BIRD COUNT RESULTS

The Ithaca area 117th annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count took place on a beautiful sunny New Year's Day. 148 volunteers in a 15-mile-radius circle centered on Varna hit the field or watched our bird feeders; our mission: to count every bird we saw.

Twelve of us were assigned to cover the Danby sector, one of ten sectors of the circle. It includes the inlet behind the big-box stores downtown, Upper and Lower Buttermilk Falls State Park, the hamlet of Danby proper,

Ithaca College, and all the open and forested spaces in between. We walked the train tracks along the inlet, drove from spot to spot, or sat at home watching backyard feeders--all the while counting and listing what birds were seen.

At 3:30 in the afternoon, many of us met in Danby's Town Hall to compile our sightings, with refreshments courtesy of Bill Evans and the Community Council. In addi-

TOIVO: FINNISH MUSIC AND ITS COUSINS Submitted by Ted Crane

Transfer of the Grand Duchy of Finland from Sweden to Russia in 1809 set the stage for a conflict not always cultural—that persists today. Mosquitoes still dominate politics in that part of the world. Finnish culture has been part of the Finger Lakes since the early 1900s, when Finns began escaping from "Russification" by emigrating to North America.

Finns brought social clubs and farm cooperatives, the



sauna (Finnish has more words for "steam" than Inuit has for "snow"), Cardamom-flavored Pulla bread, and music. Everyone in Finland, it seems, is a musical prodigy, even when they are living in the Finger Lakes.

According to Life in the Finger Lakes, South Danby Road

was once known affectionately as "Finn Boulevard". The west side of Cayuga Lake, right up to Trumansburg, is still known for its eclectic sauna styles. Living and quietly playing his accordion among the old-time musicians of Podunk and Swamp College Roads, Rich Koski created Toivo, a musical spirit of hope.

Don't ask how all that relates to Tex-Mex music, because it's a long story. Or a short story, depending on the length of the accordion bellows.

On Sunday, February 5, Danby will be treated to the multiple ethnic flavors called Toivo. The concert begins at 3pm in Danby's Town Hall, 1830 Danby Road (a.k.a., NYS Rt.96B).

Toivo includes Rich, his son Jason (mandolin), Stefan Senders (banjo), Jim Reidy (guitar), Harley Campbell (bass), and Annie Campbell (percussion).

TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

As I write this, we are halfway through January property tax collection. We're been working our way through the piles of payments coming in the mail and enjoying lots of visits with Danby neighbors who pay in person. We fully expect to be busy through the end of the month, with an avalanche of checks coming our way in the last week of January.

Tax bills were sent out at the very end of December.



If, for some reason you did not receive your Town, County, and Fire property tax bill, please call us as soon as possible. *The last day to pay this bill without an additional finance charge, or to pay with the installment option, was Tuesday January 31.*

The end of January does not mean that we are finished with tax collection. The Town, County, and Fire property taxes are collected at Danby's Town Hall through March 31. During these two months, taxes must be paid in full and will have a 1 percent per month penalty

added. And yes, payment is accepted by postmark date through the US mail.

Early in April we turn all tax collection over to Tompkins County Finance. Please note that second installment payments are made to Tompkins County Finance, located in the "Old Jail" building on Court Street in the City of Ithaca.

Remember, Town Clerks are only tax collectors. We don't set your assessment or the tax rates. I know that there's little I can do to make winter better than it is, but I can promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses including plenty of dark chocolate. Thanks to the generosity going into the "loose change chocolate fund" there will be plenty to go around.

Other business continues at the same time as tax collection. January is a busy time for the Town Board as well. The first meeting in January is always an "Organizational Meeting" when a large number of resolutions, that define how the Town does business, are passed. These include approval of salaries (as defined by the Town Budget, which was approved and adopted in November), various fiscal management resolutions, reaffirmation of various policies and procedures, designating the Town's official attorney, newspaper of record, and bank depository, and setting the regular times and dates for Town Board meetings. The Board also acknowledges departmental appointments of support clerks and deputies, such as Deputy Town Clerk Sue McLellan and Court Clerk John Norman.

