KLASSIC KLEZMER

Much of the Yiddish language has its origins in German, Hebrew, Aramaic, and Slavic words. It's no surprise that "Klezmer" (Hebrew: klay zemer, literally, "instrument music") contains elements

drawn from multiple cultures. In the *shtetlach* (small, Jewish villages in Eastern Europe), *klezmorim* (professional musicians, but less respectable than their high-brow cousins, the *muzikants*) wove their tunes into both culture and celebration.



Klezmer music followed the emigrant path to America but, like some other traditions, came to be viewed by the immigrants as an embarrassing holdover of the isolated Ghetto mentality they had escaped from. The roots movement of the mid- and late 20th century led to the revival of the Klezmer style...but what emerged was heavily influenced by American jazz.

The Cornell University Klezmer Ensemble is a mix of enthusistic amateurs and serious professionals.

Danby's Community Council is pleased to present a concert featuring several of CUKE's full-time musicians, on Sunday, April 9, at 3pm in Danby's Town Hall.

Many Klezmer tunes—the happier, faster ones—begin with the classic riff, "Ta Da, Da Dahhh," (remember those syllables, and see how well they fit the music!) but Klezmer is more than lively, pulse-pounding energy. There's nigunim, freylekhs, khazones, not to mention krekhts, glitshen, and kneytshen. As the great Max Epstein once said, "The difficulty is not to play the ornaments, but to play them right...but, 'never play it twice the same way—never!"

Yes, on Sunday, April 9, at 3pm—by chance, the afternoon of the first seder of Passover—you'll hear something different than you'd hear on all other afternoons. If you're not in a pickle, join CUKE for

Town Clerk's Desktop

Remember the blizzard of March 1993? That snowfall set a record, but this year's mid-March surprise came close. After almost two days of isolation, we've cleared our third-of-a-mile driveway (the ongoing snowstorm erased yesterday's attempt within a few hours) enough to allow a 4-wheel drive vehicle to escape. In the meantime—snowed in but toasty by the wood stove—I wrote this month's Clerk's article. I hope that everyone in Danby stayed as safe and warm!



I have hopes that the harsh cold of winter will soon be over, and that blue skies and sunshine will return for the Spring season.

There's a limited amount of things we can do from the Town Clerk's office to help Danby residents dealing with hazardous weather conditions. We get regular updates from County Emergency services and, when appropriate, we add those updates to the home page of the Town of Danby's web site [townofdanbyny.org]. They are also dis-

tributed to the Town's Email list. While we hope that this is helpful, we know that we will not replace other important local news sources such as the Ithaca Journal and Ithaca Voice. Check there for emergency road conditions, etc.

The Email list can also be used to send notices of upcoming public hearings. If you're not on the list and would like to get updates from the Town, it's easy to sign up. All the information you need is on the web site. Click on "News" link on the sidebar, directing you to the News page. Scroll to the bottom of that page where you will find "Subscribe to Town Of Danby News. Enter your email. You must "confirm submission" through your email account. Simple. We promise to not overfill your Email's InBox.

In truth, every family needs to create and prepare its own "toolbox" for dealing with hazardous weather conditions—whether those are snow storms, flooding, rain, high winds, or power outages. Have supplies on hand at home, including battery powered lighting, needed medications, and a food supply.

It's a good idea to know your neighbors and know how to reach them. Several Danby neighborhoods have created their own local Email contact lists. This is a wonderful thing, and is particularly helpful for checking in on the aged and infirm. Staying connected is one of the best ways to help us protect each other.

Snow storms aside, one sure sign of the end of winter has come and gone: property tax collection has ended for our office. After March 31, all property taxes (including second installment payments) are paid to Tompkins County Division of Finance (125 East Court Street, Ithaca). Second installments are due by July 1, 2017.

From March through mid-May, the Town Clerk's office is open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. As always, we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And, thanks to generous contributions to the chocolate fund, the bowl of kisses is full.


What is HeatSmart?

Branches of Government: Federal vs New York State Towns A Quick Primer, by Ted Crane



The governmental structure of a New York State Town, like the Town of Danby, is similar to the Federal organization created by the U.S. Constitution.

At first look, the major difference is that the role of the Federal Executive Branch—the President— is split into three elected officials: the Supervisor, the Clerk, and the Highway Superintendent.

The Supervisor runs the Town's day-to-day operations, including the employees not working for the Clerk or Superintendent, and pays the bills. The Supervisor is also a voting member of the Town Board and chairs its meetings.

The Town Clerk's position has no parallel at the Federal level. The Clerk's office is responsible for all non-Judicial record-keeping, including the creation of a objective historical record of Town actions. This form of "check and balance" is not present at the Federal level, where each branch writes its own history (which occasionally leads to inter-branch conflicts). The Clerk often acts as the Public Information Officer and Tax Collector.

The Highway Superintendent runs the Highway Department which, in a sense, is as if the Federal Secretary of Transportation was elected directly by voters.

Things get considerably more complicated when you try to draw a picture of the budgeting process...and add Fire Districts and Water Districts into the mix. More on that, next month.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

I guess the snowmobilers have had their day or two to play, plus the skiers and snowshoers. I was feeling sorry for them last month before the snow came down; how quickly the weather—as life—can be one thing one day and so different the next.

OK, winter came back. I was actually able to start my snowblower, which has been standing idle for some time, to help out. In the middle of it, I had the opportunity to ride shotgun in one of the Town trucks to see, first hand, what plowing our roads in a bear storm is like.

I have a renewed respect for our Highway staff. Under heavy snow, there is only the memory of a road to guide the drivers. Up in the truck, the roads and ditches appeared as one to me. I am sure my impressions, riding along for first time, doing something I take for granted, are my own...but I have to say I was impressed.

