
## TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

#### **Spring Rabies Clinics**

THE DATES HAVE BEEN SET for the Spring Rabies Clinics run by the Tompkins County Health Department, Environmental Health Division. A free rabies clinic will be held in the Danby Fire Station on Thursday May 2, 7-9pm. Proof of prior vaccination is required to receive a three-year certificate for cats and dogs. Online preregistration is available at [tompkinscountyny.gov/health/].

NYS law requires all dogs to be licensed in the municipality where they live. In order to have a complete and



updated license, dogs must be vaccinated against rabies. The rabies clinics are offered to help with this requirement. In addition to the Danby date, rabies clinics will be held in Lansing on May 1, Dryden on May 8, Enfield on May 9, and at the Ithaca Highway garage in May 15. Fall clinics will be held in Newfield, Caroline, Trumansburg, Groton, and Ithaca. All of these are open to any pet owner.

#### **Animal Control Update**

Dog care comes with a cost for owners and municipalities. There are municipal fees for Animal Control Services required by NYS law. Tompkins County Animal Control (TCAC) services include seizure and impoundment of dogs running lose. Animal control also shelters and provides proper care for lost, stray, or abandoned dogs. Efforts are made to return dogs to their owners.

When the owner of an impounded dog is known, they are required to pay the impoundment fees set by the Town Board. Those fees are collected by TCAC and the Town receives a portion. In March, the Board voted to update the fee schedule, so that it is consistent with other municipalities. All municipalities are being encouraged to adopt the same fee schedule, so dog owners know what to expect.

The fees are now \$25 for the first impoundment of any dog. The fee goes up to \$50 for the second impoundment of any dog owned by the same person and \$75 for the third impoundment of any dog owned by the same person within 12 months of the first impoundment. If more than one dog owned by the same person is impounded at the same time, the impoundment of each dog is considered a separate impoundment.

Dogs not claimed are available for adoption. Keep your dogs safe, keep them at home.

#### Final Tax Collection

As of April 2, Alex Pfeifer and I are done with the 2019 property tax collection. April 1 was the final day for property tax collection at Danby's Town Hall. All property tax collection after that date is turned over to Tompkins County Finance. This includes second installment payments. Call 607.274.5545 for more information.

For all services, the Town Clerk's office is open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, and 10a-Noon on Saturdays through the Spring. As always, we are closed on Thursdays and Sundays and the chocolate bowl remains well supplied. Thank you for your sweet generosity.

#### Young People Interested In History

Here is a fun opportunity for you: the Student Research Awards.

"Research" may be intimidating or off-putting, so ignore the word. Go for the presentation aspect of this project. You can create an exhibit, do a performance, create a web site, do a regular paper, or present your information in your own creative way.

There are small size posters you can pick up and put in your pocket. Or scan all the info into your smartphone right off the big poster.

March is Women's History month. Do you know any historic women? It could even be someone in your family--a great source for tidbits of history. Where was your grandmother born? What was the neighborhood like where she grew up? Was she a suffragette?

Addie E. Beam was my great grandmother. She lived with us for a year and a half when she was 92. I was a teenager living in a suburban Connecticut town. Grandma came from a small Iowa farm town where she had lived all her life. Quite a gap from her life to mine. She wasn't necessarily a notable woman in history but I started asking her questions and got a wonderful look into life on the prairie in the last half of the 19th century.

Grandma was born in a one-room log cabin several miles from town. Roaming Indians would come to the door asking for food. She and her sister had a pony they rode in tandem. They rode bareback and astride. Not side-saddle as their refined, "city sisters" did. These are just a few topics she touched on; real stories, first-hand insights that made history more than just facts.

Help! I am still looking for assistance with the stuff of history. Anyone who can spend just an hour once a month or even an hour just once, or anyone who would like to get involved with one particular event will be welcome. Get in touch with me. Thank you. ## COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

Vou don't like taxes.

You can blame me for your County taxes. The Town Board is responsible for your Town taxes. The School Board is responsible for your school taxes.

But don't blame the County Assessor. The Assessor is independent and fair. The Assessor determines how much your property is worth. They do not set the budget, tax levy, or tax rate.

Tompkins County is one of only two counties in NY State to have a countywide tax assessment office. And this is the 50th year that we have been doing this. Having a countywide assessment office makes things fairer and saves money through efficiency. The estimate is that we save \$619,000 a year by having countywide rather than individual town assessors.

Here are some assessment-related trivia questions for you: If all 35,459 parcels in Tompkins County were for sale and you wanted to buy all of them, how much would it cost you?

What was the average sale price of a home in Tompkins County in 2018?

See the answers at the end of this article.

If your assessment changed this year, you should have received something in the mail in mid-March. If you feel like your change in assessment was unjustified, you have the right to formally challenge it. The mailing you received contains the information necessary to file a challenge.

If your assessment went up by 10 percent, for example, it does not necessarily mean your taxes will go up 10 percent. The amount of taxes you pay is based on the total tax levy and on the tax rate, which has actually been falling in many municipalities in the last few years. Also, the large amount of new construction in the County helps spread out the tax burden. More people are contributing to the cost of snow plowing, school teachers, etc.

The fact that the average sale price of a home in Tompkins County in 2018 was \$268,340 probably has an influence on the increased assessed value of your property.

