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DANBY FUN DAY: A BRIEF HISTORY Submitted by Pamela Goddard and Gay Huddle

Danby Fun Day began in 1983 as a way to financially support the Danby Volunteer Fire Department and to bring the Danby community together for a day of food and games, music and celebration. A relatively small number of dedicated people have organized this for several years. It is currently hoped that more people will get involved, in order to keep the spirit of Danby Fun Day strong.

Since at least the 1970s, Danby neighbors have gathered together in July for a one-day event known through the years as the Danby Carnival, the Danby Fair, and Danby Fun Day. In 1983, Ted Merritt, John VanDeMark and Garry Huddle came up with the idea of putting on a community Fun Day in conjunction with the Danby Volunteer Fire Company. Gay Huddle was asked to be the coordinator; she accepted and continued in this position for the next 15 years.

During the time around the U.S. Bicentennial, and for perhaps a decade afterwards, a community-wide parade

kicked off the Danby Fair. This tradition slipped away in the 1990s, but was revived in 2002 by the Danby General Store owners, Toni McBride and Judy Van Dermark, and kept alive through 2016, mostly due to Sue Beener's hard work.

Danby Fun Day has always been a family event. Andrea Hazard and her family got involved around 2003 by organizing child-friendly games such as a duck race, bean bag and ring toss games. They store them in their garage attic, and bring them out each Fun Day.

Most of the Danby Fun Day activities are planned by members of the Danby Fire Department. In 2008, Gay Huddle wrote, "We've always tried to have games, raffles, demonstrations, vendors, food, and, of course, the famous chicken barbecue. For the first few years of the event, we had a raffle wheel. We all worked very hard to get nice

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TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

There are various ways to mark the seasons in the Town Clerk's office. Winter is taxes. Fall is budget preparation. Spring is the time to spruce up around Town Hall and get ahead on records management. Late Summer is the time for selling hunting licenses.

In fact, a hunting or fishing license can be purchased at any time of the year. Many hunters purchase a yearly license during the time when the "Deer Management



Permit" lottery is in effect. The DMP lottery gives hunter the option to take one or more additional antlerless deer. DMPs are on sale until October 1.

In late Summer and early Fall we all may be more aware of the wildlife around us. This might include dogs running free. Having dogs on the loose is not a good idea, especially during hunting season. It's not good for the dog and it's not good for wildlife. In fact, destruction of both domestic animals and wildlife is the main reason why most (if not all) states have laws requiring licenses for all dogs.

So, what is the best thing to do if you find a "lost dog" or have a "problem dog" in your neighborhood? Or, what is best to do if your dog is missing? Dog license tags can help reconnect a wandering animal to its humans. The license number on the tag identifies the Town where the dog is licensed. Call the Clerk in that Town and you should be able to learn contact information for the owner.

But what if the dog isn't wearing its license tag? Or what if you can't get close enough to the dog to read the tag? The best thing to do in this case is to call Tompkins County Animal Control. Danby, and most Towns in Tompkins County, contract with this agency (a division of the Tompkins County SPCA) for matters related to animal control and animal cruelty. To report a found animal or to learn whether your lost pet has been brought to the SPCA facility, call 607.592.6773 or 607.257.1822.

What to do if you suspect animal cruelty or abandonment? Again, it is best to call Tompkins County Animal Control. While the Clerk's office would like to do our best to supply what information we can, we are not equipped to intervene in animal welfare matters. It's best to call 607.592.6773 or 607.257.1822. The animal control managers and investigators will know what is best, and legal, to do.

As a reminder, all dogs permanently residing in the Town of Danby (or any Town in the State of NY) must be licensed. The license must be issued once the dog is six months old, or when it has been living in the same location for over six months. Call the Clerk's office, 607.277.4788 for more information about the documentation needed to complete your dog's licensing.

Once Labor Day is past and summer is over, the Town Clerk's office is open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. As always, we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And, thanks to generous contributions to the chocolate fund, the bowl of kisses is full.

gifts donated. The raffle wheel eventually became the Chinese Auction. I have always been pleasantly surprised by the amount of treats sent in for the cake wheel by area neighbors."