The Town is in constant motion, with a wide variety of duties that can go on twenty four hours a day. Whether it is the Fire Department responding to an emergency, our Town Justices being called in for an arrest in the middle of the night, or plowing our roads, someone is there to respond.

The Planning Board, CAC, BZA, Community Council, Justices, Town Board all have tasks to accomplish. Code Enforcement, Clerk, Historians, Archivist, Bookkeeping, and even Supervising are all jobs in motion.

Why would a Town want to encourage commercial enterprises in one place and not in another? Why are stream setbacks receiving more attention? What does the water look like underground, and why is it so important? Why does the Water District need a second well, who is baby-sitting that whole enterprise? Why does the Community Council want to include Newfield youth in the programs it provides? Are we aware of, and who is working on problems affecting our youth, our elderly, our disabled? How is our food pantry doing? How many culverts need replacing, how to manage storm water, and which road foundations need remediation?

Why is the Brown Road project important to the above questions?

The Town has a history that we can learn from. The Town is an entity that needs feeding, the Town has a future and needs planning for. There is a world we all live in, there is the world of our lives, and there is a world that is happening all around us. We call it Danby and it goes on largely unseen by many of us who abide here.

Goals have to be established, priorities have to be set, funds have to be set aside. Residents have to come together to grapple with these issues. Events are happening in our nation,in our state, and in our county, but Danby is where the rubber meets the road.

This is your town, this is my town, this is our Town. In my opinion we live in a great town, an engaged town, a progressive Town, a Town that has a past, present, and future. Where can we do better? Let me hear from you, let me know about your life here in Danby.

Not!



Since 2009, New York State has prohibited any burning of trash, and has very strict limitations on other open burning. No burning at all is allowed from March 16 through May 14.

During the rest of the year, essentially, the only open burning allowed is:

● Campfires less than 3 feet in height and 4 feet in width or diameter.

2 Small cooking fires.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

Tompkins County was created in 1817 and the first County Board of Supervisors meeting was held in April of that year, 200 years ago. The first order of business to authorize payment of \$3,500 for construction of the courthouse, the requirement to become a County.

History buffs and fans of Tompkins County in general can see the original handwritten "proceedings" of this meeting, and then all the meetings since 1817, at [lfweb.tompkins-co.org/weblink/Browse.aspx?dbid=12]. It is fascinating and sometimes funny to look at these proceedings. Most are about expenditures, and many of the dollar amounts are in the single digits.

For the bicentennial anniversary of Tompkins County, I want to write about everything County government does. This is an impossible task in 400 words, so I am going to cover part of what we do this month and continue the article next month.

I find that almost no one realizes the full scope of what Tompkins County government is involved in--I certainly didn't before I got involved. I highlight individual departments in depth in this column sometimes, and will continue to do so. This month's column will have to be not much more than a list. However, I hope it helps you appreciate, as I do, the roles the County plays. And maybe you can imagine what "a day without Tompkins County government" might be like.

Tompkins County Airport: As other upstate airports lose airline service, we are poised to become a prime regional facility.

Assessment Department: We are one of only two Counties in NYS to have countywide assessment—a much fairer system.

Assigned Counsel: Legal representation to low-income people. We are now providing this service to neighboring counties for a fee.

County Clerk: besides handling all the necessary legal filings, the Clerk promotes organ donation, helping to make Tompkins County the number one county in NYS for organ donation.

Board of Elections: Tompkins County had the highest percent turnout of any county in NYS for both the primary and the general election in 2016, and the Board of Elections made sure it all went smoothly.

Department of Emergency Response: You are safer because of this sophisticated County function, which has recently established radio interoperability with neighboring counties.

Health Department: Operates dozens of programs to keep us all healthy, the most visible of which in the last year had to with the drought and lead in drinking water.

Danby Comm. Library Turns 27

The Danby Community Library (DCL), formerly known as the Danby Reading Center, opened its doors in April 1990.

Before 1990, Danby received library services from Bookmobiles, but that service was discontinued by the Finger Lake Library Service (FLLS). Danby citizens felt a strong need for a library, so, with support from Danby's Town Board, from the County Representative at the time, Frank Proto, and from community petitions, the Danby Reading Center was realized.

Matthew Decker and his mother, Donna Decker, were instrumental in the Library's founding. Their request to the Town Board and the Finger Lakes Library System Board of Trustees to start the Reading Center was approved in November, 1989. Matthew fulfilled his Eagle Scout project by working as a Reading Center volunteer and building bookshelves to hold 1,500 books. The nine bookshelves still stand today, a testament to his hard work and craftsmanship.

The DCL continues to this day, operating under the oversight of the Tompkins County Public Library (TCPL). It is run entirely by volunteers coordinated by Danby resident Patti Meyers. Dawn Parks is the DCL's

longtime advocate and volunteer extraordinaire. When you see her at the Town Hall, please thank her for her dedication to the library!

Danby's library collection consists of Fiction and Non-Fiction books for adults and children. There is a section devoted to Large Type Books, and racks full of Biographies, CDs, Books on CD, and DVDs.

Visit frequently because new books--including New York Times bestsellers and popular DVDs--appear often. In addition to the in-house collection, you can also select books from the TCPL's rotating selection of items, which changes every six months.

The Library is open Wednesdays, 1:30-3:30pm, Saturdays 10am-Noon, and whenever the *Open* flag is waving. Please stop by and check out our collection!

Without the support of Danby residents, The Town Board, The Tompkins County Public Library, and its strong core of volunteers, the Library would not be where it is today. Thank you!
