#### TICK TIME

The final installment of health-related informative presentations organized by one of our local Eagle Scouts, Cole Janda, will take place on Wednesday, June 7, at 7pm in Danby's Town Hall.

Mary Woodsen will talk about ticks, Lyme disease, and more.

Lyme disease and its "co-infections" (anaplasmosis, bartonella, babesiosis, and now powassan) are carried by black-legged ticks, a.k.a., deer ticks, and can be transmitted in as little as fifteen minutes. Lyme disease grabs the headlines but the others, if less common, can be just as nasty.

One bite can change your life.



#### Dog Licensing

Golden and Labrador Retreivers, Terriers, Chihuahuas, Collies, Beagles, Spaniels, Bulldogs, Mastiffs, Boxers, Hounds, Shih Tzus, Sheepdogs, Setters, Poodles, Pomeranians, Pointers, Lhasa Apsos, Pugs, Dobermans, Basset Hounds, Dachshunds, Shepards, Huskys, Rottweilers, Schnauzers, and "Other Mixed Breeds—Danby has them all. They live on Bald Hill Road, Beardsley Lane, Coddington, Comfort, Durfee



Hill, Gunderman, Station, and Michigan Hollow Roads. They can be found at Fieldstone Circle, Fisher Settlement, Maple Ave, and Meadow Wood Terrace. In fact, whether its main roads or dirt back roads, it would be hard to find a road in Danby where dogs don't live.

There are currently 580 dogs living and licensed in Danby.

All of these dogs, whether large or small, young or old, need to be licensed. This is required by New York State, even though all of the licensing is managed

at the local level in Danby. Dog Licensing is seen as a public health matter, so that animals can be traced to their owners in case there is a problem. Problems might include aggressive behavior that threatens or harms other animals or humans. Licensing is part of an effort to encourage proper animal care including vaccinations against rabies and spay/nueter to prevent unwanted increases in the animal population.

Licensing is also a protection for the dogs themselves, in case they wander off, get lost, or are stolen. Local license ID tags make it much easier to return a lost dog to its owner. People frequently move in and out of Danby...particularly transitioning through rental properties at the north end of town. As people come and go, so do their dogs. If you get a renewal notice for someone no longer living at your address, please help us keep our database up to date by letting us know that that dog and human companion have moved on. You can call us at 607.277.4788.

And, of course, dogs do eventually die. Let us know if your dear companion has passed away, so that we can correct our records and save you the pain of seeing a renewal notice for a dog who is no longer with you.

I'm happy to say that 90 percent of dog owners in

Danby relicensed their animals on time. Thank you to all who do. This saves the Town time and money, and reduces paper waste by avoiding the need to send additional monthly renewal notices. Dog owners have a grace period of three months to pay without a penalty. In 2014, The Town Board authorized a late fee of \$3 per month, to help cover the costs of sending follow-up monthly reminders. We have gotten very few complaints—possibly because almost all dog owners are punctual and responsible.

#### Free Rabies Clinics

An updated rabies vaccine certificate is required to renew dog licenses each year. Many Danby pet owners rely on the free rabies clinics, provided by the Tompkins County Health Department, to keep their animals healthy. Proof of prior vaccination is required to receive a three year certificate for cats and dogs.

The Health Department held its Spring Clinic in Danby on May 4. Fall clinics will be held in Newfield, Groton, Caroline, and Trumansburg. Those with questions about the spring and fall free Rabies Clinics should call the Environmental Health Division of the Health Department at 607.274.6688.

As a reminder, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. The office has shifted to Summer Hours, dropping Saturday mornings, but I will try to accommodate you if you call for a Saturday appointment.

### DICK OLTZ: OUR FRIEND

We lost a good one on Wednesday, May 3. Dick Oltz, a long-time Comfort Road resident and our long-time friend, passed away at age 74 from Alzheimer's and a systemic bacterial infection in his prosthetic knee.

