

Public Hearings

Two Public Hearings are scheduled during the Town Board meeting on Monday, October 7, both at 7pm (the second will immediately follow the first).

The Town Board regular meeting date is on the first and second Mondays of the month, 7pm.

A public hearing is a legal requirement for many municipal actions, including adopting local laws, adopting the annual budget, and other actions such as the acceptance



of a property deed for conservation easement. While the Board presents information about the subject of the hearing, the hearing itself is primarily to hear from the public. Residents, property owners, and interested parties have the right to voice their support

for—or their concerns about—the matter at hand. This is also a time when you can ask questions to gain clarity and under-

standing; in Danby, questions are often answered but that interaction is not a legal requirement.

Here are some specifics about the Public Hearings on October 7. The first hearing is to receive comments about the adoption of a local law allowing the Town Board to override the NYS municipal tax cap. Such a local law must be adopted each year, if a municipality thinks it may need to override the tax levy limit established by New York State.

A law permitting a tax cap override does not require that the municipality exceed the tax cap, nor does it increase the tax levy. It simply allows the municipality to do so. Danby has not needed to do this for the past two years, and may need to do so this year. However, it is prudent for the Town to have such a law in place. Given several expected increases in expenses, the law permits more freedom to provide adequate services to residents.

The second hearing, to follow the local law hearing, is to consider acceptance of a Conservation Easement on a Durfee Hill Road property. If I count correctly, this will be the fifth conservation easement entered into by the Town of Danby. Conservation easements are grant-

It is the intent of this local law to override the limit on the amount of real property taxes that may be levied by the Town of Danby, County of Tompkins, pursuant to General Municipal Law 3-c, and to allow the Town Board of the Town of Danby to adopt a town budget for (a) town purposes; (b) the fire protection district; and (c) any other special or improvement district governed by the town board for the fiscal year2016 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the "tax Levy limit" as defined in General Municipal Law 3-c.

likely during the November 4 meeting.

TICK TRICKERY

ON WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 23, 7pm, in Danby's Town Hall, I'll be giving a talk that puts Lyme disease in the limelight. Given the threat it brings, we'll learn the best and worst ways to prevent any tickborne disease. Some might surprise you.

We'll also learn what's at the heart of Lyme disease and coinfections such as parasitic anaplasmosis and babesiosis, about viruses like Powassan and Heartland, and how Lyme disease mimics—but does not cause—diseases and conditions such as sleep apnea or Bell's palsy.

Last, we'll learn about the four types of ticks and the threat they bring: the deer tick (a.k.a. black-legged tick), lone star tick, American dog tick, and Asian long-horned tick.

THE CLOCK IS TICKING

WTHE CLOCK IS TICKING," isn't always a phrase to warm the cockles of our hearts. However, in Danby's Town Hall there is now a quiet ticking that is a just what we want to hear.

Danby's antique 1824 clock is up and running! Danby is lucky to have people with knowledge and expertise that can preserve our timepiece of the past, and who are willing to donate some time to that effort. In a small



way they deserve to go down in history just as much as a Galileo, Ben Franklin, or Christiaan Huygen, all three of whom furthered the development of time and clocks in one way or another.

With the generous help and effort of Tod Sukontarak and Ben Hogben, among others, our clock was restored and put on display. This one-hundred-and-ninety-nine year old artifact is now set to tell time for people 199 years from now and beyond. Makes me wonder how Danbyites will tell time in the year 2199.

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COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

A N AGRICULTURE DISTRICT IS A LEGALLY defined area where a somewhat different set of laws apply. Every eight years, there is a review of properties within each Agricultural District. Currently, Agricultural District 1, the eastern half of Tompkins County, is up for review. This District includes part of the east side of the Town of Danby. Roughly 20% of all land in the Town is in Agriculture District 1.

Properties can be removed from an Agricultural District only during this review, but properties can be added at any time.

Many of the parcels included in Agricultural Districts are not currently used for agriculture, nor suitable for agriculture. My ten acres of forest is an example. As far as I know, my land was abandoned as pasture approximately 70 years ago. Aside from a few light-starved tomato plants, there is currently no agricultural use of my land. But my property remains in Agricultural District 1.

There are land-use and tax implications for the parcels within an Agricultural District. If you are not engaged in agriculture, then it probably doesn't matter whether or not your parcel is in the District. That is why I will not be making any attempt to remove my land from the District. However, if you are considering using your land for agricultural purposes, you will want to look into this. Also, you may have an interest in the status of your neighboring properties.

According to the NYS Agriculture and Markets web site, The purpose of agricultural districting is to encourage and promote the continued use of farmland for agricultural production. The Program is based on a combination of landowner incentives and protections, all of which are designed to forestall the conversion of farmland to nonagricultural uses. Benefits that properties in State-certified Agricultural Districts receive are partial real property tax relief (agricultural assessment and special benefit assessments), and protections against overly restrictive local laws, government funded acquisition or construction projects, and private nuisance suits involving agricultural practices.

