

## COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

HERE IS A ROUNDUP of some of the issues and news from Tompkins County government.

The County Assessment Department put out its annual report, creating a snapshot of housing values in the County. Danby did not get reassessed townwide this year, although individual properties in Danby may have been reassessed. Six percent of properties in Tompkins County had their assessments reduced.

The Assessment Director also reported that he is aware of new housing for 5,800 people in various stages of planning and development in Tompkins County. There are also plans for housing—a few years out—for thousands of additional people. As these housing units come online, it may significantly shift the housing situation in the county.

In March, the County passed resolutions asking Spectrum, the cable television provider for most people in the County, to reverse its decision to cut the WSKG and WENY stations from its lineup. We have no real power over Spectrum's decision, and cable companies are notorious for not being responsive to local communities to meet their needs in terms of programming and coverage.

The County Legislature began discussions about a resolution calling on NY State to ban single-use plastic bags. There are many versions of what such a ban could look like, and I am writing this a month before we actually vote. This issue elicits strong opinions on both sides. If this topic is interesting to you, check the County website for the legislature meeting agendas, or contact me to see where we are in the process.

The County has also been discussing funding for arts and culture organizations such as the Hangar Theater, the State Theater, the Cayuga Chamber Orchestra, the History Center, the Museum of the Earth, and the Cayuga Nature Center. All of these organizations had their funding cut by the County after 2015. The funding has not yet been restored, despite huge increases in the hotel tax revenue, the source for this funding. If adequate funding for arts and culture organizations is important to you, please contact me so I can suggest how you can help.

These concerns are most often aired during the Planning Board and Board of Zoning Appeals meetings I attend, but they have also come up during regular Town Board meetings. If I had to guess at the most frequent concern, it would be the effect of neighborhood changes on the availability of water. The enormous investment we have put into our homes is painfully dependent on a water source. Our well.

During a recent Planning Board meeting, residents were concerned about the effect of new construction on their already unreliable water supply. As early as the 1980s, massive holding tanks were included in some new construction in that neighborhood. The residents described how their older wells were once overflowing but have, in recent years, become unreliable.

Our Town Planner correctly noted that water studies available to the Town, some recent, some older, indicate sufficient water for construction in the area. It was pointed out that the biggest study, the USGS study of Danby's water, focused on the NYS Rt.96B corridor, and contributed no new data about resources in the area of concern, where water issues seem to abound.

In fact, most of the information about water yields comes from historical well drilling reports! Casting no aspersions on any driller, the report submitted to the NYS DEC when my well was drilled was based on a quick, casual, and by no means scientific test. The same driller—one of the more responsible ones, I've been told—recently said that he didn't have the resources to do meaningful tests to determine well yields.

I am proposing to carry out an informal study of *current* well yields throughout Danby. I hope to create and distribute (via Danby News and the web) a survey to every home in Danby, and I hope that all residents will respond to it. After all, it's your home we're trying to protect! The result would include a map of water availabile to homes thoughout Danby, and this would be made available to the Town—and to its residents—for its planning purposes. # SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

THE BIG PUSH in the Fall is to get a budget together for the coming year but, in the Spring, the big administrative push is to get financial documents to the State as our year end report. So, by March, we see the results: where we were on target and which accounts were under-budgeted.

Last year we did not spend as much on winter roads as we have this year, but those kind of monetary swings are anticipated and budgeted for. Other items, like the Danby News postage costs, are less predictable and we must build some flexibility for ongoing surprises.

Budgets are best guesses on the future, in that they tend to be based on past and present performance. Each year always has "pop up" items that were not anticipated.

This year's newest pop up—the Gunderman Road bridge near NYS Rt.96B is down to one lane—has led us toward what will be another pop up. (Engineers are providing feedback on what it will take to repair the Gunderman Road bridge.)

Peak water events have increased dramatically during the last forty years, so all our culverts and bridges are being evaluated and rebuilt for the future. We anticipate that millions of dollars will be required to rebuild, in order to anticipate increased capacity engineering specifications.

# WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

THE WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT Commissioner met on Wednesday, March 7, at 5pm in the West Danby Fire Station.

The agenda was small but important. We discussed Carl Seamon's offer to serve another five year term as a District Commissioner. We all agreed that that is a good idea as Carl is knowledgeable of the water system its residents and is active in all aspects of its functions. We recommended to Town Board that they reapppoint Carl as a Water District Commissioner.

We will be flushing the distribution lines for two days in April. Weather permitting, the lines north of the fire station will be flushed on April 17 and those south of the station April 18. The work each day will begin shortly after 9am.

This is cost prohibitive, so we must either bond for the work or try and find grants to cover the cost.

Which brings me to that second pop up. It is one thing to write grant applications to cover the cost of rebuilding our Town's infrastructure...but it is another to process the grant requirements and manage the cash. Grants have audits, performance, and compliance issues attached to them. We have never been able to be so aggressive in seeking outside money to cover costs and, now that we are, we realize we need more administrative help.

We have run out of staff time to research, write, and administer grant funding. We need to hire additional help. In short, it's going to cost some money to manage an awful lot more money that we can obtain without going to our taxpayers. We have some funding built into the budget for contingency expenses, and this will be discussed during the next few TownBoard meetings.

On another note, we have been working on a Cayuga Watershed conference for a while, and just received a grant from Cornell to cover the costs. Now we have to bring other municipalities into the Town's efforts to stop exporting dirt into Cayuga Lake.