He was a dear man who served the community and others. Dick joined the Danby Volunteer Fire Company in July, 1981, served at least two 6-year terms as Assistant Chief, and two 5-year terms as a Fire Commissioner. One member reported that he was the first to volunteer for projects and had a lot of input on the recent expansion of the firehouse.

Both Dick and his wife Judy, who predeceased him by two years, were always involved in food events at the firehouse, whether a chicken BBQ, pancake breakfast, Danby Fun Day, or bringing meals to a member in need (like when Chief John Gaden had his motorcycle accident). Dick and Judy were also quite active at the American Legion.

Judy made a wonderful plate of food or dessert—boy could she cook! We were honored and treated to sit at her table for a meal or a dessert. Even when crippled herself with hip and leg pain, she would bake something wonderful and bring it over with her on a visit.

Dick did all the welding for Russ on his farm equipment and often welded things up that Garry needed. Dick was an excellent welder! Dick worked many years at Agway when it still was an agriculture-based business and welded together lime spreading trucks. He then switched over to working at Cornell and welded for them until he retired from problems with both knees.

His sense of humor never left, even up to the end. You would ask Dick, "How are you doing?" to which he would respond, "I'm here!" He'd say of his ailing knee, "Hey, can we get the doctor to put a grease fitting on it so I can pump some grease in and make it move better?" He had a sign on his porch that read, "Fish Fear My Name." When visiting him at Hospice on King Road in January, Russ was sharing a story and in it he said how he had gotten dressed to look like a normal person, to which Dick interrupted and said, "Since when were you ever normal?" His daughter, the other visitor, and I burst into laughter. All this while he supposedly had dementia! He would come and go with his cognizance, but he was still quite quick witted.

Danby will be a bit different without him.

Dick was an avid outdoorsman. He planted food plots for the deer and turkeys on his property and hunted them with his bow and gun. He was an active member at Flashing Feathers Bow club that sends five or more kids to the DEC kids camp every year.

Dick was simply a nice man, easy to get along with. He would help anyone out. Russ says, "Dick was one of the first who befriended me when I moved into town some 17 years ago. Others saw me as an outsider. Dick saw me as a human and a friend. Our friendship grew and we spent time together and helped one another. Isn't that what friendship is all about?" Garry says, "Gay and I enjoyed a long friendship with Dick and Judy. They were just good, everyday folks and time spent with them was enjoyable. The memories I have of Dick and I getting ready for hunting season will always remain with me. Gay says she will miss Dick's unique sense of humor!"

We want to give tribute to our friend Dick Oltz and hope that his memory would inspire others to be as great as he was! Though the sugar house on Comfort Road will burn wood no longer, nor will it evaporate water from the sap of sugar maples, a new sap house on Russ' land will be raised this summer in town with his name on it to honor him. It will be called The Dick Oltz Sugar House. Sap will flow into the unit that he welded together and fabricated with his own hands. We will reminisce about Dick as we take in the wonderful aromas of maple steam rising from his stainless steel evaporating pan. When the fire is stoked we will once again remember this kind man. ### SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Plans for much-needed repairs and improvements to Town Hall were discussed during the May 15 meeting of the Town Board.

The present situation finds an access ramp with a steep grade that does not meet standards, failing ramp and stair railings, and broken sidewalks and curbs.

One proposed plan would provide handicapped access without a ramp, via changes to the front (road-facing) facade and interior design of the building. This would eliminate the need for the current ramp and sidewalk, and they could be replaced with plantings.

Our solar project has moved to shovel ready status, and I do hope I can write more in the July Area News.


Our Town Planner wrote, and the Highway Department received, a grant to study erosion problems on Brown Road. The test bores are in and are being analyzed by our engineering firm. ### WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

uring May, I attended the New York Rural Water Association's annual conference in

Niagara Falls. There were several tank cleaning companies there and it is time for us to have our first tank cleaning, so I talked to some of them. We also have other maintenance issues and the conference was a good place to learn about different solutions.