Appointments to various boards are typically made at the beginning of the year. The Planning Board and BZA chairs were reappointed and reappointments made to the BZA and Conservation Advisory Council. While most appointments were made in January, there are still some vacancies to be filled. The Conservation Advisory Council still has open seats. This group does interesting and useful work, such as a town-wide Natural Resources Inventory and community outreach related to Conservation Easements. The Planning Board also has an open seat. Contact the Clerk's office for more information if you would like to get involved.

In order to be as accessible as possible, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. Saturday morning hours return to 10am-Noon. We are always closed on Thursdays and Sundays. *The last day to pay Town, County, and Fire tax without an additional finance charge, or to pay with the installment option, was Tuesday January 31.*

144KW SOLAR ARRAY SET FOR MARCH CONSTRUCTION Submitted by Paul Hansen, Code Enforcement Officer

After a year-and-a-half in the works, the Town of Danby is proud to report that a construction date has been set for a 144kW solar farm on the grounds of the Danby Highway Department. Thanks to the cooperation between the Danby Town Board and the Danby Fire District (which oversees the Danby Volunteer Fire Company and the West Danby Fire Company), the solar farm has become a

reality.

The Solar Farm will provide the electricity for the two Danby Fire Stations, the Danby Highway Department, the West Danby

Water District, Danby's 23 street lights, and the part of Town Hall's usage that is not covered by its existing solar array. The motivation for this project comes from the Town's ongoing commitment to decreasing our reliance on fossil fuels and its goal of saving taxpayer money.

Over the 25 years of the manufacturer-warranted power production of the solar farm, clean power will replace almost 7 million pounds of carbon dioxide that would otherwise be created by burning fossil fuels. This is equivalent to the emissions from burning 349,000 gallons of gasoline or 3,300,000 pounds of coal.

The Town will not have any up-front expense for the

solar farm and will begin saving taxpayer dollars about \$2500 in the first year, roughly ten percent of its total electric bill—immediately. The savings will increase each year.

Unlike your home-based, residential solar power systems, municipalities can not receive the financial incentives from NYSERDA that make solar power systems cost effective. Instead, they are allowed to contract with a third party that receives an even larger incentive when it purchases and installs the system.

The full arrangement is somewhat complicated. The State allows a third party to purchase the array, place it on Town property through a lease, and sell the en-

ergy to the Town at a reduced rate. The Town may then sell that energy to NYSEG at a higher commercial rate and apply that credit to its electric bill, even though the electricity is used in several different locations by separate branches of the government. Bottom line, the taxpayer saves money.

In ten years, the Town expects to purchase the solar farm at a price that is much less than the initial installation cost. After that, the Town will no longer have to purchase power from the third party and its cost savings will increase to about \$24,000 per year; our electricity will be almost cost-free. We will be green and we will save money.

The Town Board has been a consistent supporter of the project since it started in 2015. Without this support of the project, the project would never have been realized. Also, when this project was started, Sue Beeners was still with us, and this solar farm must be remembered as part of her legacy, as well as that of Matt Cooper, who was CEO at that time.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Mid-January, mild week ahead, daybreak sunrise touching the overnight frost meets sun to produce a blazing morning. Sitting in my sun room, soaking up the brightness, dreaming spring thoughts and, laptop in lap, I commence writing to you, checking in with my monthly update and trying to keep residents up to speed on current events.

You are reading this article as part of our Danby Area News, a monthly paper, that showcases events and information for residents and elected officials and anyone who wants to know what is going on in Danby.

Many many years ago, my wife was involved with the Danby News, so I have some first hand knowledge of what it entails. First, getting the material in a timely fashion never happens, and it all ends up crashing in at the last minute. Formatting material is always an interesting work in progress, stapling and mailing," deadlines", many deadlines to consolidate.

It is a huge time commitment, a work of love because no one could commit to accomplish this task month after unfailing month unless they have a deep commitment to the task.

There are many residents who give generously to our Town. It is a essential part of our town's health and well-being. Without our volunteers stepping up to the plate to fill the gaps the Town can not function. The Danby News is the place that tries to keep us all connected to what has happened, what is and what will be of interest to all our residents.

