No Building Permit Required

As promised, here is a list of things that do not require a building permit:

- ① construction or installation of one story detached structures associated with one and two family dwellings or multiple family dwellings (townhouses) that are used for tool and storage sheds, playhouses or similar uses, provided the gross floor area does not exceed 144 square feet
- 2 installation of swings and other playground equipment associated with one and two family dwellings and multiple single family dwellings (townhouses)
- 3 installation of swimming pools associated with one and two family dwellings and multiple single family dwellings (townhouses), where such pools are designed for a water depth of less than 24 inches and are installed entirely above ground
- 4 installation of fences that are not part of a pool enclosure
- ⑤ construction of retaining wall unless such walls support a surcharge or impound Class I, II or IIIA liquids
- 6 construction of temporary motion picture, television and theater stage sets and scenery
- ① installation of window awnings supported by an exterior wall of a one and two family dwelling or multiple single family dwellings (townhouses)
- ® installation of partitions or movable case work less than 5'-9" in height
- 9 painting, wallpapering, tiling, carpeting, or other similar finish work
- (1) installation of portable electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation or cooling equipment or appliances
- ① replacement of any equipment, provided the replacement does not alter the equipment's listing or render it inconsistent with the original equipment's specifications
- (2) repairs, provided that the repairs do not involve:
- (a) the removal or cutting away of a load bearing wall, partition, or portion thereof or of any structural beam or load bearing component
- (b) the removal or change of any required means of egress, or rearrange ment of parts of a structure in a manner that affects egress
- (c) the enlargement, alteration, replacement or relocation of any building system
- (d) the removal from service of all or part of a fire protection system for any period of time

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Unprecedented. That one word pretty much describes our current situation, does it not? Yesterday, March 17, we closed the Town offices, hitting the "pause" button while we reposition ourselves to operate in a novel framework where personal interaction needs to be at arm's length (or greater!). How do we provide the services that you expect from your government safely? By the time you read this I am confident that we will have it worked out and have a continuity of operations plan in place. Some things are already clear. Most, if not all, Town meetings will be held by video or audio conference. You will be able to attend by signing in using links in the calendar of events on the Town web site [townofdanbyny.org]. The Town Court is shut down for some time, with important matters centralized in a single court in Ithaca. We will have posted on the web site instructions for how to get a license or apply for a building permit or subdivision without doing so in person. We will have in place a way to pay for services not in person. The web site is the go-to place for all of this and more. If you want information sent to you directly as it appears on the "news" area of the site, sign up for the Email list—also on the web site!

While a lot of what we were about before COVID-19 showed up has slowed down while we devote the necessary energy to change the way we operate, some things did take place and much is ongoing. The results of the housing needs assessment were shared with the public at a meeting on February 24. Approximately 16 percent of Danby households have incomes below the federal poverty level. 74 percent of renters and 25 percent of homeowners are "cost burdened", meaning that they pay more than 30 percent of their income for housing. Cost burdened households are apt to be challenged in paying to maintain their homes, and the survey data documented the extent of that problem. 67 percent of houses assessed at less than \$150,000 were rated as either moderately or severely substandard. Only 14 homes are in such bad shape that they were rated "dilapidated", however. Those are houses where the cost of repair is so high that replacement is cheaper (which doesn't mean that they cannot be repaired, only that paying someone else to do it would cost more than paying someone else to replace them). We have now documented a significant need for assistance to help homeowners care for their houses. The next step will be to strategize how to help. Applying for housing assistance grants will certainly be one way. The summary as well as the complete report are on the web site (search "Community Housing Needs Assessment").

We are looking at options to extend the South Hill Recreation Way. We collaborated with the other towns in seeking NY state grant funding to assess the cost of doing so, but that grant was not awarded to us. The four towns (Ithaca, Dryden, Caroline, and Danby) have now applied for tourism grant funding to cover at least part of the needed cost assessment. We still have not arrived at a satisfactory agreement with NYSEG (who owns the property), but the feeling is that these two matters can proceed in parallel.

The Town Board addressed the question of whether to undertake a harvest of marketable Ash trees on the Water District property in West Danby. The Conservation Advisory Council had recommended that such an action be considered in light of the likely death of these trees from the Emerald Ash Borer. Previous guidance from the Town Board had been that there should be no timber harvest on this property. In response to the CAC's recommendation, the Town Board asked the CAC to conduct an assessment of the options and their environmental impact (that report is on the Town web site). New to the discussion was the possibility of treating some or all of the trees to protect them. The report goes into all the considerations in depth and demonstrates what knowledgeable volunteers can accomplish. In the end, the Town Board left previous guidance in place—there will be no harvest of Ash. Neither will we move to protect the trees.

On a more positive note, the Board authorized planting of a tree donated to commemorate Ric Dietrich's service to the Town. The tree, a dogwood, was planted on the south lawn of the Town Hall on Sunday, March 15. This was intended to supplement the gathering in Ric's honor at the Fire Hall but that event was postponed because of COVID-19. It is a nice tree, which David Mastroberti masterfully planted with a little ceremonial help.