On top of that, each day was scheduled full of sessions on water topics, many of which were pertinent to us. I attended a lot of them.

We passed our annual Tompkins County Health Department inspection on May 10.

local issues while also being mindful that our problem is not just being washed downstream to our northern neighbors.

South Danby Road will receive a major remake this summer. In addition to new paving, culverts will added to ease erosion problems. Ditching has already begun; signs will go up well in advance of additional work such as paving.

The Town will be improving Curtis Road this summer. At the Hill Road end, which is currently dirt, Curtis will get a stone and oil finish. A cross culvert will also be installed near the cemetery to improve drainage.

The top of West Jersey Hill Road (if you've driven it lately, you know the spot) is going to have its surface smoothed and the stone and oil finish restored. Ridgecrest Road, from the town line to Nelson Road, will be repaired and sealed.

And, finally, the Highway Department is going to seek approval from the Town Board to put a stone and oil finish on the remaining portion of Hill Road (from Curtis to the "seasonal" road).

There is a third round of New York State funding for Broadband infrastructure. We have encouraged our service providers to review the remaining gaps and apply for grants. Hopefully, some solutions will be forthcoming for those still unserved.

### COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

How much do you plan to spend during the month of December 2018? It's a strange question, of course, and one you probably aren't thinking about. However, Tompkins County has already begun its budget process for next year.

The budget process involves a lot of guessing, some of it trying to project what the economic conditions are going to be 18 months from now. This is difficult enough

in a normal year. This year, however, there are at least two factors that make predicting even harder than usual. One factor is local, one is national.

You can probably guess what the national factor is. Whatever you think about President Trump, I think there may be one thing we can all agree on about him: the rules and assumptions we have used in the past no longer seem to apply. There is simply no way to predict what is going to happen in Washington that might affect us.

One item of many: President Trump is supporting a measure that would shift Medicaid costs in New York State from the counties to the state. If this were to occur, something like 1/3 of the entire County property tax burden would disappear. How do you budget for next year with an unknown as big as that?

The local topic that may drastically affect next year's budget is the jail issue. I have written about this before. NY State has told Tompkins County that we either need to decrease the number of people we have in our jail by a lot, or we need to build a bigger jail. Both options are expensive.

We have set a goal for the 2018 budget to stay under the 2.4 percent estimated tax cap. Such a budget would

increase the County tax bill for the average home in Tompkins County by about \$24.

I want to stress that this is just a stated goal, that anything can change, and that we will not be done with the budget process until late November. We don't know yet what is going to happen with the jail, but we do know that we will likely be spending more money on either a new structure or on programs to reduce rates of incarceration, or possibly both. And we certainly don't know what changes may occur on the federal level that will affect us either positive-

ly or negatively.

### THE VALUE OF VOLUNTEERS

The Danby Fire District benefits from the many hours volunteers donate to your safety. There are several ways to estimate the value of such service.

One is to calculate what a paid fire department would cost. We estimate the value at about \$1 million to \$1.5 million per year. This would provide only four firefighters spread over the two stations for 24 / 7 coverage and require further costs to add firefighters as needed. This would mean a tripling or quadrupling your fire property tax.

A second way is value the estimated hours volunteers serve. Last year they gave about 5,000 hours answering calls and training. The President's Points of Light program values this time at \$24.36 per hour, for a total of about \$121,800.

A third way is to estimate the costs to contract with surrounding fire departments to serve our Town. This is the hardest to estimate but we have some data that suggests it would cost over \$350,000 per year.

In all, then, we estimate the value of the volunteer services to be at least \$120,000 per year and as much a \$1.5 million per year; a very big contribution indeed! You might want to thank them the next time you meet a volunteer.



### FIRE DISTRICT'S MANDATORY COSTS

Every year, the Danby Fire District must comply with State mandated regulations. The need for fiscal probity and common sense suggests we take additional appropriate measures to protect the taxpayer's assets. However, these regulations and measures cost the District money.

