CIVIL WAR IN DANBY

port you back 150 years.

Step back in time on Saturday and Sunday, June 25 and 26, when a Civil War Encampment settles in to Dotson Park. A company street of tents, campfire smoke, period attire, and the unmistakable thunder of musket and cannon fire, will envelop you in the sights, the sounds, and the smells of the America's Civil War. It will trans-

The soldiers will be sleeping on straw in their tents and cooking Civil War fare over campfires. Musket tripods will adorn the fields. The clamor of black powder fired from musket and cannon will mark the hours.

Danby resident and Danby Community Council member Danny Wheeler is the maestro of this amazing living history event, giving our community a first-hand look at the daily life of the soldiers during the Civil War.

Danny has been involved with Civil War organizations since 1984. His mother and grandmother were members of the Women's Relief Corps and Danny follows the footsteps of his great grandfather, Jerome B. Kelley, a private in the 45th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry.

Danny first joined the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) in 1984. In 1988 he organized Sydney Camp #41 in Ithaca and has been a member of Company E, 148th New York, Sons of Veterans Reserve (SVR), the oldest SVR in New York since 1981. In 1999-2000 he served as the Commander in Chief of the SUVCW; currently he is its National Quartermaster.

The aims of these organizations are preservation and education, and Danny has been very involved in both. From the repair and



Speed Limit Changing on Comfort Road

A speed limit change for Comfort Road has been approved by the NYS Department of Transportation. Northern Comfort—from the silo at Lieb Road to the intersection with NYS Rt.96B, about 3.9 miles—is now 35MPH. Southern Comfort—the dirt end of the road, from Lieb Road to Bald Hill Road, about 1.7 miles—is now 25MPH.



New signs, posting the new speed limits, should be installed by early June. As of mid-May, the Highway Department had already acquired the signs and was started marking the sign locations. This is a good time to get into the practice of driving more slowly on Comfort Road.

Over the past six years, Danby has worked to lower speed limits on several roads. Each road is a separate effort. Most often, the process begins when a citizen circulates a petition to the residents along the road. Successful peti-

tions have simple wording—including solid reasons for the request--and are signed by residents representing as many of the homes and properties along the road as possible.

The petitions provide incentive for the Town Board to pass a supporting resolution and for the Highway Department to justify a formal request to the Departments of Transportation in Tompkins County and New York State. The final decision is made by the NYS DoT after a complete study and review.

The process can take a long time—as much as a year. The Comfort Road petition—which addressed only a reduced speed limit on Southern Comfort, the dirt portion of Comfort Road—was circulated in early July and presented to the Town Board on July 13, 2015. The information was reviewed, and received support from Danby's Highway Department (reduced speeds will help minimize deterioration of the dirt road). A resolution was passed by the Town Board the following week.

All of this information was then sent to the Departments of Transportation in Tompkins County and New York State. The County forwarded an approval to the State, and the Town received notice—in September—

that the DoT would consider the request. And then we waited. The NYS DoT has a months-long backlog of such requests.

In March, 2016, the Town received a Notice of Decision regarding the speed limit reduction. This notice allows the Town to begin preparations, but it cannot actually take action—installing signs—until a formal Notice of Order is received. The Notice of Order was finally delivered in May.

When the NYS DoT studied Comfort Road, it went beyond the Town's request. Based on the road and traffic conditions—safety concerns—it extended a speed limit to the entire road.

Sometimes, the Town's requests are not granted. Several years ago, the Town forwarded a request based on a neighborhood petition by residents of Yaple Road and nearby Comfort Road. At that time, the NYS DoT reviewed road usage and determined that Yaple needed a lower limit, but the nearby section of Comfort Road did not.

Just a few years later, the NYS Department of Transportation opted to re-study the usage of Comfort Road. This time around, the State DoT chose to add the entire length of Comfort into its study and determined that a lower limit was appropriate. Lesson learned: if a speed limit reduction is denied, a subsequent request may be approved if conditions have changed (additional traffic loads due to any kind of development, schools, or even pedestrian use).