A map of the District is available for review at the Tompkins County Department of Planning and Sustainability's web site, organized according to municipality.

Any proposed modification, addition or removal of property from the Agricultural District must be submitted in writing to Monika Roth, Agriculture Specialist at Cornell Cooperative Extension, at Cornell Cooperative Extension of Tompkins County, 615 Willow Avenue, Ithaca, NY 14850.

- Danby is actually farmed. If you remove the Stateowned forest land from Danby's total acreage, the existing Ag Districts occupy somewhat more than 56% of the rest of Danby. Within that area, A&M law supercedes Danby law.
- Poor soil is only one of the reasons why Danby has so few farms. In spite of this, within Danby the Ag Districts, with only 10% farmed, fail the A&M guideline that Districts must consist predominantly (more than 50%) of viable agricultural land.
- Many of Danby's residential properties are situated within Ag Districts. The origin of this is historical: they were subdivided from larger, formerly farmed parcels. Some have said that Danby's premier farm product is building lots.
- Most A&M literature mentions Ag Districts and Agricultural Assessment side-by-side. In fact, there is very little relationship between Ag Districts and Ag Assessment. Ag Assessment is a separate tool that provides tax benefits. You don't have to be in an Ag District to get tax relief, and being within an Ag District confers no direct tax benefits.
- If you're not in an Ag District and want its benefits, entry is easy, perhaps quicker than growing your first crop. If you're in an Ag District and want to get out, there is only one opportunity every eight (8) years. For District #1, this is now.
- There is little effect on you and your property if your non-farm property is within an Ag District. The same isn't true, though, if it's your neighbor's property. See, *converting use* and *undesirable effects*, above.

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BOARD VACANCIES

THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN of Danby invites residents to apply now for volunteer municipal boards seats starting January 2020. Your involvement is welcome and needed.

Each year, one seat opens on the Planning Board and the Board of Zoning Appeals. Planning Board is a seven year term. Board of Zoning Appeals is a five year term. The Planning Board meets monthly, on the third Thursday, to review subdivision and development applications, review and revise the Town Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance. The Board of Zoning Appeals meets as needed, usually on the fourth Tuesday of each month, to hear and decide variance requests related to the Zoning Ordinance. Copies of the Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance are available on the Code/Planning page of the Danby web site and in the Town Clerk's office.

There are several open seats on the Conservation Advisory Council. This Advisory Council meets on the second Tuesday of each month, at 7pm. Seats on the CAC "roll over" every two years. The CAC advises the Board in the development, management, and protection of the Town's natural resources. The full charge of the CAC, including recommendations to the Town Board for Conservation Easements on property in Danby, keeping an open space inventory, and drafting management plans for Town of Danby Property, is available in the Town Clerk's office.

The West Danby Water Commissioners, who tend the rural water system in West Danby, have at least one and possibly two vacancies. Contact the Town Clerk for more information.

An appointment application is available through the Town Clerk's office. This simple form includes contact information for the applicant and three simple questions: any experience (professional, educational, etc.) which would assist in the position, a brief description of why you would like to be considered, and what you would hope to accomplish in this position.

AG DISTRICT FACTIODS: FOOD FOR THOUGHT Submitted by Ted Crane

- Much of the information provided about Ag Districts originates from the NYS Department of Agriculture and Market (A&M). A&M exists to protect and promote agriculture, and that information is almost always positive.
- Agricultural Districts, defined in NYS law, are one of many tools that allow A&M to protect and promote agricultural activities.
- These laws intentionally shift the balance between agriculture and all other land uses (like residences and non-agricultural businesses). The balance is most heavily tilted toward agriculture within Ag Districts.
- Within an Ag District, local laws—including zoning—are superceded if, in the opinion of A&M, the local regulation unreasonably interferes with agricultural activities.
- The definition of agricultural activity goes way beyond farming. *Taste NY*, another agricultural promotion program, promotes activities and businesses that extend into tourism, food processing, public events, and retail.
- Even within farming, A&M law permits activities that Danby's Right-To-Farm law would not, such as Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs, factory farming). It also allows a property to be converted from one agricultural use to another, such as from a hay pasture to a CAFO or a food processing facility.
- A&M law recognizes that customary agricultural activites may have undesirable effects on other properties. Purchasers of these properties are required to sign a statement acknowledging this, and have limited legal remedy afterward.
- According to the Tompkins County Planning Department, Danby has less than 1,400 acres in actual agriculture, but more than 14,400 acres within two Ag Districts. Surprisingly, not all of the farmed land is within Ag Districts.
