


Town Clerk's Desktop

WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

Our interim District meeting scheduled for February 17 was postponed to February 24 due to unexpected scheduling conflicts with several of our Commissioners.

As of writing this update, even the rescheduled meeting will probably have been rather short. The reason for the meeting was to present estimate information from the companies bidding to do the plumbing repair work in the pump house. I have spoken with six different companies; four came out to look at the job, two decided against the work after having seen the job...and none have gotten back with an estimate. I will continue to call different companies.

The leaking roof on the pump house looks to have been repaired. A local roofer came out to do an estimate and saw a minor faulty point in the roofing material. Rather than give me an estimate, he repaired it on the spot. We will continue to monitor it for leaks to ensure the repair holds.

The New York Rural Water Association Convention is coming up in May. Carl Seamon and I plan to attend. The District will only pay for one of us to go and Carl and I will split the cost of the other going. I plan to use the time to network with other operators to solicit ideas for isolating chlorination functions in our pump house as well as attend as many concurrent sessions that seem relevant to our system.

ATTENTION FARMERS!

The Southern Tier Agricultural Industry Enhancement Program offers funding to support agricultural projects in the Tompkins County.

Eligible farmer-landowners can receive assistance to complete projects that increase farm production, advance on-farm conservation/environmental goals, and enhance profitability.

Projects must implement part(s) of a farm business or environmental plan. Farms must meet all eligibility requirements and participate in the Agricultural Environmental Management program through the Tompkins County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Funding is available to address a variety of projects. For projects budgeted between \$20,000 and \$50,000, the State pays 90 percent and the applicant pays 10%; between \$50,001 and \$100,000, the applicant's share rises to 25 percent.

Applications should be complete and accurate, and submitted by 4pm on Monday, March 7. For additional information and to obtain an application, please visit [tompkinscountyny.gov/swcd/Grants] or or 170 Bostwick Road, Ithaca.

FREE TAX PREPARATION

If you are single and earn less than \$35,000, or are a family earning less than \$54,000, the Alternatives VITA program can prepare your Federal and State Income tax returns for you.

Alternatives' Free Tax Preparation Program has been offering free tax prep services since 2003. They have prepared over 17,000 tax returns for working families and individu-



als and returned over \$32 million in refunds to our community. Their goal is to help all eligible workers claim the credits they deserve without paying fees, and to help them turn refunds into financial assets.

The Danby Community Council is bringing this program to Danby's Town Hall on Saturday, March 19, 10am-2pm. You must schedule an appointment in advance by calling 2-1-1.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Both the crazy cold weather and the intense focus on the upcoming national elections have affected my month of February. Can you believe that, at thirty seven below, Watertown was the coldest spot in the nation?

Was I spoiled by the temperate October, November, December? And the easy weather that persisted through a large part of January, and did I feel that the recordbreaking cold was the only price I paid?

Was I living with the threat of having to climb up on the roof and shovel the snow off? Were there some anxious times, wondering if I needed to get my beast of a snowblower ready to go? Was I grateful that I have been spared from these tasks?

Yes for sure, the cold I can deal with, although some others must surely have had frozen pipes. I know the winter is not over and some of our big snows come suddenly at the end of winter, so I still could yet face these challenges. This winter has been so different than last. I think most all of us would agree another season of deep snow—like last year—would have been too much.

Perhaps I am feeling my age. After all, when I moved here I shoveled the drive by hand, cut, split and stacked five cords of wood a year, raised three kids, went to work, built the house, and got by on no sleep. Perspective changes as we age.

The CSEA contract has been signed, always a challenge for me.

Our new solar project is going forward. It will complement the array serving Town Hall. We are hoping to take advantage of a New York State program that allows us to provide power to all our municipal facilitiesHighway, Fire, Water—from a single, large array of panels

located on Town property near the

Highway Department. When installed—at no cost to the Town—it will cut our electric costs and help keep them increase-free for decades.

To make it easier to locate the solar farm, we are working on a land swap with Auto Salvage, the owner of an irregularly shaped parcel adjacent to the Highway Department.

On another land front, the Town is seriously looking at the lot next to Town Hall. The owner was served notice of an unsafe building and needs to tear down the existing structure and clean up the lot.

These items will be on the Town Board's in March. Other items?

Remember our biomass boiler project? Well it is still alive. We have been working to find a solution to its problems, to find a third party to highlight the incredible mistakes that happened, to re-engineer the project, and to find the money to fix the mixtakes. The effort is seeing a little daylight!

We are also looking at an idea to lower our—your—residential electric cost rates by working with other communities and buying electricity in bulk. It's an interesting idea, stay tuned this topic as well as all the others I have mentioned.

The proposal for commercial development on Gunderman Road, known as the Summit Enterprise Center, is entering into its final stages with a decision to come perhaps in April or May.

I do hope the Groundhog's prediction is true.

PROTECT FAMILY AND HOME

In 2013 in the United States, there were 369,500 home fires that killed 2,755 people. In addition, there were over 2,600 Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning deaths.

Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as one or two minutes to escape safely once the alarm sounds.

Your ability to get out depends on warning from detectors and planning.

The Plan

Everyone in your household should work on and understand a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes.

Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors. Also, mark the location of each smoke detector. This is a great way to get children involved in fire safety in a non-threatening way.

For easy planning, download the NFPA's escape planning grid.

During your walk through, look for and deal with flammables and clutter that could slow down your exit—or the ability of firefighters to reach you or the fire. Read the NFPA's escape planning tips and download its free safety tip sheet.

Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors

You can purchase these detectors at home repair stores like Agway or Lowes. You can get separate Smoke and

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is produced by incomplete combustion. Such poor combustion can occur in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces.

When inhaled, even a small amount of CO will reduce the oxygen-carrying capacity of your blood. The loss of blood oxygen can be fatal; so CO detectors are needed in homes.

CO detectors or combination units. Some houses have the detectors already installed; these are powered by the house's electrical system with a battery backup. Detectors should be placed in bedrooms, furnace rooms, basements. and near kitchens. Detectors in and near kitchens can be an annoying problem, but fires are most likely to start there.

Test the batteries monthly. Lithium batteries are supposed to last 10 years, so you might want to try them. Read the instructions for testing the detectors. If you hear a beep that continues for a long time after the test or otherwise, this indicates a low battery; replace it.

Fire Extinguishers

Fire extinguishers (FEs) can be purchased at home repair stores like Home Depot, or online via Google, Amazon, or Uline. I recommend purchasing a Powder FE, because it covers multiple fire types at a low price. You will want to get a 2.5 pound ABC (see Side Bar) for kitchens and 5# or 10# ABCs for areas near furnaces or garages. For most houses one 5# ABC per floor would be adequate.



Care for FEs involves periodic checking of the gauge on the side. If the arrow points to the "green" or "OK" area, the FE is good. Once a year, tip the FE upside down, tap

the bottom with a rubber mallet or the palm of your hand, and hold it upside down for a few minutes. This action loosens the powder in the FE. Then tip it upright and re-hang it.

To fight a fire with an FE, pull the pin and point the nozzle at the base of the fire. Squeeze the handle in short bursts as needed.

If the FE pressure is low, or you have used it to fight a fire, have a professional FE company service it or replace the whole unit.


TOMPKINS COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY Submitted by Dan Klein

The Tompkins County Public Library (TCPL) is possibly our most beloved local institution.

Consider some of these statistics as evidence of how important the library is:

- In 2015, TCPL had more than 365,000 physical visits to the Library
- Free programs for children, teens and adults had a combined attendance of more than 32,000
- Nearly 800,000 items were circulated last year
- TCPL has more than 40,000 registered borrowers
- The TCPL collection includes more than 222,000 items

The library is partially funded by tax dollars, but also by private funds.



region. The ringer Lakes Library System recently got space of their own, freeing up 6,000 square feet of space.

The plans for using this space revolve around accommodating several new features in the library. One is a Teen Center. The Teen Center is meant to be a safe venue for teens to spend out-of-school time, and will feature collections, mobile technology, flexible spaces for reading, studying, collaborating, and holding programs.

Another feature to be added to the library is a 21st Century Learning Lab. The Learning Lab will be used to promote education, skill building, employment, career development and more. It will feature a dedicated computer training area, media tools, a "makerspace", and more.

The \$1.1 million dollar cost to install these and other new features is being undertaken entirely by private fundraising through the Tompkins County Public Library Foundation. Expect these projects to be completed next year.

New Apparatus To Improve Fire Protection

The Danby Fire District Commissioners' proposed bonding of a new Tanker/Fire Truck received Danby Voter approval on February 2 by a vote of 75 yes to 24 no.

Previously, the Commissioners had studied our needs and drew up specifications for such a truck. For over a year, the Apparatus Subcommittee analyzed our current equipment, consulted with fire fighters, chiefs, fire truck manufacturers, various industry experts, apparatus consultants, lenders, bankers, accountants and lawyers, We received and processed a lot of information. The Fire Commissioners and the Fire Chiefs then developed a specification package for the new Tanker/Fire Truck.

The Commissioners then voted to seek bids late last fall. The successful bidder was 4Guys Fire Truck Company.

The order was formally placed following voter approval of the bond referendum. The new vehicle will be similar to the one pictured.



Many of you will remember when the library moved into its current building—formerly Woolworth's—in 2000. The purchase of the building was also a joint partnership between tax dollars and private fundraising, mostly from the Park Foundation. To me, this shows that, historically and currently, the library is a highly-prized local institution. I applaud their efforts to meet the community's needs not just in the present, but with a sharp eye towards the future.

In addition to the library in downtown Ithaca, TCPL partners with the Danby Reading Room in the Town Hall by providing items through inter-library loan. Patrons may also return items borrowed from TCPL at the reading room or items borrowed at the reading room to TCPL. The Danby Reading Room is staffed entirely by volunteers, and they can always use more help.
