You have contributed significantly to our ongoing research, tracking the repopulation of the American Black Bear in Tompkins County.

Since black bears are still active in early winter as they prepare for hibernation, we would love to keep receiving signs of bear activity. To report sightings, please contact Jason Hamilton, [jhamilton@ithaca.edu] with the location and time of the last bear sighting.

Keep trash cans and open food sources as contained as possible. These will attract black bears and potentially put them in danger. But if you see a black bear, don't panic. Black bears will often retreat before they even interact with a human.


## Town Clerk's Desktop

#### **Property Tax Collection**

I write this every year and it still is news and, unfortunately, still true. The cruel month of January is upon us. Just barely past the holiday indulgences of parties and staying up late...reality hits us. There is no escape from the Cold, the Dark, or Taxes. It's hard to say whether 2018 will be especially cold or snowy, but there is no question that January, at least, will be dark. In these times, it seems that the only thing that will

get us through is massive amounts of chocolate.



Tax bills are sent out at the very end of December and should be in your mailbox by the first week of January. The first day for property tax collection in 2018 is Tuesday, January 2. If, for some reason, you do not receive your Town and County property tax bill by the end that week (January 6), please call us as soon as possible. We can print and and send a duplicate. Please note that if your taxes are paid by an escrow service, the

original bill is sent to the bank or to the payment service. If there has been a change in your escrow status and the bill should come to you, let us know. Again, we can send you a copy.

Remember, Town Clerks are only tax collectors. We don't set your assessment or your tax rate. We face the same "tax pain" as all of the rest of the property owners in Danby. I know that there's little I can do to make January better, but I can promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses including plenty of dark chocolate. Thanks to the generosity of the "loose change chocolate fund," there will be plenty for all.

#### Oaths of Office

January also the time for start-of-year business, including the swearing in of elected officials. One of the more esoteric jobs of the Town Clerk is to be the officiant who administers Oaths of Office. As an elected official, I have the honor to take this Oath as well. My next Oath will be the fifth time I solemnly swear that I will, "support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of New York, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of Town Clerk according to the best of my ability." Each year, especially in the past 12 months, this Oath has become more precious and important.

In this case, you might say that I'm pleased to have people "swear at me." In Danby, swearing the Oaths of Office mostly takes place every two years, after a general election. In addition to myself, our "newly elected officials" include two Town Board members, the Town Supervisor, and the Highway Superintendent. I administer the Oath to each, as well as to all those who serve on appointed boards and to the elected Fire Commissioners.

Who swears in the Town Clerk? This job is assigned, by law, to the Town Supervisor. First, he swears at me, then I swear at him, then we're good for another two years.

#### January Hours

During January Tax Collection, the Town Clerk's office will be open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Fridays, 10am-5pm, and Saturday mornings, 10am-1pm. Saturday hours return to 10am-Noon in the month of February. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. The first day for tax collection is Tuesday January 2.


## WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

I'm faced with My monthly dilemma, that what is news now might not be news—or even relevant—by the time you read it. The big takeaway, this month, are the dividends returning to the Town from our invested efforts.

This month we have seen money provided to cover the cost of increased energy efficiency at the Highway Barn, and serious money for present and future road repair.

In past columns, I've written about the potential—and real—collapse of our Town's infrastructure. It's one of the Town's biggest challenges. One particular example has been occurring in West Danby, where Brown Road has been deteriorating due to erosion by the adjacent creek. The Brown road project, alone, was estimated to cost approximately more than \$400,000.

To solve this problem, the Town initiated a study of the problem and of the feasibility of remediation. The study gave us the information we needed to apply for a grant to cover the cost.

Engineering studies aren't cheap, but they are only a drop in the bucket compared to the eventual cost of construction. This is a big big deal for the Town. We

can afford a small study, but we cannot afford larger studies and cannot even consider the cost of actual

remediation, at least not without the help of County, State, and Federal agencies. And there is no question that infrastructure maintenance is absolutely required.

It is all about having a plan, about getting the grant money to hire an engineer to support the plan, about getting grant funding to implement the plan. All of this requires networking to garner support from funding agencies, then using this support to apply for the money to pay for construction.

These monies are all directed toward the Highway Department. Its goal is not just to repair the obvious damage, but to solve the problems that lead to damage and deterioration...into the future.

Grants like this bring hundreds of thousands of dollars to Danby, that helps our most precious resources—including your tax dollars—go further.

As I have said in past articles, our staff are the engine that run Danby. All this money flowing into the Town is the result of long-term planning and of the quality of staff who implement and execute these endeavors.

I cannot say enough about the staff who are charged with accomplishing these vital tasks for the Town.

## Brown Road Streambank Stabilization

The Town of Danby has been awarded \$435,222 **▲** from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation in order to stabilize the stream alongside Brown Road in West Danby.

Like many watercourses, the stream is constantly

changing its form, and this has led to problems with both the stream and the adjacent road. Because the stream is between the road and a very steep bank, there is little room for the stream to meander. The Brown Road embankment has been damaged by a head cut (an over-steepened and unstable short section of channel) that has progressed upstream.

Town of Danby Highway Supervisor Carl Seamon and Deputy Highway Supervisor Jack Shawley, in cooperation with Town of Newfield Highway Supervisor Kevin Berggen, initiated planning of this project more than two years ago, in October 2015. Both Highway Departments had spent significant resources shoring up the road, especially after the destructive flooding in June 2015.

