## **GRANTS RELIEVE TAXPAYERS**

The Danby Fire District has been awarded two new grants totaling more than \$130,000. FEMA's \$125,000 grant is for new self-contained breathing apparatus or SCBA equipment, our firefighters' protection against the nasty stuff in smoke. A \$7,500 grant from the Triad Foundation is intended for an air compressor to fill the SCBAs.

The Danby Fire District has reinvigorated its efforts to seek grants to provide needed apparatus, equipment, and training to serve the needs of our community. We appreciate any thoughts readers may have on this topic.

The Danby Fire District is comprised of two fire departments, Danby and West Danby, and provides fire and rescue services to our community 24x7 using an all-volunteer force. 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
## Town Clerk's Desktop

#### Accessibility

Accessibility can have different meanings in the context of local government. This is especially true in the relationship between accessibility and the Town Clerk's office.

Residents may be looking for access to their elected officials and professional staff, in order to ask questions and express their concerns. There may be a need for access to information and documentation



of all kinds. The Town Clerk's office is quite literally the "information booth" for many municipalities, and Danby is no exception.

For those with physical impairments, accessibility can be as basic as their ease and ability to enter a building and use the facilities. We are trying to make our Town Hall as accessible as possible. Plans are being made for alterations to Town Hall, to improve physical accessibility. Our current wheelchair ramp is too steep and does not meet the requirements for public buildings. The route

from the parking lot to an accessible entrance has been problematic, especially because the sidewalk has deteriorated over time.

The Town Board has been, and will be continue to be, discussing improvements. They are carefully considering what these changes will mean for the appearance of our historic building. A public information session will be part of Board meetings in the next month. Residents are encouraged to come, listen, and ask questions.

One of the services offered by the Town Clerks' office is the issuance of hanging tags (for rearview mirrors) to permit use of accessible parking.

For the benefit of our residents, here is a reminder about the process for receiving these parking permit tags. There are two kinds of tags: red for temporary permits and blue for permanent tags. Whether a request is for a temporary or permanent tag, the process starts with a prescription from your doctor or medical provider. This should note the reason for the need andfor temporary permits--an estimated date of recovery. There is also a form that must be completed with basic residence and contact information. When requesting a renewal, a follow up prescription from the issuing physician is required. It is also recommended for a renewal of a permanent access parking permit. The renewal process can be done by mail but it is faster and easier if done in person. Please note that only one tag is issued and it with the person, not with a vehicle. The permit can be only be used in a vehicle carrying the person to whom it was issued.

People may or may not have noticed a change in the design of these hang tag permits. Last year the NYS Department of Transportation changed the name from "handicap permits" to "accessible permits". The wheelchair icon is now more dynamic and pictures action and ability. The bottom line for permit holders is, they have an injury or condition that makes it harder to move around and it is appropriate for them to have a preferred and reserved parking spot at businesses and municipal locations. That condition may not be obvious to the eye.

As a reminder, the Town Clerk's office is open and accessible (in all meanings of the word) 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. During summer hours, until early September, we are closed on Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays.

More than a dozen people have stepped forward so far, and the committee is looking for more volunteers. If you can help, please contact [sgaden@danbyfiredepartment.org].



### WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE Submitted by Tod Sukontarak, Water Commissioner

The Water District commissioners met on June 14 to discuss several maintenance issues for our infrastructure.

We are now at the 3 year anniversary of having our new water tank installed. The recommended tank inspection and cleaning period is three to five years. During the meeting we all agreed that we prefer to be on the

early part of the schedule for the first cleaning, to get an idea of what three years of sediment looks like...before possibly deciding we can go with the five year interval next time. We are now getting the paperwork in order to begin the bidding process.



While at the NYRWA

annual conference in Niagara Falls in May, I learned that we should have the well itself inspected and possibly cleaned. We haven't been on a schedule for this at all. Money spent having an inspection even if we are not in need of cleaning will be good investment.

If it turns out that we do need our well cleaned, it can be done during the same visit as the inspection. There are fewer companies that inspect and clean wells (compared to tanks) and we are researching them.

The last infrastructure issue to be addressed this summer is having the roof on the pump house repaired. It is leaking on the west side.



## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

This month I would like to draw your attention to our July Board meetings.

In past issues of the Danby News, I have indicated that the Town Board was reviewing plans for renovations to our Town Hall. Those plans will be presented for approval in July.

The changes to Town Hall will include a new, codecompliant handicapped entrance, and a new door and windows for the "front", east side of the building that faces NYS Rt.96B. Inside the new doorway, improved storage spaces along with fresh paint are being considered for approval.

## TINY HOUSES IN DOTSON PARK!

Bluebird Families Need Only Apply Submitted by Alison Christie, Community Park Association

During the spring of 2016, Danby's Community Council invited local families to participate in bluebird house construction. The resulting fifteen or so houses were to be installed in Danby's Dotson Park.

On a gorgeous, warm, late April afternoon this year, after letting the houses winter over, eleven of the houses were installed in Dotson Park by DCC members and their families. It turns out that birds prefer some 'weathering' of their accommodations before setting up housekeeping.

The next step is the establishment of an official Nestwatch program in Dotson Park. Through this Citizen Science program, Danby families and residents become Nestwatch-certified and will be able to participate in gathering data on nesting events in the boxes. We will organize volunteers to oversee and to participate in this program early next year.