Popular parts of the day, including the chicken barbecue, cake wheel, and Chinese Auction are all fundraisers for the fire and emergency volunteers. The proceeds have always gone to the Fire Department, with the exception of one year when it was unanimously decided to make a donation to Judy Van Dermark and Toni McBride to help cover the costs of Toni's medical bills when she was struggling with cancer. Fun Day income supports equipment, station supplies, and improvements in training and facilities for the Fire Department.

Current Fire Chief John Gaden met his wife Sharon while turning hamburgers during the 2002 Danby Fun Day. They remain happily married to this day and Sharon has become active in the department right along with John.

Eventually, it was decided to build some sort of a pavilion on the fire station grounds. It was built With the help of numerous community members and still stands today. During Fun Day 2016, the pavilion was named to honor Sue Beeners, who had dedicated her time and energy to Fun Day almost right up to the time of her passing in January 2016. In 2008, Sue said, "When I started to be involved, it was evident that the event was on the shoulders of the Danby Fire Department members and that the number of community volunteers had dwindled. This is the only town-wide event where residents get together to have fun and show support for

WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE Submitted by Tod Sukontarak, Water Commissioner

Liquid Asset Engineering is scheduled to inspect and clean our water tank in September. The tank will be three years old in October and the recommended interval for inspection and cleaning is three to five years. The Commissioners agreed that the first inspection should be done at three years to give us an idea if we can go to a five year interval next time.

Weather dependent, I will be flushing hydrants on Tuesday and Wednesday, September 11 and 12, starting both days at 9am. I will do hydrants north of the Fire Station on Tuesday and those to the south on Wednesday.

The Water District commissioners will be meeting on Wednesday, September 6, 5pm, in the West Danby Fire Station. The public isinvited to attend. In Danby, our solar story is progressing, but we are not plugged in yet. The impressive array is located at the Town Highway Barns, off of Hornbrook Road,

Other topics the Town Board will have on its agenda in September are ground-based land use questions, like PDZs (Planned Development Zones). The Town will be addressing the reclassification of these old out-ofdate carve-outs located all around the town.

Storm water projects, our resource inventory, retention ponds, and culverts are all on our agenda. Renovations to Town Hall are proceeding, with work to be well under way as you read this.

The Countywide shared services panel has moved on to a process whose goal is to replace all our street lights with LED fixtures.

The privately-owned Hatch pavilion in West Danby is in the process of being sold. The Town has been made aware of this situation and, while it has no authority over the sale, is trying to see if their is a way to save the pavilion and park for public use.

The other major topic for September is "budget season." We will follow the same path as last year: have a public hearing and pass a law to override the NYS State mandated tax cap...in case it becomes necessary...and then proceed to develop a budget that remains under the cap.

We also hit a snag with our wetland delineation, which is needed before we determine exact placement of the ice skating area; we're floating back to the top of the DEC's list, and remain optimistic about these two priority projects for this summer. We're working hard to get these projects done this year!

Does anyone out there have locust (standing or cut) to donate or sell? We're designing puncheon-style footbridges for getting walkers over the wet areas on the north side of the park. County Legislature Update

Here is a roundup of some issues the County Legislature has been working on lately. Feel free to contact me if you want more details about any of these items, or if you have questions or comments.

NY State has told Tompkins County that we either need to build a bigger jail or to lower our jail population. We commissioned a study on how to reduce the jail population. Recently, the study came back with a list of recommendations that will lower the jail population and save money in the long run. We are in the process of sorting through it all, putting a price tag on the initiatives, and deciding how to proceed.

Cooperation is not common in the federal government but, here in Tompkins County, it is how we normally do business. A great example of this is the Shared Services Agreement. The Tompkins County Administrator pulled together a series of meetings with all the Town Supervisors and Mayors in the County to explore ways that we might work together to save money and get better services. The group came up with a list of proposals such as bulk purchasing of street lights, shared bookkeeping services, and joint trainings. The monetary savings are modest but real. The group also generated a list of cooperative initiatives to work on in the future.

Ride sharing services (Uber and Lyft) are now legal in New York State. Counties are not allowed to add or remove any regulations on these companies. The only thing we are allowed to do is say, "Yes we want ride sharing in our County," or "No we do not." There are ways in which the playing field is not level and traditional taxi companies have to adhere to certain regulations that ride sharing companies do not. Some people have said that for this reason, we should not permit ride sharing in Tompkins County. Although I do wish New York State would apply a more level playing field, I voted yes on allowing ride sharing services in Tompkins County.