Please be aware of, and considerate of, walkers, joggers, cyclists, and other pedestrian traffic on all roads in the Town of Danby. If you're passing a farm, watch out for the occasional roaming animal.

In order to be as accessible as possible, the Town Clerk's office is open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. Saturday hours are dropped for the summer. If there is a need outside of office hours, Sue McLellan or I can be available by appointment. As always, we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And yes, there's still chocolate in the bowl on the counter.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

Recent polls show that large numbers of Americans have lost confidence in government. However, a closer look at these polls shows that Americans have far more confidence in their local governments than they do in their state or national government. I am glad to see that result because I find our Town and County governments filled mostly with smart, dedicated people who are responsive to citizens' concerns. You can call them on the phone. They usually don't mind if you ask them a question when you see them in the supermarket.

I think one of the reasons people have lost confidence



in government at the state and national levels is corruption. It is well reported how 30 members of the NY State Legislature have been convicted or have had to resign for ethics violations during the past fifteen years.

In contrast, as far as I am aware, no elected official in Tompkins County has ever been convicted of a crime related to their office. I know two people who have been involved in local politics for more than 50 years, and neither of them could come up with a single instance of a corrupt elected official in Tompkins County. Maybe that is related to why people still have confidence in their local government.

The Tompkins County Legislature passed a resolution in May, calling on Albany to enact comprehensive ethics reform for the NY State Legislature. Basically, we are calling on Albany to establish an independent redistricting process, to limit outside income of state legislators, to mandate the disclosure of donors, etc.

There are at least eleven specific reforms we are calling for. I don't necessarily agree 100 percent with every single detail, but I voted for this resolution because I think ethics reform is a major ingredient necessary for restoring confidence in government. We can disagree with our elected officials about policies but, without honesty, integrity, transparency, ethical behavior, and accountability, we are not being truly represented by an authentic government.



SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

I will have to say that I do enjoy my new place in the calendar of spring. Every toad in the area seems to be slipping into my pond and annoying my koi with their spring-like behavior and song. The peepers are adding their own buzz in the background.

And the doves, I do like the doves, and the robins with their territorial spats, the blackbirds with their signature sounds. It's really a wonderful evening in this second week of May. My first sighting of the hummingbirds has topped it off.

All while I have stopped and listened in my garden. Pushing the boundaries of what to plant when, this year ahead of the deadline on the 15th. I tend to try and watch the oak buds for what has been, historically, mostly, a reliable indicator of frosts. I'm so enjoying the gift of comforting times that can bless this region in the spring, and I'm thankful of the time and opportunity to enjoy it.

As I go to sleep tonight it is snowing to beat the band.

Many of you who will receive this will probably be too busy to read it, what with end-of-year school agendas, summertime schedules being finalized, social and sports events, and busy time for families.

So what is new in Town business, and what's happening in June, July, and August? The Town Highway Department is now officially on summer hours, and is planning its summer repair and maintenance schedules.

The Town Board is reviewing our proposed groundwater protection laws. We've already declared ourselves as the lead agency for SEQR on this matter. Discussions will be on our agenda in June, with a public hearing to follow.

We have awarded preferred provider status to Renovus for our Solar Power Purchase Agreement, and we've had legal review of a change to our Real Property Maintenance Law, with respect to an increase in fines.

Broadband issues and the negotiations for a countywide Time-Warner contract are a background to the other projects we are engaged with.

We have already been working with individual homeowners about broadband installation issues, and knowing who else is having difficulties would be helpful to solve the problem, townwide. If you would like broadband, but do not have it as yet, please contact me. We will then attempt to map unserved areas and meet with the service provider to see if there are answers and solutions.

Which brings me to the other, more traditional broadband provider in our area. Presently, I sit on a team-with the City of Ithaca and the Towns of Ithaca, Dryden—trying to negotiate a contract with cable-TV providers to enhance line extensions to places like...new areas of Danby. These efforts have been thwarted by Time-Warner being bought out, and until we get access to the new owners, or force T-W to respond to our currently outstanding, unsigned contracts, well, perhaps we should begin talking to other cable service providers. I should have more info as we get into summer.