Following a recent bird walk in Dotson Park, local birding guru Bill Evans reported on the DCC's Facebook page that all of the houses were already occupied by...House Wrens. Apparently, the wrens didn't get the memo that these are bluebird boxes. Next time you are strolling in Dotson Park, look for the bluebird boxes and take a careful peek inside.

Contact [dotsonpark@gmail.com] to express your interest in volunteering for this project. A second, related proposal includes a cleanup and redesign for the "side", north entrance that faces the parking lot (the doors that most people currently use to enter the building).

Your input is important to us, so try to make this meeting on July 10.

I wrote last month that the Solar PV project (on the grounds of the Highway Department, but also serving Town Hall and the Fire Departments, was shovel ready. It still is, but is still stalled pending finalization by the group that is providing up-front financing. Let's try for good news in July!

Culverts, bridges, ditching, and paving, will disrupt some travel in Danby, but I guess you already got that.

A new local law intended to promote the use of smaller Solar PV systems in Danby—and regulate larger, commercial installations—will also be reviewed during July. We've included input from both local residents and the County's Planning Board.

We're beginning the process of creating, proposing, and discussing some changes to our Zoning Ordinance. These have been on the agenda for several Town Board meetings, and will continue to be during the summer and fall. Topics that have been mentioned include the review and possible elimination of our mostly unused Planned Development Zones and the review of our rules for Special Permits. Both of these practices are no longer commonly used in Zoning—and have proved troublesome in Danby.

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## COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

There are always plenty of big issues going on. Today I'm going to write about some small things I've been working on.

Last month, the County Legislature authorized spending \$10,254 a year to provide public WiFi internet access in four locations in Tompkins County government buildings that are used heavily by the public. Having access to the internet is becoming an expectation in our society. In addition, we encourage people to participate in County government. Increasingly, participating involves access to the internet to look at agendas and supporting documents being discussed at meetings.

Like many things, there were questions to be answered before just flipping a switch to provide public WiFi access. After considering options, we decided to use an outside vendor to provide the service. This provides security to our existing computer network, greater bandwith than we could easily and reliably provide, minimal input from our already very busy Information Technology staff, and no need for future maintenance or upgrades.

We will soon have login information and rules posted in some County government meeting spaces.

Another non-headline grabber that I have been working on is credit card acceptance by the County. Right now, we do not accept credit card payment for most of our services. We are looking into what it will take for

landfill, you know you already have more than enough plant matter for the compost. It seems wasteful when you know there are people all around you who would love to eat your vegetables, even if you can't remember when a zucchini felt like a treat.

Friendship Donations Network's /Neighborhood Food Hubs/ make donating garden produce easy. Simply drop off your extra vegetables, fruit, and eggs at one of the seventeen Neighborhood Food Hubs and they will be distributed by area food programs the next day!

Danby's hubs will, once again, be located at 222 Bald Hill Road and at the corner of Marsh and Hornbrook Roads, both on Wednesdays, 8am-8pm, July 12-October 11. Donations will be distributed by the Danby Food Pantry; on weeks when pantry isn't held, directly to other individuals and food pantries in the area. our financial systems to accommodate this. Also, we are considering several policy questions associated with this upcoming change.

One policy issue has to do with how credit cards work. When you charge your groceries to your credit card, the store is charged a fee by the credit card company. The store passes that cost along to you in the form of higher prices on groceries, regardless of whether or not you pay by credit card.

The County will also get charged this extra fee. By law, we can't pass this extra fee on to everyone as the stores do, so we will likely tack on a surcharge for use of credit cards. There is probably no other way we can accept credit cards.

Some legislators have also questioned the ethics of allowing credit cards to be used for paying taxes. The issue being raised is that maybe some low income people will get in worse financial condition by using credit cards and incurring ongoing penalties and interest if they are not able to meet their payments.

I am happy to work on the smaller stuff as well as the big stuff. The big stuff is obviously important, but small things affect our quality of life too. One of my favorite quotes is, "It isn't the mountain ahead that will wear you out--it's the grain of sand in your shoe."

The Danby Fire District is staffed by volunteers, I from the chiefs down through the ranks to the newest newbie. Sometimes we are injured while trying to help you; once, one of ours died at a fire scene. Many of ours have passed on from other causes.

Today, we honor our dead.

#### Died in the Line of Duty

On January 7, 1956, Norman Mabee, a Danby volunteer fireman died fighting a fire that destroyed the Danby Town Barn. He collapsed after entering the burning barn to remove equipment. Coroner Ralph Low determined Mabee suffered a heart attack complicated by smoke poisoning. The cause of the blaze in the two-story frame barn was determined to be sparks from a wood fire that had escaped through a break in the chimney.

Thanks to our rainy Spring, the water level is back to normal and the water has been refreshing since we opened for the season on June 22.

## DANBY BIG PUMPKIN CONTEST

The Community Council is sponsoring a contest for the largest pumpkin grown in Danby in 2017. A competing pumpkin must be grown in Danby and cared for by the contestant or their family.

If it looks like a pumpkin, we will call it a pumpkin (no gourds allowed!). Only one pumpkin can be submitted per contestant (multiple contestants per family okay). A point score of weight in pounds times the maximum girth in inches will be used to determine the largest pumpkin.

The measurement date is October 8. Pumpkins can be brought to Town Hall on the 8<sup>th</sup> for measurement or a representative of Danby Community Council can come to the site of the pumpkin and make the measurement.

All competing pumpkins are welcome for display at the Danby Harvest Festival in October with entrants receiving a certificate of participation and the top three winners an award.
