DID YOU KNOW: DANBY'S DIVIDE Submitted by Ronda Roaring

I'M SURE YOU'VE ALL HEARD OF THE GREAT DIVIDE, now known as the Continental Divide of the Americas, that runs all the way from the Bering Strait in Alaska in the north to the Strait of Magellan at the southern tip of South America. It divides two watersheds: on the east side of the divide, the water runs into the Atlantic Ocean, while on the west side of the divide, the water runs into the Pacific.

The Great Divide is only one of six continental divides in the Americas. Did you know that we have a divide right here in Danby?

It's called the St. Lawrence Seaway (or River) Divide. It runs from northern Minnesota to Cape Canso in Nova Scotia. In Danby, the divide runs east and west, so that water flowing to the north runs into Lake Ontario, and water flowing to the south runs into the Susquehanna River. All of it winds up in the Atlantic Ocean, but thousands of miles apart.

So where, exactly, is this divide in Danby? It's not something you can see, like a line in the sand, but an acute observer will notice the difference in the direction of water flows. For example, when the divide enters West Danby from

Newfield, you'll notice that the water in the wetland just south of Walding Lane runs north and becomes the Cayuga Inlet but, in the wetland on the south side of Hillview Road, water runs south and joins Michigan Creek to become Catatonk Creek.

Between those two waterways, the di-

vide runs deep underground. It continues in the area of Hillview Road and the gravel pit and curves up along Bald Hill Road to the "back" (south side)

of Jennings Pond. Most of the pond runs north into Buttermilk Creek but, at the back of the pond (more like a wetland) the water runs south into Michigan Creek. The divide is right there!

The divide continues across NYS Rt.96B, through Dotson Park, under the northern end of Durfee Hill Road and then along that road, to a wetland at the end of Marsh Road, and then eastward to the Danby-Caroline border. It divides Six Mile Creek to the north from Willseyville Creek to the south.

If you're good at reading topographic maps, you can follow the divide all the way across Danby. If you're homeschooling kids, this is a great way for them to learn geology and water flow.

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DURING COVID - 19

As I AM SURE THAT MANY OF YOU ARE AWARE that all non-essential construction work was shut down by executive order of the Governor, but you may not be aware that construction that is deemed essential may continue or on going projects can continue to a point where it is safe to shut down.

Essential projects include roads, bridges, transit facilities, utilities, hospitals or health care facilities, affordable housing, and homeless shelters, as well as any work required to protect the health and safety of the occupants of a structure.

Also, any construction work being done by a single worker, who is the sole employee/worker on a job site may continue. Home owners preforming their own work they may continue as well.

Therefore, at this time the Town of Danby will not be issuing new building permits unless the project fits the category of emergency work or work being preformed by one worker or home owner on their own property.

If you do have a project planed for later this summer I do encourage you to submit your application and supporting documents to the Code Office for review and then, when the ban is lifted, a building permit can be issued and your contractor can start.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

A LOT CAN CHANGE IN A MONTH, AND HAS. Your town government has gone from shutting down in response to a threat from the novel coronavirus to regrouping so we can safely provide most of the services you expect. All of our meetings are now by videoconference and the links to them are on Danby's web site calendar, [townofdanbyny.org]. If you do not have a good high speed connection—still an issue for many, we know—the audio of meetings can be accessed by telephone. That information is also on the calendar, but if you can't get at that you will find it here in the Danby News for the regularly scheduled meetings.

That was the easy part compared to figuring out how to ease back into some of the other things we normally do. The library is shut down. Is there a safe way to resume operation? Ditto for the Town Court. Danby's Town Hall remains closed so, for the moment, we are limited to providing services remotely; planning is well along to safely provide that which can only be done in person. Find what is available for each department on the web site or by calling.

Can we have our summer swim programming at Jenning's Pond? Can we do a community garden for our children, something Melis would like to do? It gets very difficult to plot a way to safely undertake activity that is usually communal. Even our Highway Department, which is very hands-on, has had to rethink how to operate and will ease into a rather different approach to what they do. We are planning, talking to others, and responding to guidance from higher levels of government. Some of this forced change is a temporary accommodation to an extraordinary situation; some of it will become a permanent new way of life.

What we are doing has slowed, but not stopped. All of our boards and committees have resumed their normal work, conducted online, and there are many meetings of the working groups of the Planning Group. You can read about the whole planning initiative in a separate article in this issue of the Danby News.

We are not out of the woods yet on this coronavirus business. Until there is a vaccine developed or the population of susceptible individuals shrinks greatly, this threat is going to remain out there, poised to resurge wherever we let our guard down. That disturbing reality will influence our options and behavior for months more, if not longer.

One big upside is the growing recognition of how much we need and depend on each other, and how important our in-person gatherings are for our well-being. Imagine how much worse it could have been were it not for access to social media to blunt the impact. Let me add that although connecting in virtual space helps, so does connection to the natural world. We who are fortunate enough to call Danby home have a beautiful outdoors to savor and explore.

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HISTORY IN THE MAKING

OUR HISTORIC TIMELINE IS PEPPERED with crises that affect large segments of the population, bringing sorrow and hardship. A look at American history shows the Spanish Flu in 1918, the Great Depression that started in 1929 and lasted ten to twelve years, the oil and gas crises of 1973 and more.