FIRE CHEFS, PART 1

Under State law, the Chief has exclusive control of the members of the fire department at all fires, inspections, reviews, and other occasions when the fire department is on duty. The Chief also has responsibility for all of the apparatus (engines, etc.), other equipment, and

communications gear. The Chief reports to the Fire Commission-

The Danby Fire District has two fire Companies, one in Danby and the other in West Danby. Both have volunteer Chiefs elected by the firefighters. This story covers West Danby's Chief, Scott Wendt.

Scott Wendt is the Fire Chief in West Danby. He has been a member of the West Danby and Rescue Company [facebook.com/westdanbyfire]

for 21 years and has been the Fire Chief for approximately 12 years.

Scott trained as a firefighter by taking three programs: the essentials of firefighting, intermediate firefighter, and advanced firefighter. In addition, he has taken other relevant firefighter courses. Each course covers a number of things. For example, the 'essentials' program covers basic rescue, command systems, Wildland fires, structure inspection, first aid, CPR and a physical ability test.

To qualify for Fire Chief, Scott continued with two levels of fire

officer courses as well as hazmat command training. He takes at least one further class each year, all related to what our departments do.

Leadership ability is an essential skill in a fire chief. Building an experienced and loyal team of volunteers that includes all the skills a fire company needs is a challenge. A chief needs to be involved or join in on many activities including training and work on the fire ground—especially in a small all volunteer fire company. He or she also needs to see the big picture, and the nuances of the work he or she is asking of the department. Understanding logistics and resource management is important, but a good fire chief must also know how to lay hose and handle an axe.

Scott is in command of 15 people, including several assistant chiefs, who respond to 70-80 calls a year. Many of those are mutual aid to Danby as well as neighbor-

ing departments like Newfield and

Spencer. In 2015, West Danby had 50 fire calls, more than half of them for mutual aid to Danby, and 23 Rescue / EMT calls. They calculated they worked on these calls for a total of 353.7 man hours—a relatively light load compared to 1236 man hours in 2014. Scott joined the volunteer fire

service because he had an interest in the department and had several friends who already belonged. His most rewarding moment was when someone who was involved in an ATV accident returned to say thank you for Scott's and the department's help. She remembered the ride in the back of his truck to the helicopter. After breaking her femur she healed well and had no real scar or no lasting complications from her injuries. We are glad she has recovered so well.

Chief Scott Wendt is always looking for firefighters. Finding and training more Emergency Medical Technicians is currently the most important need. However, anyone is welcome to help, at breakfast, bringing refreshments to calls, or

just driving trucks. If someone is thinking about joining, Scott tells them that he can find something for them depending on what they want to do. While there is some work involved, especially at first, the reward of helping someone in their time of need and having a good outcome is a huge satisfaction and a reason for the pride in what they do!

Scott's son Shawn isn't officially a member yet but volunteers a lot of his time. He is planning on joining the department as a junior member next year when he turns 16.

Typical Responsibilities Of Fire Chiefs Include...

- Plan, direct, and supervise the activities of the fire company as specified by law.
- Recruit new members.
- Establish and implement Operational Guidelines based on government regu-
- Have training programs developed and implemented to improve the skill of all in fire fighting and rescue procedures.
- Ensure adequate records are kept of all maintenance and training.
- Prepare and submit an annual budget request.
- Ensure that all government policies are followed.
- Maintain an effective working relationship with other Town and County departments.
- Deal with inquiries and complaints regarding fire department activities or responsibilities.
- Liaise with representatives of neighboring fire departments to ensure adequate mutual aid agreements.
- Participate in the local and regional emergency planning process.
- Participate in Fire Chiefs' meetings at the county level.

restoration of Danby's own Civil War Memorial—in front of our Town Hall—to DeWitt Park and memo-

rials all over the county, Danny is the unofficial steward of these important historical relics, harnessing his network of community-minded brethren to quietly, inexpensively, and professionally ensure these memorials endure.

