After that, the municipalities in Tompkins County will work on crafting the details of what they want from an electricity provider. If all goes smoothly, you may be voting in a referendum on this in November 2016.




ious tribes of deer. I saw the panic that the does get into when they smell a buck approaching...and run away. And I must

# IN MEMORIAM, BEATRICE HOGBEN

Some people have a major impact on their community just by being who they are. In Danby, Beatrice Hogben was such a person.

Bea passed away on Sunday, November 15 following a brief illness. Her passing is a loss for many. She was an active member of the Fire Department for 30 years, played the organ for church services and weddings, and was a dedicated volunteer with the Danby Community Library. Those close to her cherish fond memories of her community service.

Bea was an active member of the Danby Volunteer Fire Company for 30 years. After joining in 1985, she did fire police, was the Fire Company Secretary for many years, and also served as a Trustee. Sharon Gaden remembers, "She was our first female life member. Bea was still coming to the station on a daily basis to check on things. The members of the Fire Company will dearly miss Beatrice and all she did for us."

Beatrice worked hard on fund raising for Danby's Rescue Truck 442. "I believe that she was qualified on 442 and drove it to calls until she was 70 years old," Ben Hogben remembers. "It was then that she decided to stick to directing traffic and providing food for emergency calls." According to her obituary, Bea would rise at all hours of the day or night to provide food for fire fighters or to direct traffic at the scene. Her friend, Dawn Parks remembers, "I can recall meeting her di-

recting traffic on the corner of Comfort and Gunderman Roads and almost freezing because she had stood out in the cold for so long."

Dawn worked with Bea as a library volunteer for our Danby library for many years. "We could tell when she was in the Town Hall because she left her shoes at the door, so as not to track in dirt," Dawn remembers. "Whenever anyone was ill or had surgery she sent cards and delivered cookies faithfully." I experienced this myself, when Bea made us a gift of several books for my husband to read while he was recovering from hip surgery.

We learned from Bea's obituary that, "Second only to her deep love for her family was her love for music, which she shared as organist for three local churches. She acquired an extensive library of music and especially enjoyed accompanying people as they either sang or played a musical instrument." She played the organ at the Danby Federated Church before the current Pastor came. Bea also shared her talents with the Brooktondale and Caroline Center churches. She played the organ at the Caroline Center church as recently as Sunday November 8, a week before she passed away.

It was Bea's wish that donations in her memory be considered for either the Caroline Center Church or the Danby Volunteer Fire Company. We can also continue her legacy by volunteering our time and energy to community organizations and helping our neighbors. She was dedicated to her passions and cared deeply about others.

The evening is open to everyone: musicians, dancers, listeners, foodies, kids, teens, adults, and seniors.

The rustic Pot Luck supper begins around 6pm. By 7pm, the musicians will be warming up for an hour of "Waltz Jam". They'll play sweet tunes while dancers turn around the room.

Waltzing is easy, fun, and even useful. If it's your first time, ask for a 1-minute intro!

Don't worry if you've never done this before. All dances will be taught and helpful, experienced dancers will be on hand to ease newcomers into the figures. Dances early on in the evening will be kept simple. Stay for as much as you like.

#### Women Can Vote, Too

Summarized from an article by Carol Kammen, County Historian

Five years before women gained the right to vote nationwide in the United States, an attempt was made to give women the vote in New York State.

100 years ago, in 1915, New York State (male) voters rejected giving women the right to vote by a wide margin. The vote failed in Tompkins County too, by a margin of 3,871 to 2,556, or about 60 to 40 percent.

In the Town of Danby, the measure passed by a margin of 121 to 93, a difference of 28 votes.

# YOUTH GRANTS FROM COMMUNITY COUNCIL

During 2015, the Town of Danby and the United Way of Tompkins County provided direct funding to the youth of Danby in the form of grants to aid with program expenses.

A total of \$2600 was granted to 27 Danby youth over the year. Each youth received up to \$100 toward to cost of fees and tuition for various enrichment programs. The programs that were funded this year are as follows: summer camps including 4-H, Primitive Pursuits, Boy Scouts, Southside Community Center, theater, sports, GIAC, and visual arts; Some youth also received funding for lessons, including piano, dance, horseback riding, and swimming.

No one was turned away and everyone who applied received a grant. Grants will again be awarded in 2016, and applications for programs that begin in January through March are being accepted now. The deadline for applying is January 15, 2016. For programs starting in April, May, or June, applications are due by March 15.

Youth up through age 21 who reside in Danby at least half-time are eligible to apply, and preference may be given to those who qualify for free and reduced price school lunches. # Community Council Fall/Winter 2015 Youth Programs


