West Danby Picnic




Town Clerk's Desktop

id you ever have someone give you travel directions based on a business or landmark that is no longer there? This happened to me recently, when Bald Hill Road was temporarily closed, uphill from Lieb Road. It all started when a tree came down on power lines, "at the sawmill." Sawmill? What sawmill on Bald Hill Road? Oh, one that has been closed and gone for a very long time!

There's not much we can do to recapture historical





erty and buildings in town, information makes its way to the Town Clerk's office from a variety of sources. Property-related information is available at the Town Clerk's office because of good communication with others like Danby's Code/ Planning Office. Property sales informa-

tion comes from Assessment Department and tax-related information is shared with the County Finance office.

People often come to the Clerk's office with such questions as "What's happening at xxx address?" or, "Who is paying the taxes on the xxx house?" While we know much about what happens in Town, contrary to "conventional wisdom" we don't actually know everything. There are several types of records we don't have. We often don't have information about exactly who pays taxes on a property, especially if that payment is made by escrow account or if payment is made to the County after April 1. Information such as Deed records, as well as birth and death records, are kept at the County Clerk's office in Ithaca.

Information we do have includes sales transfers information from the County Clerk and the County Assessment Department. Their reports tell us the address, tax map number, buyer, seller, and the sale price for the property. This information is forwarded to us as an interagency courtesy. If you have more detailed questions related to property ownership, you may need to do a deed search at the County Clerk's office.

Building permits, new address notifications, and subdivision information is generated by Danby's Code/ Planning office. The Clerk's office assists with preparing public information for projects going to the Planning Board and/or the Board of Zoning Appeals for site plan review related to development projects or variance requests for actions or property. Danby-generated documents are maintained through our local records management systems.

As a reminder, the Town Clerk's office is open and accessible 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. Through early September, the our office is closed on Saturdays, Sundays, and Thursdays. Messages can be left at 607.277.4788. And yes, the chocolate bowl is still full.

A ZONING PRIMER

Understanding Danby's Zoning Submitted by C.J.Randall, Danby Town Planner

Euclidian Zoning has nothing to do with mathto do with Euclid, Ohio, a small town about the size of Ithaca, It is named after the landmark 1926 court case, Euclid v. Ambler Realty, in which the U.S. Supreme Court upheld zoning.

Euclidian Zoning, also known as Single-use Zoning, is the original (and simplest) form of zoning. It is predictable because "uses" (that is, what you can use a property for) are either permitted by right or not permitted at all. The intensity of development can be locked in by minimum lot area and minimum road frontage. A property owner can look at the zoning map and be certain what would happen on adjoining properties. A developer can easily determine, in advance, whether something is permitted on a property and what standards must be met.

Sometimes, inflexible predictability can be a stumbling block. The Planned Development Zone (PDZ) concept was developed to address the rigidity of Euclidian zoning, which prohibited a whole range of designs including cluster developments, mixed-use developments, and traditional neighborhood development. In many cases, a developer submits text and site plans that present alternative standards to the Town. Approval of these plans binds the developer to follow that approach to developing the site.

In essence, a PDZ approval creates its own zoning rules, and they differ from the underlying zoning created by a Zoning Ordinance. That's why creating a PDZ requires the same process (e.g., a law must be passed) as any other modification of a Zoning Ordinance. While there are benefits to a PDZ, the conflict it creates—a small zone imposed on an otherwise homogeneous neighborhood—can complicate enforcement in future years.

PDZ regulations are intended to provide for residential, commercial, industrial, or other land uses (or a mix thereof) in which economies of scale, creative architectural or planning concepts, and open space preservation may be achieved in furtherance of a Town's Comprehensive Plan and its Zoning Ordinance.

Thus, a review is underway of all 19 of Danby's Planned Development Zones. Many of the PDZs are defunct (never used or currently unused) or no longer necessary given other considerations, such as the agricultural protections afforded by parcels within County-designated Agricultural Districts.

If you are interested in learning more about Danby's Planned Development Zones—or planning and zoning in general—the Town will be holding a public information session on Thursday, August 31, 6-9pm in Town Hall.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

How aggressively should the Town interpret its role in defining what a good steward should be? Your present Town Board board is committing the Town to aggressively pursuing any and all avenues that might lead to decreased energy consumption and reduced costs.

Holes for the frame of our solar installation are being dug this week! This will cap a three year push, from conception to actuality.

You'll be hearing more about the event in the September issue of the Danby News. Keep the date available and get ready for Fall Fun.

Our position is also focused on what Danby discharges to our neighbors. We sit on a regional divide; some of our water runs North to the St.Lawrence Seaway and some runs South to Chesapeake Bay. Its called the Danby Divide. Irresponsible consideration of runoff can affect countless people's—those downstream of us—water quality.

A grant we received from the County helped fund a study of the types of problems we face with unstable creek banks, such as the water flowing along Brown Road. These efforts help us plan strategies to set meaningful and achievable goals.

Not all goals manifest themselves in the same way. Things like setback requirements and zoning issues related to property rights can affect runoff. Let's not forget the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets rules and restrictions that supercede local laws within the Agricultural Districts that cover most of Danby.

So, there are visible manifestations, like our solar projects, there are State legislative issues, and there are property rights issues...and all of those call on our local legislative leaders. Sorting through the issues will not be a walk in the park. There will be pushback on what the role of the Town should be, versus the rights of the residents.

Some of our goals will take years to implement. If these are important topics for you, we are asking for your support.