The life and times of the ordinary soldier is his passion. Danny has toured the county's schools offering programs that share the wealth of knowledge

he has acquired over decades of passionate participation in encampments and in the study of the Civil War. Just this spring, Danny has been a featured guest for a 3-month long program presented by Danby's Youth Program, *Back to the Future*. Led by Program Manger Travis Judd, local youth have visited Harriet Tubman House and the county's memorials. The program will culminate with the living history encampment in June.


The encampment will be open to the public. You'll have the opportunity to observe the period dress of soldiers, cooks, chaplains, cavalrymen, and women. You can examine a variety of muskets and medals and learn what a gum blanket is—and which well-known company got its start making them. You'll get to sample a simple bean soup, provided by Betty Wheeler, Danny's wife and a member of the Auxiliary to the SUVCW. Bite down on some hard tack if you dare.

Danny's extensive Civil War library includes a gem titled *Hard Tack and Coffee* from which he shared that the original 2x2-inch squares were baked in the basement of the White House during the War and shipped to soldiers in the field.

Danny's call has mustered up a marvelous crew of participants including members of the 148th Company E Volunteer Infantry, Sydney Camp 41 Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 7th Cavalry (unmounted), and the Auxiliary to the SUVCW. The newly formed Finger Lakes Drum Corps will be on hand and *Uncle Joe and the Rosebud Ramblers* will play their extended repertoire of Civil War time favorites.

The event is a well-supported community affair. The Danby Community Park Association has graciously al-

lowed the use of Dotson Park for this two-day extravaganza. Pastor Ed Edstine and the Danby Community Church will host a breakfast Saturday morning and a service Sunday morning. Saturday's breakfast will fea-



If you haven't participated in an encampment before you may wonder what you are in for. Living history events incorporate historical tools, activities and dress into an interactive presentation that seeks to give observers and participants a sense of stepping back in time. As Danny puts it, "If a plane passes overhead, we don't see it or hear it." So, make sure to silence those cell phones as you step onto the field and into 1860 America.

Danby Breeding Bird Survey

According to census estimates, there are currently about 3500 people living in Danby, and a recent (2011) fishing, hunting, and wildlife-associated recreation survey

by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service calculated that 20 pecent of Americans age 16 and older are bird watchers.

To be counted as a birder in the survey, an individual must have taken a trip one mile or more from home for the primary purpose of observing birds and/or closely observed

or tried to identify birds around the home. So, people who happened to notice birds while they were mowing the lawn or walking their dog were not counted as birders. Estimating that roughly 75 percent of the population of Danby is over the age of 16, then according to the FWS statistics there should be about 500 bird watchers living in Danby.

Last year, to serve this robust contingent, a group of us compiled a list of the breeding birds of Danby based on our collective experience. That preliminary list along with estimated species abundance can now be found at [oldbird.org/DanbyBreedingBirds.html]. It includes

58 common species (est. >100 nesting pairs), 46 uncommon species (est. 10-100 nesting pairs), and 26 rare species (est. <10 nesting pairs), plus a few hypotheticals.

This year we invite the help of all Danby residents to participate in surveying Danby's breeding

birds during the week of June 11-18. Bird walks for all levels of expertise and a compilation brunch will be held on the following dates:

June 11: Birding along Michigan Hollow Road. 7:30AM-9:30am. Meet at Town Hall at 7am or find and join the group birding along the road. Easy walking, rain or shine.

June 12: *Breeding Warblers of Danby*. Meet at Town Hall at 8am. A three-hour driving and walking tour with multiple stops and moderate hiking to see and hear 15+ species of Danby's breeding warblers. Rain or shine.




June 18: *Birds of Dotson Park*. Meet at Town Hall at 9am. A 1.5 hour easy bird walk around the Park. Rain or shine.

June 18: Breeding Bird Compilation Brunch. The Danby Community Coun-

cil is sponsoring a lite brunch with coffee, tea, baked

goods, fruit & yogurt at Town Hall, 11am on Saturday, June 18 to compile and discuss the week's birding—all are welcome!