We will also be seeking grants—with a whole new set of compliance issues—for housing. As I have indicated in past Danby News articles, it has been a while since we have done one of these. Why is this relevant? The last time around, we were able to help residents get some help with upgrades to their housing. A little effort in one place can reap bigger rewards for Town residents in another.

# Freeman Speaks Freely About Open Government

THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR of the NYS Committee on Open Government, Robert Freeman, has been invited to meet with Danby folks on Thursday, April 5, 6:30, in Danby's Town Hall.

Freeman is probably one of the easiest—and fun—speakers to listen to, that you'll ever meet. Not only does he have something to say—he is the State's preeminent expert on his subject—but he can say it in a way that everyone can understand and enjoy. In a typical meeting, he does not lecture; his starting line is a question from the audience, and and he runs from there.

Freeman's visit to Danby was prompted by questions, during the 15-January-2018 Town Board meeting, about Executive Sessions and the requirements of Open Meetings Law.

All members of all Town boards have been asked to attend, and the meeting is also open to the general public. If you've ever attended a Board meeting, for any reason, and wondered about procedure (open meetings

# Town of Danby Explores Lower-cost Electricity

In addition to the several Solar Energy options to be presented on Monday, April 2 (see separate article), Danby residents should be aware of two non-Solar alternatives being discussed at Danby Town Board meetings.

Right now, the Town is considering a move to adopt the Energy Cooperative of America as its electric power provider. Just as individual homeowners can choose to buy electricity from either NYSEG or any of a number of electric service companies ("ESCOs"), the Town can choose a provider.

ECA—a cooperative—buys power at wholesale prices, marks it up a fraction of a cent, and sells it to its members. Individual homeowners are also welcome as members. A recent survey of electric service prices on the NYS Public Service Commission web site [documents.dps.ny.gov/PTC/zipcode/14850], click on "View Electric" shows ECA charging a bit more than 3 cents per kilowatt hour, about one cent less than its closest competitor and 1.7 cents less than NYSEG, the Town's previous supplier. (Those are variable rate prices; fixed rate customers are paying NYSEG almost 5 cents more)(also, you're going to pay delivery and service charges to NYSEG, no matter where you buy your electricity).

The Town is following the lead of the Fire District to ECA. If you want to follow the Town, see [ecamerica.org].

Looking to the long term, the Town is participating in meetings about "Community Choice Aggregation." To make a long story short, CCA would allow the Town to select a default power provider for everyone in town, and to negotiate a bulk purchase price to maximize savings. Individual customers could, of course, opt out of the bulk purchase. That said, if the program resulted in lower cost (though non-Solar) electricity, opting out might not be for everyone.

## SOLAR OPTIONS FOR EVERYONE

Take your thoughts about going solar one step farther by attending an information session in Danby's Town Hall on Monday, April 2, at 7pm. The Community Council has asked the energy experts at Cornell's Cooperative Extension to describe the available options—some are *Pay Now*, others are *Pay As You Go*, but all *Save Now and Later*—for new Sunshine Enthusiasts.

Want solar energy, but think that solar isn't possible for you? New developments are making it more possible for just about everyone. Whether you own a home or rent, whether you live in a field or forest, there are now financially viable options for you to go solar.

Rooftop and backyard solar installations are still a great option for homeowners with good solar exposure and the ability to pay the upfront costs. For these people, onsite solar may offer you the best return on your investment. Rooftop or backyard solar allows you to fully own the system, take advantage of the 30 percent federal tax credit, 25 percent state tax credit, and the \$0.35/W state rebate. Onsite solar also allows you the option to go off-grid (the only way to avoid NYSEG's \$15/month service fee), or to have a battery backup system for when the grid goes down.

For renters, apartment dwellers, and those who live in the woods or simply don't want to invest in an onsite solar system, Community Solar can meet your needs and is available to anyone who pays a NYSEG electric bill. It's growing in popularity across New York State, with companies settling on two main participation models:

Purchase Models, where you own solar panels at an offsite location

 Subscription Models, where you don't own anything, but pay a monthly bill for electricity from a privatelyowned solar farm.

In both models, residents remain attached to the grid and receive a bill from NYSEG.

In the purchase model of community solar, the panels you own will generate credits on your utility bill, lowering your monthly cost as if the panels were on your property. The purchase model often offers a lower up-front cost than rooftop or backyard installations because the developers are able to build the farm all at once instead of working on many smaller installations. Also, you've bought the panels so you are also eligible for the Federal and State tax credits and incentives. There typically are monthly operations and maintenance fees with this model.

If you don't want to put down any money to own panels, a subscription model could be best for you. The developer you work with plans its solar farm with enough production to cover your energy needs. The developer pays for the farm while you agree to buy the electricity every month. The developer will often give you a small discount relative to NYSEGs charge for electricity. You won't save as much as you might if you owned the panels but you will save a little while getting your electricity from clean, renewable energy. In addition to the developer's monthly bill, NYSEG will bill you for electricity you used (over what you contracted with the developer). These contracts tend to be much shorter in length than ownership contracts and can therefore be much more flexible.

## DOTSON PARK UPDATE

HERE'S A NEW PARK AND RIDE bus stop coming to Danby this spring! The Danby Community Park Association, Town of Danby, and TCAT are working together to provide a new, northbound stop along Route 96B, located right at the entrance to Dotson Park, across from Town Hall.

A parking lot with spaces for several cars will be created along the entrance road, with an accessible pathway to the shelter. Riders heading into Ithaca will have a safer place to wait for the bus, especially in winter, rather than having to wait at unmarked locations along the dark highway shoulder. The creation of the new parking spaces is a win-win, as it will also provide convenient parking for access to the park's natural playground when it is finished.