Thank you Ted Crane, we all owe you our gratitude for your commitment to the Town, and the wonderful Danby News you provide for us each month.

In other news, Paul Hansen, our zoning officer, has prepared an update on our solar farm project. Like all the long-term projects the Town takes on, the solar array is an exciting achievement many years in the making.

Other projects that has been long in the making, like broadband, are still unfinished. I am still committed to finding a solution for those still left unserved, so I am again asking any residents who have or are in negotiations with different service providers to let me know how these are going.

It is my understanding that if a geographic area of the town can band together and send out a request for proposals, there are at least three potential bidders with somewhat different solutions. The group can pick a service provider and split the cost of the solution.

That is my present understanding of how residents have been moving forward on this issue. I will be pursuing other possibilities, that the Town could do, and will keep you updated.

Going into the new year, the Town has passed new laws, some to further protect our aquifers and ground water resources, and some to strengthen our oversight of construction in Danby.

Late in 2016, during a combined meeting of our boards, three areas of focus were highlighted: the hamlet, updates and possible revisions of the numerous PDZs (planned development zones), and stream setbacks. Actions in these areas and proposals for possible changes in the zoning laws will be on our boards agenda for 2017.

I do wish that, when you read this, the day is as pleasant as is today.

County Legislature Update

Here is a roundup of several issues Tompkins County government is working on.

Energy

The County replaces its fleet cars on a 5-rotation. We are going to start rotating in electric cars as the internal combustion cars age out. We just got five Chevy Volts, and five more are scheduled to be rotated in later this year.

Tompkins County has entered into an agreement to purchase all the electrical output generated by a small hydroelectric plant in Seneca County. This green energy is now providing half of the electricity used by County government, at a price lower than what we were paying before.

Tompkins County is establishing an Energy Advisory Task Force to help with the various energy plans that have been generated in the last few years. This task force will be less about philosophy and debate, and more about implementation.

Housing

Tompkins County is involved in a project of Tompkins Community Action to build housing for 23 homeless youth in Ithaca. The County is involved in the financing but, in the end, no local tax money will be used. There are also plans in the pipeline for several more affordable housing projects. These projects would also be brought forth by not-for-profit agencies and the County would play a role to help bring the projects to completion.

Airport

As of the time of this writing (mid-January) we were still waiting to hear about some NY State grants that we were hoping to get for the airport. Terminal expansion is one of the projects we are requesting money for. Another project is to get a customs facility at our airport, so that planes could fly in directly from Canada and beyond.

A separate grant seeks money to help relocate the NY State Department of Transportation from its current location on Ithaca's waterfront to land adjacent to the airport. The current Department of Transportation site is prime real estate and could be developed for higher uses. If the facility relocated to the airport property, it could literally pave the way for other industrial uses there, as long envisioned in the County Master Plan.

GRANTS RELIEVE TAXPAYERS OF SOME COSTS

The Danby Fire District has applied for many grants during the past three years, and has received some that have lightened the tax burden for Danby businesses and residents.

As the reader knows, the Fire District receives the lion's share of its funding from property taxes. In an effort to moderate tax increases we have applied for over \$300,000 of grants from the Federal government, the State of New York, and from local government, private firms, and foundations.

We have been awarded grants totaling about \$85,000 from funders such as the Firehouse Subs Foundation, the State of New York Department of Environmental Conservation, the Triad Foundation, the Danby Fire Company, FEMA, Tompkins County Beautification Committee, True Insurance, Tompkins Trust Company, and the Town of Danby.

Two recent examples are the successful solicitation of grants to help fund the new electronic sign in front of the Danby Station, and the receipt of a grant to help pay for the engineering study completed last summer that led to substantial improvements in our apparatus.

More recently, one of the Fire Companies received a substantial private bequest and such private donations are always warmly appreciated.

The Danby Fire District has reinvigorated its efforts to seek grants as a way to provide needed apparatus, equipment, and training to serve the needs of our community. We appreciate any thoughts readers may have on this topic.



The Danby Fire District is comprised of two fire departments, Danby and West Danby, and provides fire and rescue services to our community 24-7 using an allvolunteer force.