The Town Board also voted to change its meeting schedule. This was in response to a staff initiative. It was pointed out that the two monthly Board meetings just a week apart made it hard to prepare well for the second meeting, including timely posting of the agenda. A couple of week's space would even out the work. There was reluctance on the part of the board, though, because evenly spaced meetings would make it hard to travel without missing meetings. We compromised. The new schedule will be the second Monday and the Wednesday nine days following. That new schedule will



begin in May, with the meetings being on the $11^{\rm th}$ and $20^{\rm th}$, on the web. To participate, sign up on the web site calendar. We will be using Zoom, which allows you to take part by phone as well as computer.

Moving to videoconferencing for all our meetings will be a bit challenging for the Planning Group, but it will be the way forward for it as well. Two in-person meetings were held, one in February and the other in early March. We considered whether to make interim changes to our laws pending the execution of the much bigger project of redoing all of our planning documents, but decided against doing so at this time. Instead, we will launch into the process with the current framework left in place. We were fortunate to be able to hold these important early meetings before the need for social distancing became apparent; it would have been very difficult, IMHO, to feel each other out as we did were it a videoconference. Moving forward from here, though, looks quite possible.

Four working groups were created. One will focus on tax policy. That emerged from discussion at the first meeting where several pointed out that rising assessments on undeveloped land are making it harder and harder to resist selling. What can be done to provide some relief? A second group will work on publicizing the work and facilitating public engagement with it. A third will identify priority conservation areas in the Town, augmenting the CAC members already embarking on that. The fourth working group will look at where and how to develop the hamlets and potentially other relatively dense housing clusters (like ecovillages). Currently, there are 31 signed up to either actively participate in the work of the Planning Group or be a part of the Email contact list. Anyone may join at any time. If you would like to join any of the groups described above, a contact person will be indicated for each on the Planning Group page of the web site. You can also send me your Email address and I will add you to the list so you can attend and participate in the full group E-meeting on April 7, 7pm. Fuller information on what the Planning Group is about is—you guessed it—on the Town's web site.

HOUSING AGE IN DANBY



Recognize the map below? You can almost see the roads, eh? Each dot represents one property/home in Danby. Using data from the Tompkins County Assessment Department, the dots are colored by the age of the home:

- darkest, 1988-2019, 32 years, 444 properties
- dark gray, 1955-1987, 33 years, 438 properties
- light gray, 1915-1954, 40 years, 136 properties
- lightest, 1800-1910, 111 years, 223 properties

There's so many insights to be had from one picture; there isn't room to list them all here. For example: oldest housing follows the main roads; newest, most tightly dense housing in northern Danby; housing growing much faster since 1950-ish.

Unique Homeschool Program

White Hawk Ecovillage and Earth Arts Ithaca are partnering in a new nature and arts based program developed by Earth Arts staff Sophia Hutnik and Jesse Worden, held on White Hawk's 120 acres. The program meets once a week and, "seeks to cultivate...feelings of place and connectivity in the participants." It is open to all children ages 4.5-8 years old who are looking for innovative, fun, and child-led group activities.

"What a rich and fulfilling opportunity for kids to learn about this land, and gather in community around celebrating this beautiful place," said Kartik Sribarra, a White Hawk resident and parent of two participants. "There's a special joy in my kids being able to learn and experience this land so deeply--not to mention the convenience of an on-site program!"

Children spend sessions outside observing animals and plants, developing meditative practices and relaxation techniques, tracking animals, building shelters from snow and other natural materials, wildcrafting,

and cooking food and teas over campfires.

White Hawk Ecovillage is a vibrant, welcoming community integrating ecologically sound principles and community sufficiency. When completed, White Hawk will include thirty privately owned homes around a common recreation area. Ten homes are completed, with more

under construction and in the planning stage. The land boasts forests, streams, walking trails and ponds, and is used by community members for gardening, farming and permaculture projects, bee keeping, maple tapping, animal husbandry and more.

NIGHTMARE IN WEST DANBY

One day in 2018, after very heavy rain had soaked the region, we were headed to Bald Hill in Danby from West Hill in Ithaca. To avoid Ithaca traffic, we cut down Route 13A, past the Calvary cemetery near the junction of Bostwick Road to the Route 13 intersection, with its Tutelo traces, then southwestward past Robert Treman State Park to Route 34, and southward on 34 a mile or so to Blakeslee Hill Road. But as we turned to drive up Blakeslee Hill, we noticed a jackknifed tractor-trailer at the first curve and that the road was impassable. We turned around in the little parking lot for Cayuga Inlet fishing and continued southward with the idea of taking Station Road. As we started up Station and crossed the railroad tracks, in the center of the road was an orange Road Closed sign, presumably due to a washout ahead.

Now this was becoming an unusual trip, and we joked it was turning into a nightmare in West Danby. We were too far south of Ithaca to drive all the way back to Sandbank Road, so we continued south to Hillview Road, past the old landfill, past Myers' Gardens and Point O'Rocks, then began the circuitous 4-mile route toward home up Michigan Hollow Road. Transit of this four-lane-ish unpaved road

through the Danby State Forest normally takes less than 10 minutes, but it was a mess with all the rain; seemingly a foot deep in mud, our car

skidded and sloshed along. Finally, we made it to 96B and our home on Bald Hill Road. The whole trip from West Hill, which usually takes about 20 minutes, took more than an hour.

Over the next year, every time we passed through West Danby the memory of our errant road trip came up and at some point, sparked the idea of writing this story—with a hair of hyperbole in the title.