The total expense for these is close to \$270,000—more than half of our 2017 budget. A short listing of these costs includes:

#### State Mandated costs

- Our equipment is subjected to annual tests: hose testing costs \$2,900; ladder testing \$750; and pump testing \$1200. Flow tests on the breathing apparatus are \$2,600 annually.
- We also must maintain Workers Compensation insurance for our volunteers and that costs about \$29,000 a year.
- Vehicle inspections are, of course, a further annual cost.
- We are required to provide physicals for our volunteers and that costs about \$4,800 each year.

#### Other Costs we must pay

- Interest and principal costs on our outstanding debt total \$168,000 per year.
- Because part of our Fire District is quickly accessible to an adjoining fire department, and far enough from our stations to render our response unacceptable, we have elected to contract with that adjoining district to cover this for about \$14,000 per year.
- We have our books audited once a year to assure the government and the taxpayers that our fiscal position is correctly stated and the fee for the audit is \$7,500.
- Life insurance on the volunteers is a perk we elected to provide several years ago and that cost about \$7,000 a year. Other insurance costs us \$24,000 annually.
- We use a lawyer to review certain documents and advise us on other matters and this is about \$5,500 each year.

The total for the above is close to \$267,250 or 52 percent of the Fire District's 2017 budget.

## BROADBAND AND NET NEUTRALITY Submitted by Ted Crane

Action by the FCC last month caught the eyes of techies and consumer advocates alike. The FCC Board of Governors began the process of dismantling a policy known as "net neutrality."

The FCC, surprisingly for what would seem to be a technical organization, is headed by a five-person board of political appointees. Generally, the majority are appointed by the seated President, and that majority recently shifted along with its policy goals.

You've probably seen dozens of explanations of net neutrality. From a technical point of view, it's the idea that the big carriers who own the wires that connect the country to the internet, will give equal rights (priority) to all traffic, regardless of where the traffic is coming from or going to.

The issue that has arisen over the years, is that several of these carriers and *also* what is known as content providers. You know, a Mega-Media Monolith that owns both the wires *and* the company that is broadcasting TV shows and movies (not to mention advertising). It's only human nature for the MMM to want to ensure its own profit by giving its own programming priority on its own wires.

You, as a customer, might find that, if your content is delivered by—or via—the MMM, then competitors' programming will begin to suffer halts, drop-outs and worse.

Or, to put it another way...remember the recent airline fiasco when a passenger was dragged out of a seat he had paid for and was sitting in? That airlines' policy, at that time, was to prioritize the seating of its own employees, for its own profit. One poor fellow's travel, as a result, was, well, dropped out.

Anti-net-neutrality advocates take the position that, if carriers are not allowed to prioritize their own products (to maximize income), then they will not have incentive or funding to continue expanding their wire networks.

One of our local ISPs is an independent provider; it doesn't have any stake in the content it carries and is likely to continue net neutrality, regardless of what the FCC does. However, it does rely on bigger providers to carry traffic nationwide. Other providers, well, they are part of Mega-Media Monoliths; we'll see what happens.

If it looks like a pumpkin, we will call it a pumpkin (no gourds allowed!). Only one pumpkin can be submitted per contestant (multiple contestants per family okay). A point score of weight in pounds times the maximum girth in inches will be used to determine the largest pumpkin.

The measurement date is October 8. Pumpkins can be brought to Town Hall on the 8<sup>th</sup> for measurement or a representative of Danby Community Council can come to the site of the pumpkin and make the measurement.

Contestants are encouraged to register by July 8 via Email to [wevans@danbycc.com] or in person at the Natural History Booth at Danby Fun Day. Seeds from the Big Max pumpkin variety will be available from the Community Council during its June 1 meeting, 7pm in Danby's Town Hall, and at the Town Clerk's Office.

All competing pumpkins are welcome for display at the Danby Harvest Festival in October with entrants receiving a certificate of participation and the top three winners an award.