Because of the anticipated project costs, the Highway Departments approached me to explore funding sources outside of the usual Highway tax levies. The engineering investigation was kicked off by generous funding from Tompkins County for a design study in 2016.

That study investigated the issues with the Brown Road stream. It found that part of the west streambank was severely undercut, that a number of trees had fallen and created natural dams. The engineers then assisted in the preparation of a grant application to the DEC's Water Quality Improvement Program.

During the study, the Highway Department coordinated with a geotechnical firm (investigating the road subsurface) and with arborists (to estimate costs to remove fallen trees). The Highway Department personally notified residents adjacent to the roadway about the investigation and offered the trees to nearby property owners as free firewood.

The Design Work stage of the project will include further notification and coordination with adjacent landowners. A public information session will be held in early 2018. Property owners on Brown Road will be notified again by the Town of Danby and Town of Newfield in writing of the scope of the project, locations that may be affected, and the anticipated time-

> line. The public information session will include these elements and also offer a chance for residents to speak with the Town Supervisor, Highway Supervisors, Town Planner, members of the Town Board, and the consulting engineers about the project.

The project will return the

creek bed to an elevation similar to what it once possessed. This will avoid the use of large stones on the road embankments which, in turn, would require expensive shoring. A series of rock chutes will force fast moving water into a hydraulic jump, which will rapidly slow it down. Looking forward, the project will be designed to anticipate larger floods from future extreme weather events.

The Design Study found that the stream has been eroding rapidly, dumping an estimated 2,000 tons of sediment into the Cayuga Inlet watershed every year—a dump truck full, every day. The project will stop this erosion along 2,200 feet of stream bank, greatly reducing the load on the Inlet.

The Tompkins County Soil and Water Conservation District has pledged technical assistance with the physical implementation of this project. In addition, the Town will actively participating in the forthcoming Cayuga Lake Watershed Plan, scheduled to begin in early 2018. Town Supervisor Ric Dietrich has championed this kind of holistic and collaborative approach to reducing the amount of sediment going into Cayuga Lake.

## Our Neighbors: Shelley and Ron Cooper

MET WITH SHELLEY AND RON COOPER and their two dogs on a windy day in December. Their house on Updike Road is sometimes known as the Cooper-Meier Gallery. It's a large, white, modern structure with lots of windows that make you feel more like you're sitting outside than in.

The 110 acre property has 75 acres of woods, a pond, and two small water features. A small house on the property was built in the 1800s, according to Shelley, and may have belonged to a fellow who was a boat captain on Cayuga Lake.

The previous owners of the property were Arch and Esther Dotson. Award-winning architect Richard Meier designed the ini-

tial part of the house while he was a Cornell architecture student. Other architects have brought it to what it is today. You can see a few photos of the house at [jakerudin.com/cooper-meier-gallery].

Shelley was born and raised in East Aurora, New York and has a Cornell degree in agricultural economics. Ron was born in Alabama and has lived all over the world. He went to Emery and other universities until he was 35 and has a number of degrees, including one in dentistry and orthodonture.

Shelley and Ron were living in Jacksonville, FL in 2010, when, one October weekend, Shelley brought Ron up to Cornell. According to Shelley, Ron said, "You know, I think I could live here." Back in Jacksonville, Shelley began to surf the Net to see if she could find a house near Ithaca. "I'll tell you," said Shelley, "there isn't one night, when we're sitting outside, when we don't ask ourselves How did we get so lucky? Thank goodness the Dotsons had the foresight to make this property part of the Finger Lakes Land Trust. Some people think that's a detriment to the property value. To me it's a boost. This property, this gorgeous property, will be forever preserved."

"Having property in an easement doesn't affect the property value," continued Shelley, "it just protects the property you've loved for the last 40 or 50 years from

changing in its integrity. We couldn't have made a better decision," said Shelley about buying the property. "We have been so happy."

Both Shelley and Ron complained that, in spite of the size of the property, they are still routinely disturbed by noises traveling long distances—mostly ATVs and guns. The noise ruins what they consider the peace and quiet of the rural landscape. According to Ron, to protect the rural character of Danby, the Town needs to take the best plans from other Towns and make sure

that, "You completely explain what you want [for the future] and the nature of that rurality. Then you can hammer out the code."

Shelley said that, when they bought the house, their original vision was to be off the grid and to grow their own food. They are not off the grid, but they do grow their own food. The orchard has apples, pears, peaches, apricots, nectarines, and sweet

cherries. Shelley also grows two hop bines and makes beer. Ron makes 40 to 50 gallons of hard cider a year in the basement. They also grow all their own vegetables.

Ron always wanted a vineyard. So he planted grapes despite all the negative comments from experts who said the land and the climate were all wrong. The vineyard is called Stone Post after the stone post Ron built at the end of the driveway. He put up a mile of deer fencing and tiled the soil. He has grown six grape varieties: Cabernet Franc, which died in the first year; a noname experimental variety; Arandell, which he turned into rose; and three grapes that produce white wine—Frontenac gris, Elvira, and La Crescent. The first decent crop arrived in 2016. The one acre of grapes produced 59 cases of wine with a future potential to produce up to 200 cases per harvest. Ron is not selling the wine, yet, but Danby does have its first winery.

"We get to do everything we ever wanted to do. We get to have our hands in the dirt, love our land, and the land loves us back by producing these wonderful gifts. And we get to do it in an absolutely beautiful place surrounded by a community of fascinating, wonderful people. What more could you ask for?" said Shelley.