On a global level, the Greek city/state of Athens made history as early as 429 BC when hit with what was called the plague. Now, in 2020, Coronavirus is affecting the whole world.

These tough periods test just about everybody in one way or another. They become waymarks in the story of nations, communities, and individuals.

How does a major negative event affect towns the size of Danby? Each town will be impacted in many similar ways but also in different ways depending on the size of the town, its location, and—especially—what the individuals who live there do and how they react to the situation. People are really the history-makers.

Notes in a personal journal mark specific *history* in that person's life such as the current pandemic and these notations often expand to include what is happening on a broader basis. Diaries, journals and letters make good sources for people who study and preserve history. Even though we might not want to rerun some past events, when we look at records of those events we often gain valuable insight for going forward.

What will be written about this period of history in Danby?



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COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

THE DEADLINE FOR THE DANBY NEWS is more than two weeks before residents start getting it in the mail. So this is not the forum for giving you the most up-to-date information about corona virus. However, there is little else that people are talking about, so I will say a few things that I hope can add something to the conversation.

I believe that the County staff people who are in charge of the emergency response are doing an excellent job. They are trained, they have more the most up-to-date information, and they are looking at the big picture. I have felt that the best thing I can do is to stay out of their way.

Here are a few examples of things that have helped make me understand why we need a big-picture focus during this crisis.

Should we act to let people not pay their rent? The County is not allowed to do that, but even if we could, how would that affect the landlords? Would we also be allowing the landlords to then not pay their taxes?

Should we try to provide masks for everybody in the County? How would that impact the supply of masks to medical personnel? How would we train everybody to properly use the masks we would be distributing? An improperly used mask can be more dangerous than not using a mask at all.

Should we try to have elections with all-mail voting? It seems like that makes the most sense from a public point of view. But our local Board of Elections has told us that the logistics involved in that are formidable, and that they can't guarantee how well it could be handled locally. The County legislature did end up asking NY State to implement all-mail voting, and now the decision is up to NY State.

These are examples of questions I have received from constituents, along with some of the ways in which the solution to one problem might be the cause of a different problem.

I would estimate that my Email volume is double what it has been during normal times. The amount of information that is being circulated is difficult to digest. Lack of information does not seem to be a problem for most people. Which information to pay attention to though might be a problem.

If you have questions, I believe that the best advice is to look on the Tompkins County Health Department web site, [tompkinscountyny.gov/health]. They update it daily with the latest information. For those who do not have access to the internet, you can call 211 with your questions.

My personal feeling is that beyond not getting sneezed on, the best thing we can do is to keep our immune systems healthy. Stress and depression are bad for your immune system. So to the extent possible, do what you can to de-stress yourself. If you are de-stressed and healthy, you are in a better position to reach out to friends, family, and neighbors and help them deal with whatever difficulties they may be encountering.

One final thought is that you should fill out your census information if you have not done so already. Getting an accurate count of who lives here will help us in the future with economic aid from the state and federal governments. This is particularly important because the absence of the college students during the census could potentially have negative consequences for us for the next decade. We don't know much yet about the how and when of economic recovery, but filling out your census data is one small but important step towards economic recovery that you can do right now. If you can't find the census information you got in the mail, more reminders will be coming.

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MAP OF THE MONTH CLUB: ASSESSMENT CHANGES IN DANBY Submitted by Ted Crane

THIS MONTH'S MAP IS A CRUDE INDICATION of changes to property assessments in Danby. This approximation joins two metrics available from the Tompkins County Department of Assessment: sales price and current assessed value. Without going *into the weeds* about the data, it's worth noting that the map includes only properties with a sale price recorded. The average increase from the sale price to the assessed value for these properties is about 44 percent. The difference for each property is compared to that average, and split into three groups:

- small light circle, 320 properties, 10 percent or more (54%+) than the average property value change
- small dark circle, 520 properties, 10 percent or less (34%-) than the average property value change
- larger circles, 52 properties, within 10 percent of average property value change

There are a lot more dark circles—slower appreciation—than light ones, and they tend to be located near roads. The lesser number of light circles are more scattered...and they are absorbing an ever-increasing share of the tax burden.

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PLANNING GROUP UPDATE

As previously reported in the Danby News, the Town has embarked on a wide-ranging planning effort. In January, the Town Board authorized the formation of the Danby Planning Group, an advisory body made up of representatives from the Town Board, Planning Board, Board of Zoning Appeals, the Conservation Advisory Council, augmented by any and all interested in Danby's future.

The Planning Group met twice in person in late February and early March before COVID-19. Since March, the Planning Group has formed four working groups:

Conservation Working Group—focusing on what areas of the Town need protection from further development. This group is also discussing fundamental questions including what natural habitats are most important and how "rural character" is defined.

Hamlets Working Group—focusing on how to strengthen and revitalize the hamlets of Danby and West Danby and what areas of the hamlets can accommodate new development. This group is also discussing how to improve the hamlets and what would make them even more desirable places to live.

Tax Policy Working Group—focusing on how to provide tax relief for owners of large parcels of open space or


#stayathome w/ Gaia Grrls Circle -- Grades 6-7-8 Fridays, 5/1-6/12, 3:30-5:30pm