We are now in budget season. This is a long, involved process for the County. I will report more about the budget another time. For now, I will say that the County is in excellent financial shape and that any tax increase that may occur should be small.

WHAT DO OUR FIRE COMMISSIONERS DO? Submitted by Edward Kokkelenberg, Fire Commissioner

Every December the voters of Danby, both West and Central, elect a Fire Commissioner for a fiveyear term. With five volunteer members the District's Commissioners have both continuity and change. Currently, Wayne Westmiller is the chairman of the Board while Kat Anderson, Kevin Faehndrich, Joe Freedman, and Edward Kokkelenberg serve as members.

The Commissioners are responsible for many things and a view of a typical meeting agenda may give readers some insight as to their duties.

The Call to Order at 7pm is followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and approval of meeting minutes and bills. The latter consists of a voucher for each bill received since the previous meeting, review and often discussion about each bill, and

a signature by each Commissioner on each voucher. While this can take time, it gives the Commissioners control over expenditures.

The Treasurer presents the most recent balance sheet and an income and expenditure report, both useful in keeping the District on or below budget.

Various communications are next. These are reviewed to inform the public and Commissioners of issues. At this time, we might hear from our lawyers, the New York Regulators, the Tompkins County administrators, auditors, insurance companies, contractors or others.

We next seek input from the public who are present.

The Chiefs submit reports at this point, followed by brief Committee Reports on Purchasing, Buildings, Grants, Apparatus, Membership/Training, Long Range Plan, and Budget.

Finally, we consider Old Business, New business, set a date for the next meeting, and adjourn.

The following relates some detail on typical business.

Solar Power

We review our electric costs annually and currently buy power from a company that offers a low price. Recently, the Town invited the Fire District to use electric-



ity provided by a new Solar PV installation. Over the course of six months, we negotiated with the Town and achieved a memo of understanding that kept our power costs down and allowed us to go green.

Grants

Most grants require an application; some are quite complex. We describe what we hope to fund with the grant.

> When this is apparatus, there are months of work to determine needs, develop a request, hire an expert to review specifications, have everything vetted by a lawyer, seek a ballpark cost estimate, and complete the paperwork. Generally, grants require financial participation by the District, so our Budget Committee and Treasurer are involved. We're careful since, ultimately, we have to sign off on the grant application.

An application may take months of work and the final specifications for the apparatus can take a year before we publish a request for bids.

Each bid is reviewed before the contract is awarded. The chiefs monitor and report monthly on the construction of the apparatus. Most trucks take more than a year to build.

Budget

The budget process is regulated by a State-mandated calendar. budget meetings begin around April so we can present a budget to taxpayers by the end of the summer. Based on past years' experience and seeking input from the Chiefs, we review the budget line by line.

Meetings

All Commissioners meetings are open to the public and you are very welcome to attend our regular meeting on the second and third Tuesday of the month, or any other meetings we have. Generally, we meet in the Danby Fire Station at 1780 Danby Road. Notices appear on the District's new illuminated sign on NYS Rt.96B, in the Danby News, the Ithaca Journal, and on the Town of Danby's web site.

SOLAR ECLIPSE COMING TO DANBY Submitted by Ted Crane

Save your solar eclipse viewing glasses, your pinhole cameras used to project solar images safely, and mark your calendars for April 8, 2024, 3:23pm. That's when the next major solar eclipse will happen in Danby, NY.

Total eclipses of the sun are not necessarily rare, but having two of them with the "path of totality" within the continental United States, spaced only seven years apart is unusual. Danby residents may also be pleased to know that in 2024, we won't have to go further than our front yards to view a 98.95% total eclipse (safety note: even 98.95% isn't safe to view without proper shades or a projector).

The travelers among us can go north a few miles to view a 100% total eclipse. Geneva, NY will have 100% coverage of the sun. Rochester, NY is also 100% coverage and lies almost directly on the path of totality; the total eclipse will last three minutes and forty seconds (versus 2:25 in Geneva).

After hearing about all the tourists and traffic jams that descended on the path of totality during the August, 2017 eclipse, perhaps Danby should begin making preparations: room rentals, parking spaces, and more.

And remember: don't look directly at the sun with your naked eyes. Not today, not tomorrow, and certainly not during an eclipse..