It also would affect your ability to buy every property in the County. That will cost you \$13.5 billion, half a billion dollars more than it would have last year.



## WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

THE NEXT WATER DISTRICT MEETING has been rescheduled from Wednesday, April 3 to Tuesday April 2, 5pm, in the West Danby Fire Station conference room.

We plan to flush hydrants in the distribution system on Monday, April 15 and Tuesday, April 16, begin-

ning at approximately 9am each day and ending before 4pm. Hydrants north of the fire station will be flushed on the 15th and those south of the station on the 16th.

Due to bad weather, the last two years, we have had to postpone our April flushing to May and that is a possibility this year as well. As we flush twice a year and it is most effective to schedule the two as far apart as possible, it is preferable to do the first flush in April and the second in October. We will aim for April and schedule another in September; sometimes scheduling even in October is too late to allow for contingencies.

- If all properties—including yours—increase in value by the same proportion, your share of the total tax bill doesn't change!
- Budgeting and Tax Factoids: in 2018, the total value of all the properties in Danby was (very roughly) \$300,000,000. Danby's total budget was (very roughly) \$2,400,000.

Therefore, every \$10,000 of assessed value means you pay about \$80 to Danby (Town and Fire). A \$250,000 property pays about 25×80, or \$2,000 tax.

If you don't think your new assessment is correct (that is, the facts about your property are wrong) or fair (that is, the assessment is not reasonable, compared to other similar properties), you can ask for an informal review. Before an informal review, you should do a little homework:

 browse the NYS Assessor Manual, so you can talk the same lingo as the assessor. It's online; google "NYS assessor manual". Pay attention to the way "Construction Grade" and "Overall Condition" are deter-

### TICK TRICKERY

Every month the whole year long, the ticks in your backyard are ready and able to do you harm. Not that they mean to, exactly; it's just their nature. But if you value your health, read on.

Baby deer ticks usually start becoming a health hazard sometime in May. Two years ago—not that I was looking—I noticed the first tick of the season on the cuff of my pants leg on Earth Day (coming right up on April 22). It was an all-of-five minutes foray into a weedy,

abandoned field on my way home from Elmira. That critter was out and about, looking for a meal, and I

was in its territory. So I brushed it off and went on my way.

I always carry my basic tick prevention kit with me regardless where I am. It's a pair of fine-tipped tweezers attached to my car keys. Had I found that tick later, I'd have needed those tweezers to remove the tick.

Never use run-of-the mill tweezers; They'll just make that tick throw up inside you. Fine-tipped tweezers (great for plucking eyebrows) are your one-size-fits-all tick removal tool. True, you can find no end of gizmos for removing ticks and some are best used on dogs and cats, but these tweezers, properly used, will do the job well under every circumstance.

Four species of ticks now call New York their home. Deer ticks remain enemy number one, but we are best informed about the other three as well. I will describe each as the months go by.

#### NYS Vehicle and Traffic Law

**§1146-a.** Approaching horses.

- 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, every driver of a vehicle shall exercise due care to avoid colliding with any horse being ridden or led along a public highway.
- 2. Every driver of a vehicle shall approach a horse being ridden or led along a public highway at a reasonable and prudent speed so as to avoid frightening such horse and shall pass the horse at a reasonable distance.
- 3. No driver of a vehicle shall sound the horn when approaching or passing a horse on a public highway.

## MEETING A HORSE ON THE ROAD

As a horse owner and rider, I feel blessed to live in such a beautiful, rural area, especially one with wide-

shouldered roads that are perfect for a ride through the countryside. I was recently asked what people should know when they encounter a horse on the road and realize people may not understand a horse's natural flight instincts and the danger this creates.


Here are some simple tips to help keep everyone safe. What should one do if they encounter horses on the road?

- Understand a horse's natural desire to flee. Horses are flight animals and their natural instinct when frightened is to escape. In this frightened state there isn't a lot of thinking going on, and this can be dangerous for everyone.
  - Slow down. A car flying by, possibly kicking up stones and dust can be scary for both the horse and rider.
  - Pass wide. Give as much room as you can to the horse and rider. This gives everyone a buffer, just in case something does happen.
  - Be prepared for the unexpected. Horses stumble, dogs run out and chase us, deer leap out of the woods--all things that can cause a horse to spook.
  - Use common sense. No one wants a horse and rider as a hood ornament.

I think every rider has a story of something spook-

ing them or their horse and it can be downright scary. Even the best trained horse can become afraid and make unexpected movements, possibly jumping into the roadway. Hopefully these

tips will help everyone stay a little safer.

mined. Do your grades match your property? Does your property look better from the road (where the assessor sees it) than it does up close? It may be to your advantage to invite the assessor to have a look.

• use the Assessment Department's online tool to identify comparison properties. The default search may show you the same properties the Department used to assess your property. Do they look like yours? Expand the search (allow a basement even if you don't have one, or more bathrooms, or more floor space). In theory, "better" houses should be assessed for more than yours. If not, figure out why and bring the info to your review, to help make a case for the assessor.

Remember, the assessor is just following rules. As carefully as they do it, when they do thousands of properties, they may miss details that are obvious to you. They don't mind if you provide them with information in your favor, and it may help them revise your assessment.
